All this and pitching, too!

That's manager Mayo Smith's reaction today after the Cincinnati Reds staged their biggest outburst of the spring in a 12-1 romp over the Philadelphia Phillies. It was the kind of slugging the experts are saying Smith can expect all season from his muscle men—the "long suit" which could make the Reds a dangerous pennant contender.

But Smith's real reason for optimism was the brilliant five-hit pitching of Bob Purkey, who became the third pitcher in as many days to go nine innings. With rookie Orlando Pena and Brooks Lawrence also among the "nine-inning" pitchers, the Reds seem to have the most advanced staff anywhere on the Grapefruit circuit.

The Reds have averaged only 4.2 runs in 17 previous games and had scored four or less runs in 10 contests but they broke loose Friday with a vengeance. Del Ennis smashed two homers and Roy McMillan and Johnny Powers hit one each to lead Cincinnati's 15-hit attack.

Purkey, a 17-game winner last season, looked ready for an anticipated opening day assignment. He yielded the Phillies' run in the first inning and then breezed the rest of the way.

Manager Thinks SL Has Fighting Chance

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI)—Solly Hemus, the most inexperienced manager in the major leagues, believes the St. Louis Cardinals have "a fighting chance for the first division."

"We could even win the pennant," he said with a straight face.

He won't find many baseball men who will agree with him. Not because Hemus, a journeyman second baseman during his major league career, is managing for the first time, but because it doesn't look like he has the horses.

"We could fool 'em," he predicted. But he didn't add what with.

He likes his infield of either Joe Cunningham or George Crowe at first base, Don Blasingame at second, Alex Grammas at short and Ken Boyer at third.

"I wouldn't trade them for any other infield in the league," he claims.

He thinks his catching is tops, too, with Gene Green, on account of his big bat, getting the call over Hal Smith, one of the best defensive receivers in the business.

Hemus admits, however, he has an outfield problem and that either Cunningham or Green may be called upon to take over right field. That is the one spot the Cardinals are trying to plug, being willing even to give up Sad Sam Jones, one of their starting pitchers to do it.

"I'm happy about our pitching," says Hemus, who will be the only playing manager in the majors this season. It's doubtful whether any other manager would be happy about it, though.

He has for starters Larry Mize (13-13), Vinegar Bend Mizell (10-14) and Jones (14-13). In relief there will be the veterans Alex Kellner (7-5 overall with Cincinnati Reds), Merv Grissom (7-4 with the San Francisco Giants) and Jim Brosnan, who won eight while losing only four for the Cardinals after a 3-4 record with the Chicago Cubs.

"That leaves me needing four more pitchers," Hemus said. "I have plenty of prospects."

They include rookie Ernie Broglio, who won 17 while losing four with Phoenix and Toronto last season. He's the hurler Hemus is counting on most as his No. 4 starter.

Then there is Lindy McDaniel, who was 5-7 with the Cardinals last season; Gary Blaylock, 14-10 with Rochester; Dick Ricketts,

Guiseppe Loves Bike Racing

NEW YORK (AP)—Some guys just live in their own little whirl. Guiseppe Ogas does.

He is a professional bicyclist from Italy, currently legging it around the boards in New York's first six-day race in 10 years. Guiseppe earns \$100 a day for keeping up with the dizzy pace 24 hours daily with time out for an occasional snooze or cup of coffee.

Some days he can make extra money by winning a sprint. Guiseppe is not leery of the jamming that often results in spills on the steep embankments of the wooden track.

"I love this life," he said. "I make about \$8,000 a year and on this you can live like a king in Italy. I've raced all over Europe, in Australia and North Africa. I have girl friends all over."

Guiseppe, a handsome 25-year-old, speaks in a well modulated voice with a tone and accent similar to Rosini Brazzi, the Italian film star. In his native country, Guiseppe is a celebrity. He is the Italian sprint champion. Before turning pro, he competed in the 1956 Olympics in Melbourne. He finished third in the tandem race, won by an Australian team. There are a few strings attached to riding in foreign countries, Guiseppe claims. He can't get good spaghetti.

"When I raced in Cleveland a couple of months ago," he explained, "I ate in an Italian restaurant, the spaghetti was all right, but the sauce was terrible. It's the same everywhere else."

Guiseppe's partner, another Italian, came down with an appendicitis attack Wednesday and Guiseppe was teamed with Andre Boher, a Frenchman. Boher's teammate, Heinz Welt of Chicago, dropped out because of fatigue.

"I'm pretty tired, too," Guiseppe admitted candidly. "But I take vitamin pills all the time and that strong black coffee helps keep me awake."

Guiseppe said he will rest for a couple of days after the race, which ends Saturday night. Next Tuesday he leaves for Milan where he will take part in another race April 12.

Rodeo Finals To Be Held Here In July

World championship rodeo comes to Klamath Falls July 3, 4 and 5 this year. Word was recently received that the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association's Board of Directors at their mid-winter meeting unanimously approved final plans of Oregon Technological Institute and its associated student body for sponsoring the National Finals Intercollegiate Rodeo this year to be held on the above dates at the Klamath County Fairgrounds. Attending this meeting at LaMar, Colorado, was H. A. Pedersen of Oregon Tech.

Pedersen is National Finals Rodeo director who with student and faculty committees has been working for several months on the preliminary plans to make this the most outstanding rodeo ever to have been held in Klamath County. Present indications are that this event will attract college cowboys from at least 36 colleges in 16 states, extending from Washington to Oklahoma and Louisiana.

The finals rodeo has been held for several years under the sponsorship of the Colorado Springs Junior Chamber of Commerce at the beautiful Penrose Stadium in Colorado Springs with Pikes Peak and the Rocky Mountain Range as its backdrop. The students and administration of Oregon Tech feel fortunate to have been selected as the sponsor for the culminating event of the year for all college rodeo cowboys.

The Klamath Falls school is to be the principal contribution by the student body of the Mile-High School to the State's Centennial Celebration this year. This will be the first Oregon college sponsored national event to occur after the beginning of the official Centennial Celebration June 10.

Falling as it does over a holiday weekend, the rodeo is expected to attract hundreds of out of state visitors to the community who will "spend an extra day in Klamath Falls."

The NIRA Finals Rodeo will be the only rodeo held in Klamath Falls during the July Fourth celebration and the cooperation of previous rodeo sponsors, namely the Klamath Basin Celebrations Committee and the Klamath County Rodeo Committee has been of great assistance to the sponsors of the NIRA Finals.

Rodeo enthusiasts will remember that Oregon Tech has sponsored the West Coast Finals for the NIRA for the past two years. These have been among the best rodeos to be seen in this region; however, in comparison these will seem small compared to the three day, two go-round event to be staged this year. Each year many of the college cowboys graduate into the professional ranks of the RCA and are among many of the top contenders in the national circuit. For the National NIRA Finals, RCA stock and judges will be used and it is hoped that several outstanding specialty acts may be secured, appealing to the likes of all people interested in any form of rodeo celebration.

Pel Baseballers Open Year By Dividing With Prineville

The Klamath Union Pelicans got their baseball season under way Friday afternoon at Gem Stadium by splitting a doubleheader with Prineville, the Pels winning the opener, 6-2 behind the combined four-hit pitching of Blake Griggs and Keith Farrell while the Cow-boys stormed back with 14 hits in the second contest to drop the Whitebirds, 15-4.

Griggs pitched the first five innings of the opener, allowing just two safeties while striking out six and giving no walks. Farrell finished the game by pitching the final two innings, being reached for two hits and both of the Prineville runs, although both were unearned.

Cowboy pitcher, Jerry Riley was touched for all of the Klamath runs and his while picking up two strikeouts and three walks as he took care of the Prineville chugging chores over the entire distance.

Each team picked up one hit apiece in the first inning. Tom Denton, garnering line single to center to lead off the inning while Pelican Dick Dewey rifled a ground single to center for the first 1959 Klamath hit.

Klamath tallied first in the third inning as they put together a single, two stolen bases and another single. Chucky catcher Dave Saks singled to open the stanza and Bob Yunc was safe on a fielder's choice with Saks being safe at second.

While the Prineville infield was disputing the umpire's call on the close play at second, Yunc stole third. Leftfielder Bill Worline then dropped a clean single into right field to drive in the initial tally.

The Pelicans broke the game open in the fifth as they scored five runs on two hits, two squeeze bunts, two walks and a pair of Prineville's errors. Yunc's lead-off double, Dean Dunson and Griggs' consecutive squeeze bunts

Joe Adcock Wants To See Daily Action

BRADENTON, Fla. (AP)—Joe Adcock doesn't want to be traded. The Milwaukee first baseman isn't angry at anybody. He likes his manager, Fred Haney. But Joe isn't happy.

"I don't want to sit on the bench," Joe complained today. "I don't like playing one day and sitting on the bench the next. I can't do either myself or the team justice playing part time. I know I'm a better ball player when I play every day."

The record books Joe up.

In 1956, the 6-4 slugger from Couthatta, La., batted .291, slammed 38 home runs and drove in 103 runs in 137 games. In 1957, alternating with the left-handed hitting Frank Torre, Adcock batted .287, hit 12 homers and drove in 38 runs in 65 games. A broken leg sidelined him for a number of weeks. Joe slumped to .275 in 105 games last year, hitting 19 homers and driving in 34 runs.

"I tore a ligament in my knee and couldn't play at all last year," Joe explained. "When I got back to the lineup I couldn't swing a bat right. Whenever I'd put pressure on my back leg, out would go the knee. I didn't play a game when my leg didn't lock on me six to eight times. I couldn't even get in and out of my car when my leg wouldn't go on me."

Adcock hasn't seen much action this spring. For one thing, he was a late starter. For another, the rainy weather has kept the exhibition games down to a minimum.

"I know their plans are for me to play only left-handed pitching only," said Joe. "But I'm not happy about the situation. I want to play every day. And I'm a first baseman, not an outfielder. It's tough to stay in shape shuffling in and out of the lineup."
