Senate Okays Welfare Bill

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Senate completed legislative action Thursday on a \$1,200,000 emergency appropriation to help the Public Welfare Commission finish the final three months of the biennium, which ends June 30. The Senate unanimously approved the bill to force the commission to trim welfare benefits in May and June. The commission asked for \$1,900,000. There has been criticism of the Joint Ways and Means Committee for cutting the request. Sen. Jean Lewis (D-Portland), a member of the committee, told the Senate "We don't need to defend our actions on this floor." She said that the Joint Ways and Means Committee has been as fair as it could to both the taxpayers and to the welfare recipients. But Sen. Robert Straub (D-Eugene) said the appropriation was too small and that he hopes the Ways and Means Committee will approve a bill to restore the other \$700,000 of the request. This is very unlikely.

Straub said this would cause a severe hardship to welfare recipients.

OST Bill Revitalized

SALEM (AP)—The daylight saving time bill came back to life today in the Oregon Legislature. Sen. Boyd Overhulse (D-Madras, chairman of the State and Federal Affairs Committee, said his group would reconsider its action of tabling the bill last Friday. He predicted the committee will either recommend defeat of the bill or pass it out without recommendation. The bill calls for a statewide vote on daylight time. This means the Senate will get a chance to vote on it, instead of letting it die in the committee. The committee vote on tabling the bill was 4-2. Opponents of the bill said they would change their minds so that the Senate could vote.

The Senate averted an electric power battle when it voted 15-13 to send back to the Taxation Committee the bill to let directors of peoples utility districts issue revenue bonds. The bill is opposed by the private power companies. The Senate appears about evenly divided on the question.

Malin Pupil Wins Prize

James Patrick Madden of Malin, a senior in agricultural economics at Oregon State College, has been named winner of a \$500 national scholarship and a \$2500 Iowa State College graduate fellowship for advanced study next year.

Announcement of both awards came this week.

The \$500 scholarship is one of four offered annually by Alpha Zeta fraternity, national agricultural honorary, to encourage outstanding college graduates to continue their education. Twenty-six scholarship candidates were nominated this year from the various sections of the country.

The \$2500 fellowship is one of the top grants given each year by Iowa State to graduate students. Madden will begin his graduate work there this fall, specializing in economic development and production economics.

Madden has made an outstanding record at Oregon State College. He was named outstanding junior man last year on campus, based on scholarship, leadership, and campus contributions. He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, national scholastic honorary; was awarded a Mothers Club tuition scholarship as a freshman and has won four of the top student awards in agriculture.

Throughout his college career, Madden has worked as a part-time student assistant in the department of agricultural economics. The last three years, his work has been a part of the student trainee program offered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. He has assisted with the research project on farm forestry. Madden, 21, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Madden Malin. He is a graduate of Malin High School. He is married with one child.

Lloyd Wright Burial Slated

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI)—The body of Frank Lloyd Wright will be returned Saturday to the Wisconsin hilly farm country where the world-famed architect was born 89 years ago.

Wright, the storm-center and guiding light of modern architecture, died in the pre-dawn hours Thursday at St. Joseph's Hospital where he had undergone abdominal surgery Monday.

The white-haired, "rebellious old gentleman" who fought the conventions of society, will be buried in the hillside Chapel Cemetery at Spring Green, Wis.

A few friends and members of the family joined with the famed architect's widow, Olgivanna, his third wife, Thursday night to pay last respects at Taliesin West on the outskirts of Phoenix where his body lay in state. Taliesin West was Wright's winter home.
