

Orioles Top Major Leagues In 1959 Spring Standings

Maybe this is the year the Baltimore Orioles' young movement will pay off — at least with a first division berth.

Picked to finish sixth in the American League race, Paul Richards' upstarts wound up with the best record among all major league teams in the spring exhibition standings.

The training season doesn't officially end until today but the Orioles clinched the combined Grapefruit-Cactus League championship Tuesday by downing the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-3, with the help of a grand-slam homer by Gus Triandos.

The Orioles, who open the American League season Thursday at Washington, completed their spring tuneups with 16 victories in 24 outings for a .667 percentage.

The Los Angeles Dodgers can wind up with the best training record among National League teams by beating the Milwaukee Braves tonight in their final prep at Jacksonville, Fla. They dropped a 5-4 verdict to the Braves in the same city Tuesday night and now have a 12-9 spring record against major league opposition.

Perhaps the biggest flops of the exhibition season were the New York Yankees and the Braves — last year's World Series rivals.

Going into today's final tuneups the Yankees had a 14-12 record and the Braves were stumbling along with a 10-15 mark.

Red Storey Quits Ice As Official

BOSTON (AP) — The National Hockey League was minus its senior referee and had another unhappy arbiter still on the payroll today with Montreal and Toronto set to meet for the Stanley Cup, emblematic of the world's championship.

Red Storey, who has spent nine years as a whistle-blower in the rugged league, quit Tuesday because of criticism from NHL brass. Storey walked out shortly before the Toronto-Boston playoff and was replaced by Eddie Powers.

Several hours after Toronto edged the Bruins 3-2 to gain the championship series against Montreal, Powers backed Storey to the hilt.

"I'm 100 per cent behind Red," Powers told The Associated Press. "Red is 100 per cent right in this deal. The front office has not backed up the officials this year."

Storey, unimpressed by criticism of his officiating in last Saturday's Montreal-Chicago playoff game, resigned and flew home to Montreal.

"I'm sick," Storey said. "This thing is like a three-ring circus and the officials are being made the clowns."

NHL President Clarence Campbell was quoted by an Ottawa writer as saying that Storey "froze" as Montreal edged Chicago 5-4 on a goal with a minute and a half remaining for a berth in the championship round.

The basis apparently was Storey's refusal to call two alleged tripping infractions by Montreal when the score was deadlocked at 4-4.

"No penalty was called for," Storey said. "Both Chicago players deliberately took dives (looking for a Montreal penalty). The ice was so soft that even the officials were falling down."

Campbell called Storey "a good referee" and expressed regrets that he had resigned.

Powers is expected to get the opening assignment for the Toronto-Montreal best-of-seven series starting Thursday on the Canadiens' home ice.

Folley Batters Willi Besmanoff
DENVER (AP) — Third-ranked heavyweight Zora Folley is looking overseas for his next opponent after dusting off Willi Besmanoff in a 10-rounder Tuesday night.

Manager Bill Swift said today he now wants Folley to meet Britain's Henry Cooper, who defeated the Chandler, Ariz., stylist last October.

In the National Boxing Assn. ratings, Folley is listed immediately behind Cooper, second-ranked to No. 1 challenger Ingemar Johansson of Sweden.

Besmanoff, a German-born Milwaukee baker, absorbed everything Folley could throw and wavered only once on his stocky legs. That was in a furious closing attack when Folley tried to floor him in the 10th.

Folley won a unanimous decision from the two judges and referee.

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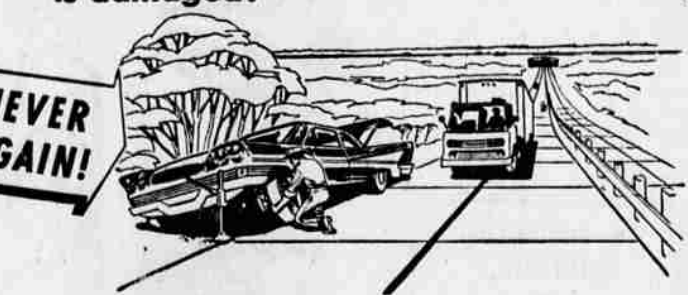
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
