

Chicago Pounds 'Toothpick' For Nine Runs, Nine Hits

The Chicago Cubs, who have been knocking the cover off the ball all spring, have knocked a little off San Francisco's big deal for Sam Jones.

Jones, the National League strikeout king obtained by the Giants last week, made his debut for them Wednesday and ran into a storm of basehits that resulted in a 10-5 Cub victory. Jones worked only four innings but yielded nine hits and all the Cubs' runs.

George Altman, picked as the Cubs' "rookie of the spring," celebrated by belting a three-run homer and driving in a total of four runs to lead the Cubs' 11-hit assault. The Cubs wrapped up the triumph with a five-run fourth inning rally that boosted them into a 10-1 lead.

The New York Yankees scored all their runs in the ninth to whip the St. Louis Cardinals 5-1, the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the Philadelphia Phillies, 8-0, the Chicago White Sox topped the Milwaukee Braves, 6-5, the Kansas City Athletics shaded the Detroit Tigers, 4-3, and the Cincinnati Reds beat the Washington Senators, 6-4, and Baltimore beat Pittsburgh, 4-3, in other exhibition activity.

Cubs 10, Giants 5

Bob Anderson, a 6-foot, 4-inch rookie right-hander who previously went nine innings, went eight Wednesday and experienced his only really bad inning when the Giants scored three runs in the fifth. Walt Moryn also hit a three-run homer for the Cubs and Daryl Spencer had three hits for San Francisco.

Indians 5, Sox 4

The Cleveland Indians managed to pull out a 5-4 decision over the Boston Red Sox but were disturbed by another "iffy" performance by ex-strikeout artist Herb Score. Score struck out seven batters in three innings but the Red Sox also scored four runs—on a solo homer by Sam White and a three-run blast by Frank Malone. Billy Martin hit two homers and Vic Power and Jim Piersall one each for Cleveland.

KC Athletics Have Steady Nutritionist

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Mrs. Arnold Johnson watched horrified as some members of her husband's baseball team, the Kansas City Athletics, polished off two T-bone steaks and a large slab of strawberry shortcake for breakfast.

"What kind of insane eating is this?" she asked.

Mrs. Johnson hustled off to see Dr. Carlton Fredericks, nationally known nutritionist and health authority. They arranged a meeting with Johnson.

As a result, the Athletics today have a full-time nutritionist on their staff. Proper eating has been added to batting, fielding and throwing as necessary ingredients for a winning team.

Dr. Fredericks, author of four books on nutrition, disclosed today he is dedicated to keeping the A's from committing gastronomic suicide.

He believes that if the K.C. players follow his advice it will help them finish higher than their seventh place American League station of 1958. A better nourished team performs better, he says.

Dr. Fredericks, a veteran radio commentator who for many years has been telling women how to keep thin through proper diet, claims his methods prolong life and improve performance in any field of endeavor.

Club owner Johnson, his general manager, Parke Carroll, field skipper Harry Craft and the players have indicated their willingness to go along with Dr. Fredericks' theories.

Dr. Fredericks, who earned his Ph.D. in nutrition at New York University, admits the players are a little timorous about the project. He feels, however, they are convinced he can help them.

Just to be sure of the player's cooperation, Dr. Fredericks will meet shortly with their wives to acquaint them with his year-long program. They will be issued text books, nutritional charts and suggested menus. All players will be given vitamin supplements in accordance with their needs. Special classes will be conducted from time to time with the wives.

Portland Has Good Outlook

BRAWLEY, Calif. (AP)—The Portland Beavers, who rallied from last place in June to become still-rising fourth placers at the close of the 1958 Pacific Coast League campaign, have as strong a prospective first division outlook as any.

This, contrary to the trend in these days of absolute major league domination of triple-A leagues, does not at present rest as much on help from the Kansas City Athletics, their sponsoring major league club, as on a small but stout holdover nucleus from last year of athletes they own themselves.

In the outfield the Beavers count on holdover Bob DiPietro (.280, 81 RBIs), Dave Melton, Kansas City-owned holdover (.305, 39 RBIs in less than half the season), Charley Secrest, small-sized but extremely active newcomer (.281, 99 RBIs at Little Rock), and big, powerful, long-ball hitting Jim Greengrass from Sacramento. Of these only Secrest bats left, right-hand batters being much more valuable in Multnomah Field's tempting "home run meadows."

In the infield George Freese at third (.303, 81 RBIs, 35 home runs) and phenomenal fielding Jack Littrell at short (.285, 38 RBIs) are a strong foundation to an otherwise uncertain getup. From Kansas City comes Jim McManus, left-hand batting first baseman (.267 and 41 RBIs in late season weeks with Seattle), and Milton Graff at second, rather light-hitting but supposedly nimble lad from Buffalo. He has been in camp too short a time really to evaluate.

The club now lacks a utility man which Kansas City is supposed to supply but DiPietro can play any infield position but short.

Catchers are veteran Beaver-owned Lenny Neal, .219 and only 30 RBIs last year but looks immensely improved this spring; Rafe Noble, from Kansas City via Buffalo, .269 and 72 RBIs, at present sort of a holdout after winter ball; and Wilmer Shantz, light hitting (.263, 22 RBIs at Charleston) but noted for fielding skill.

Everything really depends on pitching and this is rather uncertain. Tested Portland-owned holdovers include veteran Larry Jansen, 9-10 but eight of his nine victories won consecutively after a poor start; little left-hander Vic Lombardi (11-6) and Duane Pillette, (9-10) back when he refused to report on sale to Denver.

Two Kansas City pitchers from Little Rock have looked good in spring games—southpaw Ben Swearingen (.7-6) and Bob Schwartzkopf (6-2)—as have Walby Burnette, despite an 0-7 mark at Denver, and John Kume, knuckleballer, 6-2 at Sacramento.

En route is Bob Davis, 11-3 at Little Rock, supposed to be a sure regular. Glenn Cox had a 16-9 record at Buffalo and Kansas City is supposed to send on more pitchers just under major league caliber.

Another Little Rocker, Allen Romberger (18-5) has shown nothing because of the first sore arm of his career. Tom McNulty, uncertain because of an elbow operation which kept him out last year, shows fine stuff. Dave Newkirk, 10-8 from Little Rock, has been around too short a time to show much.

Clearly the caliber of the pitching staff eventually lined up will mean everything in the first division drive, and as clearly nothing is definite yet.

Managing the team is Tommy Heath, a tested campaigner now restored to complete health after a vertebrae fracture suffered in an accidental fall last summer.

Bill Warne Heads F & G Department

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—William E. Warne, 53, veteran of 23 years with the federal government, took over today as head of the California Fish and Game Department.

"I'm still a neophyte," he said at a news conference Wednesday.

But he promised to take a firm hand.

"I have no intention of shaking up the department," he said. "But I understand there is some friction there and I hope to smooth it out."

"I understand this department is one of the best in the nation and I intend to keep it that way."

Warne replaced Seth Gordon, who served seven stormy years as head of the department's 1,000 employees.

The new director faced newsmen with Gov. Edmund G. Brown at his side.

He announced that he will attend a Fish and Game Commission meeting in Los Angeles Friday and then hopes to tour the state, including personal visits to the regional F&G offices. He said he also would visit with conservationists and sportsmen to get their views.

Warne was asked why he turned aside a \$24,000 a year federal job to take the directorship of the Fish and Game Department, which pays \$16,000.

"I wanted to come home," he said. "I'm not a career foreign service man. California is my home and the governor said he had a hard job to do here." Warne has a home in Altadena.

Warne headed the U. S. Foreign Aid Mission in Korea. He was director of foreign aid missions in Iran and Brazil before that.

Warne's appointment must be confirmed by the Senate.

Cincinnati Signs College Phenom

FRESNO (UPI)—The Cincinnati Reds Wednesday signed Jim Maloney, 18, junior college pitching and batting sensation, for a reported \$100,000.

The right-hander left today for Tampa, Fla., to join the Reds in spring practice.

Cincinnati's West Coast scout Bobby Mattick signed Maloney, who had been sought by major league scouts for two years. Maloney was offered \$60,000 last year by one major league team after he batted .500 and led Fresno High School to the league championship while playing shortstop.

Maloney started the school year at the University of California but in midwinter transferred to Fresno City College. He so far this season has pitched 19 consecutive no run, no hit innings.

Coach Jerry Kempf's Sacred Heart team will kick off their season with a starting lineup composed of catcher Bob Amberg, first sacker Mike Brumble, second basemen John Jackson, shortstop George Hurley, third basemen Bill Kruger, Mike Slowsy and Mike Holland.

Left hander Larry Jackson will do most of the hurling chores for the Trojans while brother John, Tom Amberg and Hurley will be ready for duty if needed.

Rounding out Kempf's 16-man squad will be Jerry DeNault, Michael Krok, Jim Novak, Jim Cox, Shan Britton, Doug Kirkpatrick and Rolland Bailey.

Coach Len Weber's Henley Hornets, who lost all six games on their schedule last season, will have starters Gary Beaber, who is the squad's No. 1 pitcher, freshman John Crumrine at catcher, Joe DeGrande at short stop, Ray Jackson at third and Mike Tacchini, Lawrence Lugo, Leroy Briant and Steve McDonald in the outfield. Tom McBride and Dick Reiling are battling over the second base chores while John Roberts, Phil Jameson and Sam Herringshaw are fighting for the first base position.

If needed, DeGrande or McDonald will do the relief pitching for the Hornets.

Out at Bly, coach Al Samples has only five definite starters, pitcher Jerry Patzke, catcher Jim Patzke, second baseman Carson Chase, third baseman Ray Briley and outfielder Tom Petersen.

The remainder of the 16-man squad is made up of mostly inexperienced freshmen and sophomores. Of the 21 boys in the entire school, 17 are out for Samples' diamond crew, including the manager.

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
