Ram Study Under Way At College

DAVIS—Would ranchers get better range flocks if the rams they used came from the range, rather than from more favorable environments?

That question — whether rams should be raised and selected under the conditions in which their offspring will be kept—is one that animal husbandry men at the University of California at Davis hope to solve in experiments on selection in sheep, according to Ken Baghott, Tulare farm adviser.

G. Eric Bradford, of the department of animal husbandry at Davis, says that two closed flocks of white-face crossbred sheep will be maintained for this experiment, one at Davis and the other at the Hopland Field Station.

"Animals will be exchanged between the two flocks after three or four generations of selection to evaluate the differential effects of selection under the different sets of conditions," Bradford says.

"Results of this experiment should be of interest not only to sheep producers, but also to producers of other livestock, where breeding stock may be exchanged from one environment to a totally different one."

Other current experiments, Bradford says, include a comparison of the cross-breeding system known as "crisscrossing" with the continuous use of one breed of rams, as mating systems for range sheep improvement. Corriedale and Targhee breeds will be used. An evaluation of the relative suitability of the two breeds for North Coast range conditions is also part of the experiment.

Purebred Hampshire, purebred Suffolk, and Hampshire-Suffolk crossbred rams will be supplied as sires of market lambs in another experiment. Crossbred rams are used commonly in California, Bradford says, but there have been no comparisons of the performance of their lambs with lambs from purebred sires of similar breeding.

"Information on the relative merit of these three kinds of rams should make it possible to state either that a more widespread use of the crossbred is indicated, or that the use of such rams is not justified," Bradford says.

The university is also participating in the Western Regional Sheep Breeding Project, which was set up by representatives of the 11 Western states in 1958 to develop more accurate measures of lamb carcass quality to use in selection.

The UC project initially is directed toward finding a measure — or measures — of meat quality that can be used on the live animal, Bradford says. Any promising techniques developed will be tested for accuracy in detecting and developing strains of animals possessing superior meat qualities.

SETTING FOR SALAD

NEW YORK (UPI)—A cottage cheese-gelatin ring makes a tasty setting for turkey salad. A quart-size ring is made by soaking one tablespoon unflavored gelatin in two tablespoons cold water. Dissolve in two tablespoons hot water. Mash two cups small curd cottage cheese with ½ teaspoon salt. Add to gelatin and mix thoroughly. Add one cup diced celery, ½ cup each of chopped California walnuts and well-drained canned crushed pineapple. Pour into ring-mold that has been rinsed with cold water. Chill until set.

LOOK FOR QUALITY

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. (UPI)—Inferior curtain rods and poles may destroy the effect of curtains, a Pennsylvania State University home management specialist warns.

High-quality hardware will outlast many pairs of curtains and make it easier to take them up and down, said Sandra Black.

She suggested that homemakers get fixtures to make curtains and draperies adjustable to size and shape of windows.
