Truman Library Will Open Bulk Of White House Files

INDEPENDENCE, Mo. (UPI)—A significant portion of former President Truman's papers, including about three-fourths of his White House central files, will be opened to researchers at the Truman library on May 11. It was announced Saturday.

The papers will become available less than two years after the library, constructed by private funds to house Truman's papers, was opened on July 6, 1957. "We are doing what we can to promote the serious study of a significant period of American history," Truman said. "I know that the archivists who are analyzing the papers will carry out this work, and will open other portions of the papers as rapidly as possible."

An estimated one and one-half million pages of documents will be opened for use May 11, including about three-fourths of the two principal segments of Truman's White House central files, those of his immediate staff, and a portion of Truman's papers collected while he was a senator. A collection of books, microfilm and microprint also will be made available May 11. Dr. Philip C. Brooks, library director, said in announcing the opening.

They deal with the nature and history of the presidency and foreign relations of the U.S. in the first half of the 20th century. Many of the books came from Truman's personal library. Others were bought with a \$48,700 grant from the Rockefeller Foundation. Brooks said a research room containing essential facilities will be made available for scholars. Photographic reproduction of unrestricted materials held by the library will be made for a nominal fee.

College professors, graduate students and other qualified writers are expected to be major users of the papers, Brooks said. However, they will be made available on an equal basis to all persons engaged in serious scholarly research, he added.

Sale proposals for sale and delivery of federal surplus Columbia River power in California will be presented at a hearing scheduled by the Irrigation and Reclamation subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs April 8 and 9 in Washington, D.C., according to Bonneville Power Administration administrator William A. Pearl. . . proposals will be further reviewed with Secretary of Interior Fred A. Seaton prior to final action. . . preliminary plans for the proposed sale were agreed on earlier in March at a Portland meeting of officials of BPA, Pacific Gas & Electric Co. of California and California Oregon Power Co., the latter represented by J. C. Boyle, vice president and general manager, Medford. . . under the proposal, BPA would enter into a wheeling contract with Copco for transmitting power to the California-Oregon border, boundary of the administration's marketing area. . . PG&E would provide such additional transmission facilities as required for delivery in California. . . transmission facilities which would have to be constructed would include approximately 90 miles of 230,000-volt transmission line connecting the Copco system at Klamath Falls with the California system at Pt. No. 3, east of Redding. . . Pearl said that BPA will have available for at least the next 10 years substantial amounts of surplus power for which there is no market in the Pacific Northwest.

Missile Data Capsule Found

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—The data capsule from the nose cone of a Thor Missile fired 1,600 miles downrange was recovered Friday, Air Force officials announced. The Air Force tries only occasionally to recover the data capsule because it usually has sufficient information from telemetry instruments installed in the weapon's nose cone. It was the third such capsule recovery in 26 Thor firings.
