SPRING FAIR
LAKEVIEW—About 230 boys and girls from all parts of Lake County will take part in the second annual 4-H Spring Fair at Lakeview, April 14 to April 18, states Al Haslebach, Lake County extension agent. All events of the spring fair will be held in the memorial hall of the courthouse, except for the style revue and are open to the general public.

The nearly 300 exhibits on display will open to the public on Friday and Saturday, April 17 and 18, and will include project displays in cooking, sewing, knitting, child care, electricity, wood-working, ceramics and leather-craft. Other events open to the public include the baking and sewing contests on Friday and the demonstrations and style revue on Saturday. The revue will be the last event of the fair and will begin at 3:30 p.m. at the Marius Theater.

Four-H members are to bring their exhibits to the memorial hall anytime between 1 and 6 p.m. on April 14 and are reminded that the exhibits are to be in place by 6 p.m. on that date. The exhibits are then judged behind closed doors on Wednesday and Thursday and are on display the rest of the week. All exhibits must have an exhibit entry card attached before they will be accepted. These are available from 4-H club leaders.

Club leaders are asked to turn in to the 4-H office that part of the exhibit entry card that they sign, after checking over the members records to be sure that they are up to date. These cards should be in by 5 p.m. April 10, to allow time to make out the clerk's judging sheets and other necessary.
