### Father, Three Daughters Escape Train-Car Crash

SUN VALLEY, Calif. (UPI) — John Fancher, 45, who escaped with his three young daughters seconds before a train smashed into their stalled car, says he doesn't know about miracles. "All I know is that we were all saved," he said Sunday after the accident as he was on his way to church for Easter services with his daughters Lynn, 12; Margo, 9, and Christine, 7. "At the railroad grade crossing... the view was blocked by a string of freight cars," Fancher said. "They were uncoupled to let traffic through but you couldn't see either side." He said he started across when the car stalled on the tracks. "Then I heard it—the horn of a train, coming fast and close. I knew there was no time to try and start the car again," Fancher said. "I yelled for the kids to get out and run. Then I saw the diesel engine. It was right on top of us. 'Little Christine got out first. She ran and I knew she was safe. Lynn, who was in the front seat with me, jumped out her side, and was away."

### Christians Of The World Celebrate Easter Sunday

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Christians over much of the world celebrated Easter Sunday with services and prayers for peace. Outside American churches there were the usual fashion parades. Pope John XXIII, in the first Easter Mass of his pontificate, pleaded for peace. But he declared that "the good Christian does not yield and is wary of compromises." Despite an all-day downpour, 100,000 persons were in St. Peter's Square for the pontiff's blessing. Among them were 65 contest-winning newsmen from 58 U.S. newspapers. Afterward, the boys presented an Easter egg to Italian movie queen Gina Lollobrigida. In West Berlin, a record 100,000 tourists converged on the city 110 miles inside Communist East Germany. ### Little David Returns Home

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Little David Stewart returned home Sunday night with a big smile for the thousands of Bay Area residents who donated \$10,000 so that he might have a normal life. The 2½-year-old boy and his mother, Mrs. Tom Stewart, 21, arrived from Chicago where David underwent a delicate heart operation. When David left for Chicago, his complexion was blue and he couldn't sit up. But when he returned Sunday night, the little boy laughed and waved as he hugged his father and kissed his 7-month-old brother on the head. Mrs. Stewart said the doctors assured her David could look forward to a full life after several months recuperation. "He's going to be fine, just fine," she said. "He calls twice as much as before and he's so happy." "Now he'll be able to do anything but play football," beamed her husband. "Nobody will ever know how wonderful this is — or how grateful we are to everyone who made it possible."

### Guests Perish In Hotel Fire

UKIAH (UPI) — Two guests were killed early Sunday when fire broke out in the 72-year-old Palace Hotel, but 42 other residents escaped without injury. The dead were Bill Scheid, 73, and William Fugua, 28, who lost a leg and was partially paralyzed in a logging accident two years ago. The fire started at 4:45 a.m. and destroyed a storeroom and one dining room before it was controlled. Damage, including that caused by smoke throughout the building, was estimated at \$50,000.

### 7 Children Die In Blaze

DANIELTOWN, Va. (AP) — Seven children, ranging in age from 10 months to 11 years, perished Sunday in flames that destroyed their small, four-room frame cottage while their parents attended Easter Sunrise services. The youngsters were children of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Lewis, Negroes, Lewis, 34, a laborer, and his wife were attending services at Mt. Zion Church, a mile away, when the fire was discovered at 5:40 a.m. by a passerby, Lynn Towers. Towers, a white man, tried to kick in the back door of the house but could not enter because of the flames. Shortly afterward, Lewis returned but also was driven back by the fire. When Alberta firemen arrived the house was in ruins.

## Governor's Commission Mulls Urban Problems

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — A new governor's commission will try to find out if better coordinated local government can untie knots in the handling of crime, smog, taxes and transportation. Gov. Edmund G. Brown appointed the 19 commissioners Sunday and directed them to make a far-reaching study of the problems brought by "explosive" urban growth in California. The governor's Commission on Metropolitan Area Problems will be headed by San Francisco Attorney Ben C. Duniway as chairman, and Los Angeles insurance executive J. Edward Day as vice-chairman. As a beginning point, the governor set a five-point program: 1. Transportation, freeways, rails and streets—"How best can we move millions of men to and from work?" 2. Housing, redevelopment, land use planning—"How can we keep

## Jilted Swain Said Suicide

REDWOOD CITY (UPI) — A bachelor, apparently rejected by the woman he loved, was found dead Sunday in the garage of his home. Police said George Kincaid Jr., 29, an electronics technician, was found slumped in the front seat of his car. A garden hose had been run from the exhaust pipe to the car's interior. Authorities found a note apparently written by Kincaid on Wednesday, the day of the suicide. It was addressed to "Dear Florence" and read: "Now that I know that you don't love me, I just lost my heart... you have to have love, and I loved with all the heart and soul as I have loved you, to live... without that, I am not a man."

## Police Arrest Nine Youths

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Nine East Bay youths were arrested Sunday night as police broke up an unruly mob of 400 persons at Playland-at-the-Beach. Authorities said most of the 400 involved were from the East Bay, and some claimed they have been attending a beach party sponsored by their church. Police were called to the scene when the youths began fighting among themselves, knocking over trash cans and newspaper stands. Five persons were booked at city prison and four teenagers were taken to the Youth Guidance Center. Police said they refused to disperse when ordered.

## Ike Heads Back To Capital; Rain Snips Easter Holiday

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP) — President Eisenhower today cut his Easter holiday a bit short, apparently because of rain, and headed back to Washington. Rain, which commenced during the night and continued as he left by car wiped out the possibility of another round of golf before the end of the Easter weekend visit Eisenhower started here last Thursday. The President plans to return later in the week for a speech on the international situation Saturday morning at Gettysburg College's spring convocation. That will be his second speech of the week with an international theme. On Thursday in Washington, he will address the opening session of the North Atlantic Treaty Council's 10th anniversary meeting. The President had spent the Easter weekend mainly taking it easy with his family. With the Eisenhower ladies and his three small granddaughters attracting much attention in new Easter outfits, the President Sunday morning took the family to services at the Gettysburg Presbyterian church.

## Operation Said Success

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UPI) — Jon Castro, 4, can start living a normal life now that a hole in his heart has been repaired. The boy came home over the weekend from St. John's Hospital where he underwent a heart operation, made possible by mechanics of the human body who built a machine to substitute for the heart and lungs. Jon had been a frequent patient at St. John's where the nurses felt they knew almost as much about the young heart victim as his parents. He had been hospitalized two to three times a year with pneumonia, the result of a congenital heart defect which shunted blood into Jon's lungs, making him susceptible to pneumonia. Jon was doomed to a life of disability or an early death because of a hole between the chambers of his heart. Now, only a savage scar nearly from neck to navel remains to remind him of his former condition. The problem of repairing the hole was something like an auto mechanic faced with replacing a piston ring—with the engine going. He must first stop the engine.

## Paper Blasts Meg, Queen

LONDON (AP) — New Protestant complaints were expected today in the wake of a newspaper report that Princess Margaret may accompany Queen Mother Elizabeth when she calls on Pope John XXIII in Rome next month. Court sources said the princess is going along when her mother visits the Italian capital April 20-26. The London Sunday newspaper "The People" said the princess was most anxious to meet the Pope. A British Protestant organization has protested the queen mother's having an audience with Pope John. The protest stems from the fact that Queen Elizabeth II is the titular head of the Church of England. Princess Margaret was received by the late Pope Pius XII at the Vatican in 1954 to the accompaniment of similar criticism from British Protestants. The report in "The People" said palace and foreign office officials are urging the 28-year-old princess not to call on the new Pope. "No member of the British royal family for centuries has paid a second visit to Rome after having been received in papal audience during a previous visit," the paper said.

## Missing Chimp Search Object

OAKLAND (UPI) — Oakland police today sought a baby chimpanzee named Lulu which was stolen from a pet shop either late Saturday or early Sunday. Norman J. Blanchet, owner of the pet shop, told authorities the animal was taken by someone who drilled a hole in the wall of the shop. The thief left \$60 in the cash register. 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## Utilities Control Bill Meets Senate Opposition

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — A bill to loosen provisions of a 45-year-old utilities control law is running into opposition in the Senate Public Utilities Committee which meets today. The bill, introduced by Sen. Richard Dolwig (R-Redwood City), would repeal parts of the Public Utilities Code which sponsored by Gov. Hiram Johnson in 1914. The code now reads that "no public utility shall, as to rates, charges, service, facilities, or in any other respect make or grant any preference or advantage to any corporation or person or subject any corporation or person to any prejudice or disadvantage." ## Forest Funds Given Okay

McCLOUD — The Siskiyou County Board of Education met at Yreka the evening of March 26. The board voted to allocate \$8200 from forest reserve funds to the Tulelake High School district for payment of bleacher construction after hearing a request for the amount from Tulelake board members, Virgil Barron and Earl Parsons. Other action taken by the board was: voted to apportion not to exceed \$300 for a new refrigerator for the Honolulu school; credentials: approved the purchase of six films for the audio-visual department; approved the request of Mrs. Minnie Pederson for a general elementary life diploma; heard a delegation from Gazelle elementary board request funds for various capital-outlay items and voted to provide funds for the payment of a duplicator and typewriter. In further action the county board approved the submission of a comparable audio-visual program contract, as last year, to each school district; approved the request of an inter-district transfer of a student from Callahan to Etna; approved a county superintendent of schools budget for fiscal year ending June 30, 1960, totaling \$25,406 for salaries and wages, maintenance and operation and capital outlay; approved after amendments, a budget of \$3800 for the county board; approved a \$6000 junior college transportation and tuition, maintenance and operation budget request; and approved a budget of \$2420 for education of mentally retarded children. The county board heard a report that all school districts, with one exception, were in compliance with the ruling of the board that each district submit a capital-outlay report on funds expended from forest reserve funds before being eligible for new allocations. The group set the next meeting date for April 30 at 8 p.m. at Yreka.
