### House To Mull Utility Bill

SALEM (AP)—The House Taxation Committee had a change of heart Monday and decided to consider the Senate-passed bill to assess utility property at a rate 30 per cent higher than the rate for other classes of property. The committee tabled the bill last week but voted Tuesday to take it off the table. The vote was 5-4. The Senate Taxation Committee has tabled a House bill to add one million dollars a year to income taxes paid by utilities. The utilities are opposed to both bills. The House Committee sent to the floor without recommendation the bill to provide lower tax rates on timber that is cut on a sustained yield basis. Timber assessments now are based on county-wide averages.

### Idaho Town Near Center

McCALL, Idaho (AP)—This central Idaho resort town has just learned it may be near the new geographical center of the United States—now that Alaska and Hawaii are part of the Union. Officials took the news calmly. W. O. Holmes, president of Research Publications, Inc., of San Carlos, Calif., wired city officials Monday he figures the site is near McCall. Later, he told The Associated Press in San Francisco the spot ought to be about 25 miles north of McCall.

"I had hopes it was going to be closer," said McCall's Mayor Art Roberts. "I don't think we could get up any pole or anything this time of year."

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## Blind To Get Encyclopedia

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—The American Printing House for the Blind announced Monday it will publish the first Braille encyclopedia.

Publication of 250 seats of 156 volumes each will be made with a \$115,500 gift from the Field Foundation of New York and Field Enterprise Educational Corp., Chicago.

The encyclopedias will be used by schools and libraries serving the blind in this country and Canada. Stereotyping the special edition of The World Book Encyclopedia is expected to take about two years.

## Four Killed In Headon

KELOWNA, B. C. (AP)—Two automobiles collided head-on near here Monday, killing three women and a seven-month-old baby. A boy and a man were critically injured.

The victims were Mrs. W. B. Brown, Victoria, B.C.; Mrs. Marlene A. Wilson, 25, Milnes Landing, B. C., and her daughter, Erin Marlene, seven months, and Mrs. T. B. Reece, Westbank, B. C.

Hospitalized with critical injuries were Dick Tuul, 12, Sooke, B. C., and T. B. Reece, husband of one of the dead women.

The mishap occurred on a straight stretch of highway and police theorized one of the cars may have blown a tire and veered into the path of the other vehicle.

### WELL COMPLETED

FORT ROCK—One of the new irrigation wells in the Fort Rock Valley was completed and tested last week by Sid Munnerlyn for Charles C. Miles. The new Miles well is 135 feet deep and delivers 1600 gallons per minute. Water stands at 14 feet from the surface, drawing down to 45 feet during pumping.

This is Miles' third well, from which he plans to flood irrigate 60 additional acres. Land preparation will be underway shortly and he expects to have the well in operation for the 1960 season.

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
