New York Trades With A's

The New York Yankees trade of rookie pitcher Mark Freeman to the Kansas City Athletics highlighted a last-minute flurry of player changes by major league baseball clubs today in moves to get set for the start of the season.

Freeman, 23-year-old righthander who had a 13-10 record last season for Denver of the American Association, went to the A's in exchange for pitcher Jack Urban, who was promptly reassigned to the Yankees' Richmond farm club in the International League.

Urban, a 30-year-old righthander who was sold by the Yankees to the A's almost exactly two years ago, had an 8-11 record for the A's last year.

In other moves:
The Los Angeles Dodgers got

down to the 23-player limit by optioning pitcher Fred Kipp to St. Paul of the American Association and pitcher Bill Harris to Montreal of the International League; and the Philadelphia Phils purchased lefty pitcher Chris Short from their Williamsport farm of the Eastern League.

Bob Pettit of the St. Louis Hawks holds six National Basketball Assn. scoring records: most points scored (2105), highest average (29.2), most field goals scored (719), most free throws attempted (379), most free throws scored (667) and most 50-point games in a season (3).

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Rossi Battles Ryff Tonight

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP)—Paolo Rossi, who boasts a punishing left hook, goes against comeback-bound Frankie Ryff in a 10-round lightweight fight tonight in the War Memorial Auditorium.

The 30-year-old Rossi, ranked fourth, was favored to whip Ryff in the nationally televised bout (NBC) at 10 p.m.

Ryff, 26, once gave up the game but returned to the ring in 1958 when Barney Ross, former lightweight and middleweight king, became his manager.

The flame-throwing pitcher served most of his major league time at Detroit, entered the record books with two no-hit games in 1952, and stretched it out with St. Louis, Chicago and Kansas City before being released by the Yankees after a 2-2 season last year and an unproductive spring.

Nixon fought against reading the handwriting on the wall. But while the heart was willing the arm was weak. He was only 1-7 last season and, after nine years in Boston livery, they gave him his ticket to nowhere.

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
