And if that isn't enough, old faithful Warren Spahn was blasted for four home runs in Sunday's 7-3 Braves' loss to the Cincinnati Reds.

Operating at second base was 23-year-old Chuck Cottier — good field, no hit. At the moment, he has the call over Felix Mantilla and Joe Morgan.

"I'm concerned about complacency on the club," Tebbetts said. "I'm more worried about the fact that we have no young fellows to battle the others out for their jobs — to make them put out."

Tebbetts and Cincinnati General Manager Gabe Paul talked trade in Miami Sunday. But like the rest of the league, Paul senses the Braves are in trouble and isn't of a mind to help them plug the second base gap.

## Ted Williams Awaits Tests For Ailment

BOSTON (AP)—A discouraged Ted Williams today awaited examination and treatment for the latest ailment which ranks him as one of baseball's all time hard luck guys.

The 40-year-old Boston Red Sox batting perfectionist, who has the highest salary in the game, arrived by plane Sunday night from the club's Scottsdale, Ariz., training camp to clear up pains in his neck and right shoulder.

Williams was scheduled for a consultation with Dr. Charles Fager, a neurosurgeon, who was expected to recommend hospitalization and traction treatment for the trouble which stems from a pinched nerve.

Despite his repeated triumphs on the field, Williams is experiencing still another of a long line of physical ailments which have plagued him since his World War II hitch as a Marine pilot.

"I'm all right, I'm all right," the defending American League batting king said when he left the plane at Logan Airport. "This has been bothering me for about two weeks now and been getting progressively worse. It's definitely more than muscular but I'm not worried about it."

"Why does everything happen to me?" the temperamental left fielder asked later.

"I was feeling better than in some time when this thing hit me," Williams continued. "I was hoping for once I could get through my spring training without some handicap interfering with my program."

Williams explained he got relief from the pain only when he held his chin up and his head motionless. He said it produced a sharp pain when he turned his head to the right and that there are periods when he is lying down when it hurts him to breathe.

## Lakers Beat SL For Title

MINNEAPOLIS, (AP)—The Minneapolis Lakers, scorned as paupers a year ago and on the verge of being thrown out of the league, led it in pro basketball's high society today.

With Elgin Baylor breaking down the door the Lakers came out of the National Basketball Assn's poorhouse Sunday by beating St. Louis 106-104 for the Western Division title, their first since 1954.

The Hawks, national champions a year ago, could scarcely believe it. Almost as dumbfounded were Laker fans, who had suffered miserably through years of mediocre basketball since George Mikan quit.

But Bob Short, the chance-taking Laker president of two years, jubilantly recalled a prediction.

"They laughed last October when I said we would look bad for a while but then beat St. Louis in the playoffs," he said. "They're not laughing now." The Lakers won four games and lost two in the playoffs.

Short staked the club's future on the gamble that Baylor would hit immediate and spectacular stardom.

He did, and today Minneapolis is in the NBA's title playoffs, awaiting the outcome of the Boston-Syracuse series. The Celtics and Nats play Wednesday night to determine which meets the Lakers.

If the winner is Boston, Minneapolis will be thrown against a team it hasn't beaten in 18 games, a record of futility without parallel in modern pro basketball.

"But they told us we couldn't handle St. Louis either because we finished 16 games behind them in the regular season and lost 8 of 12 to them," said Coach Johnny Kundla.

Minneapolis finished the 1957-58 season \$125,000 in debt and in line for early expulsion from the league. Short couldn't find a buyer so the Lakers stayed in by default.

The only chance this year was that Baylor would bring in the customer. His \$25-point per game scoring and eye-catching style did the job. The Lakers are \$50,000 in the black.

## Ailment Claims Ex-Indian

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—Hot-tempered Johnny Allen hated to lose a baseball game. And when he did, he usually blamed his teammates.

That's what many baseball men remembered about the former major league pitcher when told he had died at his home here Sunday at the age of 53. He had been ill with a heart ailment for several months.

Allen pitched for five major league teams between 1932 and 1944, racking up impressive records with the New York Yankees and Cleveland Indians before an All Star game injury in 1938 affected his delivery. He finished his career with the St. Louis Browns, Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants.

Allen was one of the most colorful players of his time, but his quick temper got him into numerous scrapes with umpires and players.

He was fined and suspended many times when his violent temper got out of hand.

"Once," recalls a former sports writer who knew Allen well, "he threw a tantrum in a Boston hotel corridor after losing a 1-0 game to the Red Sox' Wes Ferrell. He was with Cleveland at the time."

"He yanked down a fire hose and shot water all over the place. He kicked over a cigarette stand filled with sand and knocked over furniture. It took him a long time to cool down."

"Johnny was a very intent ball player. He never lost a game. Someone else lost it for him. That was his theory."

Allen made an impressive big league debut with the Yankees in 1932, winning 17 and losing 4. He had three more good years with the Yanks before he was traded to Cleveland before the 1936 season.

In his first year as an Indian he had a 20-10 mark. Then followed his most remarkable season. He won 15 games and lost only 1, despite an appendectomy that sidelined him for six weeks at midseason.

The loss came on his last appearance of the season when he was shooting to tie the American League record of the most consecutive victories (16).

"He lost that one, 1-0, to the Browns. And was he mad," recalls the ex-sports writer. "He blamed the third baseman for letting a ball get through."
