

Yankee Pitchers' Actions Speak Louder Than Words

Casey Stengel isn't doing too much talking these days about his New York Yankee pitching staff. He doesn't have to—his action is speaking louder (and possibly clearer) than his words.

With the season getting into full swing a week from today, the World Champions are getting Grade-A performances from all of their expected starters. The only possible leak in the Yankee dike that is expected to hold back the American League contenders is the sudden back injury to first baseman Bill Skowron.

In the last five days, Stengel has gotten top-flight performances from Tom Sturdivant, Bobby Shantz, Art Ditmar, Don Larsen, Bob Turley, Jim Coates and Whitey Ford.

These are the men Stengel expects to use in his starting pitching rotation. The latest line runs like this:

Sturdivant: Pitched seven innings against the Chicago White Sox March 29, allowing two runs and six hits. In 1958, the righty was 3-5 with a 4.18 earned run average.

Shantz: In seven innings against the Cincinnati Reds on March 30, he allowed five hits and no runs. The little lefty was 7-6 last year with a 3.36 ERA.

Ditmar: On March 31 against Kansas City, the right-hander gave nine hits and two runs in eight innings. He had a 3.41 ERA last year, winning nine of 17 decisions.

Larsen: Stricken with a pulled muscle in his pitching shoulder March 15, the big right-hander allowed the St. Louis Cardinals one run on three hits over four innings, April 1. He was 9-6 with a 3.08 earned run average last year.

Turley: Pitched nine innings for the Yankee B squad in a 4-3 decision over Richmond of the International League, also on April 1. The World Series star was Stengel's leading pitcher in '58 with a 21-7 record and a 2.98 ERA.

Coates: Relieved Larsen and pitched one-hit ball for three innings. The rookie has drawn Stengel's praise as the bright light of his young hurlers and will probably stick with the club.

Ford: Went eight innings yesterday, beating the St. Louis Cardinals 2-1, and scattered nine hits. He did not show any signs of arm

trouble, which has plagued him in the past. The little lefty was 14-1 last year with a 2.01 ERA.

In other exhibition games Thursday, the Boston Red Sox won the Cactus League title with a 4-2 victory over San Francisco. The Cleveland Indians knocked off the Chicago Cubs 4-2, and in night games the Philadelphia Phils defeated Baltimore 8-6 and the Chicago White Sox won over Cincinnati 6-5.

Weather Hampers SL Bees

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Salt Lake's Bees open their 1959 Pacific Coast League baseball campaign April 17 in Derks Field here after announcing the name of the young local lovely who will reign as Queen Bee for the season.

The wisest selection for the honorary throne would be a sturdy young thing who could win 20 games and hit 300.

At present the nameless queen, Gen. Mgr. Eddie Leishman and sometimes playing Mgr. Larry Shepard are about the only sure items on the roster.

Poor spring camp weather has slowed picking of the squad.

The Bees meet Vancouver's Mounties in the initial four-game series in the 10,200-seat park here. Leishman, just back from the Bee camp in Jacksonville Beach, Fla., says: "I don't have much of an idea yet who will be on the team."

Indications are the Mounties will face an outfield and infield vaguely similar to the 1958 Bee squad, which finished fifth.

Probable infield returnees are Ken Toothman (.307) at third, Dick Barone (.218) at short, Jim Baumer (.267) at second and possibly Paul Pettit (.267), the biggest question mark of spring camp, at first.

Carlos Bernier (.332), '58 sparkplug, is expected back along with the top wood swinger of last year, Sam Miley (.334), in the outfield. The third spot prospect is newcomer Ernie Goss.

Daryl Westerfield is up from Mexico at the catcher's spot along with newcomer Marcos Cobos.

Around the mound the picture is cloudiest. Right handers Bob Anderson (.137) and Don Urquhart (.151) are sorely needed again and likely to return. Depending on last minute dickerings, Ed Bauta (.7-6), George Perez (.7-4) and Fred Green (.10-8) could be included.

Steel arms and a big cleanup bat are what the Bees appear to need most if they are to be first division contenders.

Bernier and Miley could collect only six and 15 homers respectively last year.

Salt Lake pitchers also produced a rather significant statistic. They had the fewest number of games in which the pitcher went the distance—39.

Perhaps Shepard himself could improve in that area. As a brief reliever last year, he compiled an 0-4 record.

Bob Morrow To Highlight Texas Relays

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Preliminary leading to record potentials in a half dozen events got the Texas Relays off today.

Bobby Morrow, the triple gold medal winner of the Olympic games, was in the spotlight.

Morrow runs tonight against Ira Murchison of Western Michigan, co-holder of the world's record 10.1 in the 100-meter dash.

The special 100 meter also has such sprint stars as Ollan Cassell of Houston, former national AAU 220 - yard champion; Bill Woodhouse, Morrow's erstwhile teammate at Abilene Christian College; Sidney Garton and John West, of East Texas State.

Seventeen championships will be determined tonight with 23 more on the line Saturday afternoon.

The huge track and field carnival has drawn its largest entry—1,285 athletes — and more are likely.

Two relays records could come from preliminaries in field events this afternoon. Bill Alley of Kansas, who last week hurled the javelin 258 feet 4 inches, will after the mark of 252-10 1/2.

Ernie Shelby of Kansas, who already holds the broad jump record of 26 feet 3 1/2 inches, will be trying running and Oklahoma, which set the record of 9:54.4 last year, is back with its team intact.

Reporter Forecasts Eight-Team Stymie

NEW YORK (UPI)—Salutes are in order for Harry Craft of Kansas City and Cookie Lavagetto of Washington—but it's a matter of condolences as well as congratulations.

The man from Washington, as honest as George surprised at the cherry tree with hatchet in hand, admits gamely that his Senators are merely going to filibuster in the American League race this year. Craft intimates that his name is misspelled and that actually he'd be dealing in cheese.

These are the only two of the 16 major league managers who have no first division and-or pennant pretensions during this period where hope springs eternal in the hits, runs and errors camps.

The other 14 all profess to be looking fondly away from the basement and up at the bunt. Meaning that come September — and even earlier in most cases — it's going to be awfully crowded in the big leagues' first division or there will be a bucketful of busted hearts.

Everybody in the National League is talking first division, which calls for either an eight-team tie or some other minor miracle. No less than four managers, and possibly five, figure they could win it all, a situation mathematically impossible.

"Our pitching is good and we'll come up with a replacement at second for Red Schoendienst,"

Over in the American League, Craft announces flatly "don't even class us as contenders," while Lavagetto says he hopes to win 70 games, which would be just about right for last place.
