United States Airports Expand For The Jet Age

WASHINGTON (NEA)—U.S. airports are undergoing a gigantic face-lifting program in an effort to meet the streamlined demands of the commercial jet age.

Terminals are expanding, plans for new airports are taking shape and a multitude of time-saving



one example of the many new installations at U.S. airports is the new American Airlines terminal at New York International. U.S. Aid Resettles Red Refugees

SAIGON (NEA)—U.S. dollars and technical know-how are turning a former wasteland into a prosperous agricultural community for hundreds of thousands of refugees from Communist-held North Viet Nam.

The resettlement project is taking place in the delta country of

South Viet Nam known as Ca Mau. Here, in two sections totaling about 400 square miles, more than 400,000 settlers are hard at work expanding the area's two principal businesses—fishing and rice farming.

What's so remarkable about the program to government officials is that just three years ago this now-rich land was as poor as the masses of refugees driven from their homes by the Reds.

Uncolonized since its owners fled the Japanese in World War II, the land was overgrown with tall, wild grass which many people believed would prove impossible to clear away. The area's canals had become clogged with sediment and debris.

As part of its world-wide program to aid underdeveloped countries, Uncle Sam's International Cooperation Administration rushed machines and technicians to Ca Mau.

Ninety tractors worked as long as 16 hours a day uprooting the tough grassy blanket to make the land suitable for rice farming. Workers, including the refugees, started clearing the canals and constructing houses along their banks.

Now the once-desolate area is dotted with homes and stores. Schools and medical dispensaries also have been erected. And the fishing and rice farming enterprises have proved so successful that Ca Mau's residents are starting to supply the products for export.

Funds for the project have come out of the 97 million dollars which Uncle Sam provided from 1954-56 for Viet Nam redevelopment.

people at faster intervals to the country's already overcrowded airports.

Officials of the Federal Aviation Agency estimate that by 1960 the nation's terminals will handle 13,000 passengers every hour. This is an increase of 4,000 over last year's hourly passenger load.

Thus, emphasis in airport improvements is being placed on finding ways to speed passengers through the terminals to and from the planes. A solution, which is already being adopted by some airports, is to separate incoming from outgoing passengers.

One way this is done is by constructing two-story terminal buildings. Passengers who have just landed use one level while those who are getting ready to depart are directed to the other. This system eliminates the confusion and frequent collisions which occur when everyone has to pass through the same part of the terminal.

Plans to end long waiting lines call for increasing the number of check-in and baggage weighing counters and providing special counters for passengers with lengthy, complicated ticket problems.

Doing away with the long walk from the terminal to the plane is another headache that architects are tackling in their future airport designs. Pan American Airways has solved the problem at its new terminal which is under construction at New York's Inter-

national Airport, by simply bringing the plane to the passengers. Planes will be parked next to the building and loaded under its large, overhanging roof. Passengers will board their flight by walking down a special ramp that leads directly from the lounge to the plane's entrance. Another ramp connected from the aircraft to a lower terminal level will handle disembarking passengers.

American Airline's new Idlewild terminal, which is scheduled for completion sometime this year, will employ a similar system.

After checking their luggage at the terminal entrance, passengers will go to several smaller structures attached to the main building to await their planes. When a plane pulls up next to a waiting room, passengers will go through an enclosed ramp which can be lengthened or shortened like a telescope from the side of the building to the aircraft entrance.

The special boarding ramps and waiting rooms will be completely air conditioned and sound proofed to protect passengers from the ear piercing noise of the jet plane's engines.

Officials of the Airport Operators Council estimate that about a billion and a half dollars will be needed to finance airport expansion and improvement programs during the next four years.
