Japan Vessel, Barge Collide

NEW YORK (AP) — A Japanese freighter and a railroad barge collided Wednesday night in the East River. There were no injuries.

The accident tore a 10-foot gash in the port bow of the freighter, the 12,160-ton Shimane Maru. The vessel proceeded to Brooklyn under its own power.

The barge, owned by the New Haven Railroad, carried two freight cars. The damaged barge was towed to Brooklyn.

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Clover Growers Planning Two Important April Jobs

During the month of April there are at least two important jobs which the Klamath County clover growers will want to do.

First of all is insect control. Since the clover weevil has been very active throughout the past few weeks, the time is growing late for control measures. These clover root weevils are mating and laying eggs at this time and the eggs will hatch into larvae which will bore down into the soil. As these larvae of the weevil bore into the soil, they start feeding on the roots of the clover plant. They attack the young feeder roots which go out and obtain nourishment for the plant, and also tunnel and burrow in the tap root on occasion which additionally weakens the plant.

As the root system is progressively reduced on the alsike clover plants, they are weakened and yields are lowered for that season.

Clover root weevils being one of the main problems in production of clover along with fertilization, irrigation and other cultural necessities, it will be an economical practice to control the root weevils whenever they are in sufficient number. Clover root weevils are almost universally scattered throughout the clover growing area of Klamath Basin. Populations in some areas have been increasing year by year.

Good control is still possible with dust of one pound of DDT per acre, or a spray containing one pound of the DDT per acre basis. Good control is also found with heptachlor or dieldrin when applied as a dust or a spray. These materials, being more effective per unit, are applied at a lower rate, usually $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ pound of the pure chemical per acre, either in dust or spray form.

Weed control is a constant and increasing problem in alsike clover. Certain things can be done

for the control of certain weeds in these clover crops.

Butyric acid of 2-4-D has been found to be effective on sourdock or curly dock in alsike. It is quite necessary that this butyric acid be applied fairly early in the growing stage of the alsike clover. The recommendation is early part of April in normal season, so that the butyric acid 2-4-D will be even less effective on the clover and more effective on the young dock. Sourdock should be sprayed at the stage called rosette, and before any center stock starts to bolt or shoot up. Butyric acid applied at the rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ pound of apparent acid per acre will effectively reduce the sourdock to a minimum problem.

While butyric acid is effective against sourdock, it does not seem to be as effective against certain other broad leaf weeds. Many of the broad leaf annuals and biennial weeds in alsike clover can be removed safely with MCP, another type of 2-4-D, also called Metoxone. Metoxone on the other hand is not as effective against the control of sourdock. MCP also is applied at about one-half to three-fourths of a pound per acre. This type of 2-4-D also is quite safe to use in legumes, such as alsike clover. This material, too, should be applied early in the growing season, preferably in the early part of April.

In the few fields where vetch is a problem in alsike clover, it has been controlled effectively with the use of amine 2-4-D. Amine 2-4-D should not be used in excess of one-half pound per acre

"I knew he would kill somebody if he kept it up," she said. "I'm sorry for him, but it was better he should go to jail for a holdup than for murder."

Colgan was arrested at his home Sunday night. He told police he spent \$251 taken in the holdups on household debts.
