

All-Stars, Vickers In Tourney Finals

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—The College All-Stars, based on their initial showing, should breeze through the Pan-American Games basketball trials without taking a deep breath.

With Oscar Robertson and jumping Johnny Green showing the way, the collegians turned back the Phillips Oilers, 89-83, Thursday night after the Wichita Vickers rolled to an 89-73 triumph over the Armed Forces All-Stars in the opening games of the round-robin tournament.

In tonight's games, the College All-Stars play the Armed Forces representatives and the Oilers meet the Vickers. The winner of the three-night tournament will place from five to seven men on the U.S. team that will compete in this year's Pan-Am Games at Chicago.

Robertson, everybody's All-America selection from the University of Cincinnati, tossed in 23 points in the collegians' opening victory. However, Green was the night's biggest star as he added 20 points and grabbed 27 rebounds.

All-America Jerry West of West Virginia also was impressive as he totaled 22 points, including a clutch basket with less than three minutes left that broke an 81-81 tie. Louisville's Don Goldstein then pumped in a long jump shot and Kansas State's Bob Boozer scored on a tap-in to sink the Oilers.

The Collegians, although they have been playing together less than a week, displayed remarkable teamwork. And their accuracy was outstanding as they converted 53.7 per cent of their shots from the field.

Seven-foot Don Boldebeck, formerly of the University of Houston, was the big man in the Vickers' triumph over the Armed Forces All-Stars. He scored 24 points on hook shots and tips and stymied the Armed Forces' attack by blocking more than a dozen shots.

The Wichita team was held to a 37-37 tie at halftime and fell behind 50-47 early in the second half. But the AAU champions knotted the score again on a free throw and a hook shot by Boldebeck, then went ahead for good on a basket by Dan Swartz and three more field goals by Boldebeck.

Andre Pronovost, Marcel Bonin, Claude Provost and Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion blasted Chicago goalie Glen Hall for all the Canadiens scoring.

Ted Lindsay, veteran Chicago left wing, tied Maurice Richard's record for playoff appearances. It was his 121st playoff appearance.

The Leafs, whose late season surge carried them into the fourth playoff position on the final day, took charge of the Bruins early in their game and never were headed.

Bert Olmstead opened the scoring at 9:26 of the first period. Dick Duff added another goal in the second and Frank Mahovlich and Bob Pulford contributed to the Toronto cause in the final session.

Johnny Bower, 33-year-old veteran playing in his first Stanley Cup series, had his bid for a shut-out spoiled at 11:25 of the final period when Jerry Toppazzini tallied the lone Chicago goal.

SARASOTA, Fla. (UPI)—The Los Angeles Dodgers, trimmed to 30 players, go against the championship New York Yankees today — Florida weather permitting.

Don Drysdale and Sandy Koufax were tabbed for pitching chores against the Yankees' rookie John Gambler and Zack Monroe.

The Dodgers were rained out of their eighth spring training Grapefruit League exhibition game Thursday when they journeyed to Fort Myers to play the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Stengel Says NY Can't Be Beat

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI)—Don't take too much stock in what rival American League managers are saying about the Yankees—that they can be beaten.

Casey Stengel says they can't. Stengel, who has guided the Yankees to nine pennants in his 10 years as manager, picks Detroit as the club most likely to give his team trouble.

"But what the hell, let's face facts," Stengel said. "We have players on our bench, what the hell we even have players in the minors who would be regulars on any other club but the Yankees."

"They say I've got problems. Well, then who says I should have the same ones. They'd be happy. My problem is to decide which players to keep. We only have major leaguers. The other clubs have to decide what minor leaguers they want to carry."
