Lad Uncovers Old Fossil

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP)—If Jimmy Steckley's dog Perk likes bones as well as most dogs do, he should have stuck closer to his young master.
Jimmy, 13, an eighth-grader, was looking for Perk Thursday when he stumbled on what appeared to be the bones of a mammoth, a prehistoric ancestor of the elephant.
Jimmy summoned his science teacher, Carl G. Zwerk, and some friends. They started digging.
By nightfall, they had uncovered a leg bone, a pelvis, a skull, some teeth and some vertebrae.
Zwerk estimated the fossil's age at between 20,000 and 30,000 years. Jimmy never did find Perk.

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Donations Told By Liquor Group

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Liquor Control Commission contributed \$3,207,500 to the state general fund for the quarter ending March 31.
Commission Chairman Hugh Kirkpatrick said the quarterly distribution from liquor sales also provided \$350,000 for incorporated cities, \$171,500 for counties and \$1,000 for the state census fund.
This distribution brings to \$23,089,651 the amount paid into the various funds since the start of the current biennium July 1, 1957.

Residence Area Ceded To Dogs

WEST MEMPHIS, Ark. (AP)—Eight scattered residential blocks were turned over to the dogs by postmen who said they have been bitten once too often.
The postmen — four of them — cited a federal postal regulation which says that they cannot be required to deliver mail where dogs are a threat.
Postmaster Donald Hall said Thursday that all of the city's nine postmen have been bitten at least once in the past year.

Farm Exports Show Decline

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Agriculture Department said today U. S. farm exports last year totaled \$3,856,000,000, 14 per cent below the record 1957 figure of \$4,505,000,000.
More than half the drop was caused by a decrease in cotton exports. Exports of wheat, rice, livestock products, vegetable oils and oilseeds also declined. Increases occurred in feed grains, fruits and vegetables. Tobacco exports were practically unchanged.
