

Three Perish In Air Crash

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP)—Three men were killed Thursday evening when an Army helicopter crashed and burned on the sprawling Hanford Atomic Works Reservation 25 miles north of here.

One of the men, Capt. Patrick McDonnell of Vancouver, Wash., and Richland, was a brother of an Air Force sergeant, William A. McDonnell, 25, who died in a similar helicopter crash in the Spokane River at Spokane, Wash., March 22.

The other two killed Thursday were Chief Warrant Officer Leo F. Tuttle, the pilot, of Palouse, Wash., and Maj. Joseph Giuliani of St. Paul, Minn., and Richland.

The Army said the crash occurred while the helicopter was on a routine training flight.

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Castro Plans Cuba Defense

HAVANA (AP)—Prime Minister Fidel Castro says he will be looking for money as well as hosting "Cuba and her revolution" on his visit to the United States later this month.

The bearded revolutionary told a TV audience Thursday night that he will seek loans from the U.S. Export-Import Bank and "all sources of credit possible."

The Batista government left only 70 million dollars in the treasury, Castro said, adding that Cuba's economic situation was further aggravated by falling sugar prices and increased competition from other sugar countries.

Castro is leaving for Washington April 15 on an unofficial visit as the guest of the American Society of Newspaper Editors. He accepted the invitation before becoming prime minister Feb. 2.

Castro said he had no fear of any questions that may be asked him by American newspapermen. The executions of Batista henchmen, totaling between 400 and 500, has come in for considerable criticism in the United States, and Castro said he would explain that to the Americans.

He said he was mystified at some objections to his trip in a private capacity and commented, "I like simple things more than protocol."

Castro has accepted an invitation while in the United States to speak at a luncheon of the Overseas Press Club in New York on April 23.

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Judge Denies Legal Appeal

EUGENE (AP)—Circuit Judge A. T. Goodwin Wednesday turned down a legal appeal and sentenced Walter Robert Fowler, 34, to life in the Oregon State Prison.

Fowler, an escapee from a Folsom Prison work gang in California, was convicted March 18 of the armed robbery of a Eugene grocery store Aug. 11, 1958.

Fowler was convicted one month after the robbery, but the judge set aside the verdict on a technicality. Fowler's attorney contended that a second trial would put his client in double jeopardy.

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Bomb Plant Jails Maltese

VALLETTA, Malta (AP)—Two Maltese—one a steward in the Royal Navy—were charged today with planting a homemade bomb in the 2,000-ton British radar-picket destroyer Broadswold.

Edward Connell, 23, the steward was accused of instigating the bomb plot and George Bonnici, 43, a government laborer, with being his accomplice.

There has been agitation against the British for months in this colony in protest against the Royal Navy turning over its big dockyard to a private firm. The Maltese fear the shipyard will be shut down or curtailed and the island's economy wrecked.

McDonnell was married and the father of four children. Giuliani's widow and five children live here, and Tuttle's widow and two children reside in West Richland, Wash.
