

Pelican Tracksters Second As Springfield Wins Meet

Coach Jim Inglesby's Pelican track squad grabbed second place honors in a three-way meet with Eugene and Springfield at Eugene Saturday afternoon before a small, rain drenched crowd. Klamath piled up 50½ points in the triangular meet while Springfield took first place with 56½ points. The Eugene crew placed third with 42 points.

The Pelicans, who were without the services of sophomore Gary Hancock, snared five first places while the winners won seven and Eugene the remaining two.

Senior Bob Drake, who was high point man for the Klamath squad with one first and two seconds, won the high jump with a leap of 5 feet 8 inches. Don Isensee, the half mile with a time of two minutes, eight and three-tenths seconds. Les Husted the shot put with a toss of 42 feet 11 inches. Gary Burt and Ron Olvera tying for top honors in the pole vault at an even 10 feet and sophomore Allen Phillips the javeline with a throw of 157 feet, seven inches. Drake placed a close second in the 120 yard hurdles behind Tom Brown of Springfield who won in a time of 1:53 and another second in the 100 yard hurdles behind Brown, who again emerged victorious with a time of 20 seconds flat. Drake's time was 20.2.

Another senior, Don Story, grabbed two second place finishes, placing in both the 100 and 220

Gomes Beats Jorgensen On Decision

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—Harold Gomes, a one-time Providence, R.I., sanitation department employee, looks ready today to "clean up" in the world featherweight boxing division.

The unranked but industrious Little Gomes scored a major upset Friday night when he gained a unanimous decision over "Fancy-Dan" Paul Jorgensen, the No. 2 featherweight contender, in their nationally-televised 10-round bout. The loss snapped Jorgensen's unbeaten string at 31 bouts and automatically made Gomes a name to conjure with in the "little men's" division.

"I need more conditioning before I try to challenge the champion (Davey Moore)," said the 30-pound Gomes. "But, of course, this was a big one for me and I'm out on the road toward some big fights."

Jorgensen, who switched his long-range early-round tactics and tried to mix it up with Gomes in the late rounds, "Still, I think the verdict could have been closer. I don't think there was more than a point either way separating us."

Referee Billy Regan called the bout for Gomes, 96-95, Judge Carl Gardner scored it 98-95 and judge Fred Aaronson favored the Providence boy, 97-95. The United Press International had Gomes ahead, 97-95.

In the nightcap, Dave Jones pounded out three singles in four official appearances and catcher Arley Kangas blasted a double and single to drive in three runs for the Cougars.

Bob Bollingbroke, struck out 12 and issued only two free passes, chalked up the victory. Bollingbroke also added his cause with a two-run triple in the third. The game was called after eight innings by agreement.

Roger Watts was tagged with the loss. Idaho's record in the tourney was 1-2, Montana, 0-3.

Oregon Track Team Downs Fresno State

FRESNO, Calif. (AP)—The University of Oregon track and field team smothered the Fresno State College Bulldogs, 91½-39½ Saturday in the Ducks' first meet of the season.

From the first event—the mile—which they swept, the Ducks went in front and stayed there throughout the meet over FSC's poorest track squad in years.

Jim Grelle, Oregon's ace runner, took the mile in 4:13.6 followed by George Larson and Phil Knight. It marked Grelle's fourth outing this year, his first outdoors, since competing in three indoor winter meets.

Freshmen Victors In Relays
SALEM, Ore. (AP)—Two University of Oregon freshmen, fled even in raw, wet weather, won the featured events at the Willamette Relays here Saturday.

Dyrol Burleson of Cottage Grove, Ore., won the Statesman Invitational Mile for the second straight year.

Burleson's time was 4:15.6, not far from the national record of 4:13.6 he set last season.

Burleson's teammate, little Jim Puckett of Cove, Ore., hurtled down the 100-yard dash course in 9.9 seconds, an excellent time considering the weather handicap.

The track was drenched, and showers fell throughout the meet. The race course also was whipped by chill winds.

In the third featured event, Dick Lee of Oregon State won the invitational 120-yard high hurdles in 14.9 seconds.

Most of the attention, though, was on Burleson and Puckett. Burleson clocked off quarter times of 65, 65, 61 and 64.6 seconds in winning the mile far ahead of Oregon State's Cliff Cordy, second in 4:27.

Puckett, too, had little trouble. The little red-head shot down the track to beat an old rival, Amos Marsh, who once competed in prep meets for Walla Walla against Puckett. Marsh now is an OSC sophomore.

Another Oregon State athlete, Wayne Moss, leaped 6 feet, 5½ inches in the high jump to eclipse the old meet record of 6-2.

There was no team scoring. Only two records fell in the prep competition, and both were toppled by South Salem competitors.

Bob Bartlett whipped over the 120-yard high hurdles in 15.2 seconds, erasing the old mark of 15.6 set by Galen Deshone of Dallas in 1952.

Then Bartlett joined his teammates to crack the old 440-yard sprint relay record of 45.1 seconds with a time of 44.7.

The former record was set last year by North Salem.

Ducks Defeated By Fresno, 3-2
FRESNO, Calif. (AP)—Fresno State College's pitcher Harvey Casey allowed Oregon 14 hits but scattered them so thoroughly that the Ducks managed only two runs Saturday as Fresno came out on top 3-2.

Having defeated the Ducks Friday, the Bulldogs now have a 14-4 record for the season.

Casey, who was lifted in the ninth for a pinch hitter, got two singles and scored two of Fresno's runs.

Oregon's leftfielder Jim Bode and first baseman Jim Hollister both got four hits. Bode tallied three singles and a double in five opportunities, and Hollister got a single each four times he came to bat.

Shot-Putter Long Matches Record
SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP)—Dallas Long, 18-year-old University of Southern California freshman, equaled the world shot put record of 63 feet 2 inches Saturday.

The official record is held by Parry O'Brien of Los Angeles. Long's mark-equaling heave came during preliminaries of the open event in the Easter Relays in La Playa Stadium.

He had another chance to break the mark in the finals.

Pels Sweep Doubleheader From Lava Bears 6-1, 3-1

The pitching-minded Klamath Union High School Pelicans completed a two-day four-game home stand at Gem Stadium Saturday afternoon by sweeping a non-counting doubleheader from the Bend Lava Bears, 6-1 and 3-1. In both contests the Whitebirds garnered all their runs in one inning, tallying six counters in a big third stanza in the opener while picking up three runs in the second inning of the second game.

In both tilts coach Dean White's Pelican pitching staff held the visitors in check, allowing the Bend crew only seven hits all afternoon, three in the first and four in the second.

Freshman Kent Hunsaker and sophomore John Webb shared the hurling chores in the opener while Webb, Keith Farrell and Paul Bishop combined their chucking talents in the second contest.

Sophomore Dick Depew, the southpaw slugger of the Pels, earned hitting honors in the first game as he slammed out a pair of doubles and drove home a brace of runs while enjoying a perfect day at the plate.

Depew's first double highlighted the big third inning in which the Klamathites picked up all their tallies. Behind 1-0 as a result of Bend scoring a single tally in their half of the second inning, the home team got rolling as they put together a walk to Hunsaker, which opened the inning; two consecutive errors on ground balls by Bob Yumck and Dean Dunson, Depew's long double down the left field fence, another two-bagger by Bill Worlein and two more miscues on the part of the Lava Bear infield.

Altogether the Bend squad committed five errors in the lateful inning, while being charged with six over the entire distance. Klamath was charged with a duo of errors, both in the same stanza by Hunsaker, which resulted in the lone Bend run being unearned.

Lava Bear Jim Riley began the second inning with a single then advanced on two straight errors on the part of the rookie pitcher, Cliff McDonald, drove a base on balls, Bucky Sherwood popped out to Yumck at short but Riley got trapped off third by third sacker Cecil Kiger on a grounder by Ed Cecil. While trying to catch Cecil off first, McDonald raced home for the only Bend tally.

Klamath threatened with a brief flurry in the fourth inning when Dunson pounded out a double and Depew drew a walk, however Cecil here down to get Ken Womer on strikes.

Hunsaker, who worked the first four innings, struck out four and

walked four while Webb pitched the final inning, striking out one and giving up one walk. Cecil went all the way for the losers, striking out seven while walking four.

Webb picked up right where he left off in the second game, giving up only one safety in his two-inning hurling stint while striking out three and walking two. The only hit off the blond youngster

was a leadoff single by Chuck Starr in the first inning.

Farrell took over from there, allowing just two singles, both by Ed Sell, as he worked two and two-thirds innings before yielding to Bishop. Farrell had near-perfect control in the third as he struck out all three batters. After giving up an infield single and a pair of bases on balls in a shaky fourth he struck out pinchhitter Joe Brown to snuff out any Bend ideas of a rally.

However the Lava Bears got their lone run in the final stanza on a pair of walks, a hit batsman and run-scoring single by Sell. At this point Bishop came into the game and retired the side with the aid of the line fielding Dunson, who raced into foul territory down the first base line to snare a twisting pop-up by Tom Riley for the game-ending out.

The Pels picked up their three runs in the second on a single by Jim Hall, who advanced to second on a grounder and scored on a safety by Estlin Kiger, a walk to Webb and a single by Yumck which scored two Pelican bases-runs.

The next action for Klamath is a twin-bill with Yreka next Tuesday afternoon on the Miners' home playing field.

Delany Wins 34th Straight
CHICAGO (AP)—Ron Delany burst ahead of Penn State's Ed Moran on the last lap Saturday night and won the Bankers Mile of the Chicago Relays in 4:06.4. It was the Irishman's 34th straight mile triumph and his third in the meet, thus retiring the trophy.

Delany, Villanova graduate student from Dublin, set a world indoor mile record of 4:02.4 in the meet last year. Twice he has lowered it this season, to 4:02.5 in the National A.U. Feb. 21 and 4:01.4 in the Knights of Columbus meet March 7.

Phil Coleman, now a graduate student at the University of Illinois, set the pace Saturday night through 6 of the 11 laps before a capacity crowd of 10,210 in the International Amphitheatre.

After three-fourths of a mile, Moran sped ahead, Delany moved into second and Coleman faded. At the start of the last lap, Delany moved effortlessly in front.

It was Delany's fifth poorest time of the season.

Lakers Stun SL In Playoff Game
ST. LOUIS (AP)—The Minneapolis Lakers stunned the NBA champion St. Louis Hawks 98-97 in overtime Saturday night and took a 3-2 lead in the western division playoffs as amazing rookie Elgin Baylor scored 36 points and handcuffed Cliff Hagan with 15 points.

U Of Washington Cops Track Meet
SEATTLE (AP)—The University of Washington picked up 11 first places to smother Western Washington and Seattle Pacific in a triangular track meet Saturday.

The Huskies piled up 97½ points to 34 for Western and 21½ for the Falcons.

Tom Davis was Western Washington's only first place winner, clocking in 25.5 in the low hurdles.

Cousey Sparks Celtic Victory
BOSTON (AP)—Bob Cousey, never better in the clutch, opened a chink in the Syracuse armor late in the first half Saturday and guided the Boston Celtics to a rugged 129-108 National Basketball Assn. playoff victory over the Nationals.

The win gave the Celtics a 3-2 edge in the best-of-seven Eastern Division final series.

Cousey collected 10 of his 27 points just before halftime. His scoring put the Celtics ahead to stay 63-59 by intermission and his clever play-making in the final 12 minutes broke it wide open.
