Mrs. L. L. Lukes next introduced Mrs. W. H. Harness, Shasta district president, who gave several pointers on club work and also announced the convention dates.

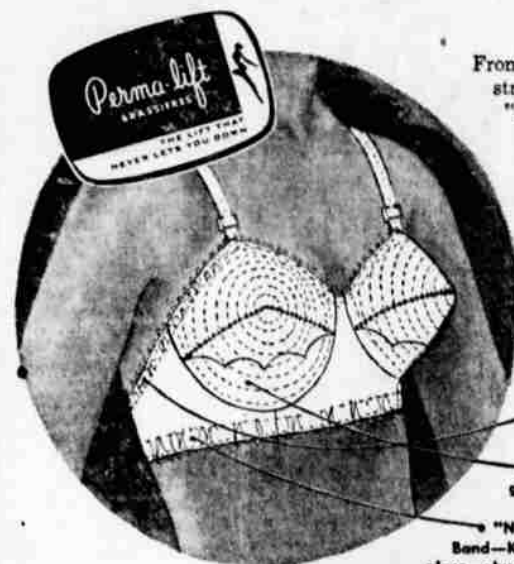
Guest speaker, Mrs. George
