Ashlander Gets Grant

ASHLAND — Angus L. Bowmer, Founder and Producing Director of the Oregon Shakespearean Festival, has been announced as the recipient of a \$10,000 Ford Foundation grant. The award, one of 10 given to American directors, is designed as a stimulus to the creative development of theater. William Ball, former festival actor, was also named.

Details of the award specify \$2500 to be used by Bowmer for the continuation of his studies in Shakespearean staging. This will enable him to visit of Shakespearean production centers in the United States, Canada and the United Kingdom. The remaining \$7,500 is earmarked as additional financial help for the formulation of the 1936-1937 acting companies.

On leave from his teaching duties at Southern Oregon College, Ashland, Bowmer has been in New York interviewing former Festival actors now working elsewhere in professional theaters. With several favorites from previous seasons as a nucleus, and with highly qualified applicants now filling in record numbers, a richly talented company is foreseen for 1936-1937 Oregon's statewide Centennial year.

Bowmer's busy winter schedule has also included an important assignment in the launching of the Centennial. Together with Mrs. Bowmer, he spent some time in Salem where he directed Oregon's 100th birthday party.

Some pretty sharp and prominent students of Klamath Union High School are going to get together Tuesday night for a public panel discussion of subjects that affect young people one way or another.

The students, all seniors, have been invited to speak their pieces by Parents and Patrons of KUHS. They will meet in the high school cafeteria at 8 p.m. for a 45-minute session moderated by James Boyle, then they will answer written questions from the audience for a while.

They were selected for the panel by School Principal Charles C. Carlson and a group of teachers. All are student leaders representative of the clean cut American teen-ager.

Roger Schlickeisen, for instance, is president of the KUHS student body. Judy Cullimore is senior class secretary. Dave Garrison

and Jim Compton are members of the campus International Relations Association. Ronnie Owens has been affiliated with student publications. She is being recommended for several scholarships by teachers and the administration. Carolyn Bullard is editor of the year book, El Rodeo.

Topics planned on are thoughtful, fresh and timely—a departure from juvenile delinquency already so thoroughly hashed over.

The students will dwell on the state of recreation in the area, and how to improve it, schools' curricula and so forth, probably, but they aren't sure yet because in the interest of freshness, rehearsal is being held to a minimum.

That is why James Boyle was selected by the Parents and Patrons to moderate the hour. He has demonstrated his ability to separate the wheat from the chaff in past sessions as a moderator and in his work with the local Toastmasters Club, Parents and Patrons say.
