

Susan Peak Is Bride Of Richard Lee Ward

Susan Frances Peak became the bride of Richard Lee Ward Saturday, March 21, in a ceremony performed by the Rev. Robert C. Groves in the First Presbyterian Church.

Baskets of white stock with a touch of yellow and lighted yellow tapers in candelabra formed the background for the double-ring service which was solemnized at 8 o'clock in the evening.

Susan Frances is the only daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Francis William Peak, former Klamath Falls residents recently moved to Harbor. The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond C. Ward, 1569 Leroy Street, of this city.

The bride was given in marriage by her mother and father. Her wedding gown of ivory gossamer silk organza over rayon tulle was fashioned in a lovely princess line. Chantilly lace formed the yoke and outlined the top of the deep front ruffle. The yoke was hand-beaded with seed pearls and iridescent sequins. Scattered bouquets of the lace decorated the court train. A Juliet cap of Chantilly lace, beaded to match the bride's gown, held a fingertip illusion veil. 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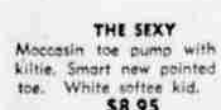
