

P-A Game's Box Office Open June 1

CHICAGO (AP)—The Pan American Games box office opens June 1, and Chicago is preparing for a rush.

Now that Congress has provided a half-million dollars to bring Latin American athletes to Chicago, the third Pan American Games has leaped its highest hurdle.

The money will be used to fly the athletes to Chicago and pay for their food and lodging.

"We feel that the development makes it very certain that the games here Aug. 27 to Sept. 7 will be the largest international sports assembly in the western hemisphere," said Al Herman, director of games.

"It appears to us that we will have at least 2,000 participants at the games."

The games will have 25 categories and possibly 28. There are 25 countries eligible but no athletes have yet signed in. The deadline for nations to enter athletes is July 28. At the moment Canada has 175; Argentina has 148; Costa Rica 64; El Salvador, 29; Panama 17; the West Indies Federation 45 and the United States 397.

Soldier Field will handle the main events in track and field.

Three other facilities are under construction.

A 250-meter velodrome for bicycle events is being built by the Chicago Park District at Gately Stadium on the city's South Side.

The park district is building in Portage Park a 50-meter swimming pool and an adjacent diving pool with accommodations for 7,500 spectators.

A rifle and pistol shooting range is being built fronting Lake Michigan at Waukegan, Ill.

First arrivals are expected at the University of Chicago Housing Center Aug. 17.

Hurt Filly Becomes Favorite

NEW YORK (UPI)—The little filly limping through the pasture in Kentucky was a pitiful sight and there was little hope she ever would race. Apparently a strange mare had kicked her in the right hip.

But three years later that same filly was made winter book favorite for the 85th Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs next May 2.

Cornelius V. Whitney, her owner, is determined that she get her chance in America's greatest racing spectacle, although he also has nominated her for the Kentucky Oaks to be run the day before the Derby. He will delay his final decision as long as possible.

Whitney tried to name the filly Silver Star for she is a daughter of Citation out of Silver Fog, one of his best broodmares. The name was not available and eventually the filly was called Silver Spoon.

She no longer is little although there still are signs of the limp she had on her owner's farm near Lexington where she was foaled on March 6, 1956. Silver Spoon has grown into a husky filly, robust enough to beat colts, a feat beyond the ability of most of her sex.

Silver Spoon, who boasts a perfect record of six wins in six races, easily handled the best colts in the West in the Santa Anita Derby, the victory which made her favorite for the Rose Run.

Only one filly ever has won the Kentucky Derby although 29 have tried. Regret scored by two lengths in 1915 as favorite for Harry Payne Whitney, the father of the man who hopes to send out the second filly Derby winner.

During the Santa Anita meeting, with her limp slowly disappearing, Silver Spoon won the La Centinela, the Santa Ynez and the Santa Susana Stakes from members of her own sex.

Then she took on the colts in the Santa Anita Derby and a pranced home by two and one-half lengths. Her 1:49 clocking was only one-fifth of a second off the Santa Anita Derby record shared by Your Host and Determined.

Silver Spoon's style of running resembles Citation's, according to observers. His ground-eating stride and effortless speed were a thing of beauty. It carried "Big Cy" to a three and one-half length victory in the Kentucky Derby of 1948.

'The Barber' Steps Down, In New Job

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Time caught up with Sal Maglie Monday.

The 42-year-old right-hander, who stillled enemy bats with a snapping variety of curve balls, took a job with the St. Louis Cardinals as a pitching instructor for their minor league clubs. The Cards recently had asked waivers on Maglie in order to hand him his unconditional release.

But the front office brass figures Sal is a treasure trove of pitching knowledge—invaluable to fledgling hurlers.

Maglie's first chore was to travel by train—he doesn't trust airplanes—to Albany, Ga., where the Cards have their minor league headquarters. From there Maglie will wander about in nomad fashion, helping out wherever he's needed.

As he packed in his hotel room, Sal seemed in good spirits. He said his new job was "the best thing for me."

"I like to work with kids and I think I can teach them a lot," he added.

But even as he was leaving he was thinking of returning to baseball's big time.

"I'm going to stay in shape," he promised, "and maybe I can help some club in July or August."

These words came with the same determination that Sal showed on the mound in nine seasons in the American and National leagues with the Giants, Dodgers, Cleveland and New York Yankees.

In those years he notched 119 victories while losing only 62, a percentage of .457. Only Whitey Ford of the Yankees—among active pitchers—has done better.

Ford has a phenomenal .724 career mark.

Maglie, dubbed "The Barber" for habitually shaving dug-in batters with pitches, broke into the big leagues in 1945 with the Giants.

For the next four years, he toiled in the outland Mexican League, perfecting his various curve balls and learning the refinements of his trade from Adolphe Laque, former pitching great with the Reds and Giants.

His best game? He gave top priority to a contest in 1956 when he threw a late season no-hitter against Philadelphia to help the Dodgers win the pennant.

That was typical Maglie—he liked the pressure of the big game.

Alonzo Johnson Appears Comer

NEW YORK (AP)—Alonzo Johnson, an outstanding heavy-weight prospect, had a winning streak of 11 today and a good chance of getting a crack at a ranking fighter in a television bout.

"He looks like a real comer," said Harry Markson, general manager of boxing for Madison Square Garden. "I'm going to try and match him with one of the top 10 fighters."

Markson was scouting talent for the Friday night network TV fight program.

Johnson, a 6-foot, 187½-pounder from Pittsburgh, racked up No. 11 by gaining a split decision over Billy Hunter, 6-3, 192-pounder from Detroit, at St. Nicholas Arena Monday night.

Unbeaten in two years, Johnson now has a 14-1 record. Hunter's record now is 12-6-1.

SF Fans Optimism Soaring

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Three games don't make a season—but from the optimism in San Francisco, it appears the fans believe that the Giants have to win only a couple more to capture the 1959 National League pennant.

True, San Francisco slaughtered the St. Louis Cardinals in the opening series of the season. But the Cards definitely aren't the strongest club in the league.

As a matter of fact, the Giants play second division clubs through the first 17 games. Of these they should win at least three out of four to build up for what may come after. They play St. Louis, Chicago, Los Angeles, and then Philadelphia before they run into a heap big trouble.

Two games are slated with favored Pittsburgh, then three against the Braves at Milwaukee. After that there will be a better line on what Mays, Cepeda and Co. will do this year.

"Sure, we won against St. Louis," says Manager Bill Rigney, "but we didn't play well enough to win against the pennant contenders."

Nine errors in three days is "way above par. Of course, some of these were blamed on the cold weather."

One thing the Giants already have done—they have made a believer out of Manager Solly Hemus of the Cards.

"This club has a lot of punch and the pitching is sharp," said Hemus after his team was routed. "And their defense is good—even if they did make a lot of errors against us. They could win the pennant."

Some seasoned baseball observers believe that the coaching, so far, leaves something to be desired. The Giants lost a run the other day when an over-cautious coach, Salty Parker, held Darryl Spencer at third base. And they sort of loused things up on another day when Willie Mays was on first and Mike McCormick on third. Mays decided to steal second and McCormick was caught as he tried to come home.

"It's my fault," says Rigney. "I called the play. I had a hunch they would throw the ball away—but they didn't."

Rigney is convinced that Andre Rodgers, the ex-cricketer player from the Bahamas, will make the grade as a major league shortstop.

The lad has been having a tough go of it fielding, but he has a powerful arm.

"His trouble is that he doesn't charge the balls," says Rigney. "He lets the ball play him."

But even with the Giants' weaknesses, San Francisco fans are attempting to convince the players they can win the championship.

And that's what they call positive thinking.

Ortiz Registers TKO In Sixth

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Carlos Ortiz is talking of a lightweight title bout after showing unexpected power in a sixth-round technical knockout of Len Matthews.

"I could have beaten the champ (Joe Brown) the way I felt," Ortiz said after Monday night's decisive win. "First I have to meet Willie Toweel in London and then I hope to get Brown."

Ortiz, the second-ranking contender, certainly did nothing to hurt his title chances.

Matthews, unranked but supposedly the superior hitter, landed some of his best punches. Ortiz neither flinched nor appeared shaken.

Ortiz, the little Puerto Rican from New York, led the Philadelphia all the way. There were no knockdowns.

Ortiz, at 136, had a one-pound weight advantage.

Eddie Arcaro Picks Ride: First Landing

NEW YORK (AP)—Eddie Arcaro is sticking by his original decision. He'll bid for his sixth Kentucky Derby victory May 2 with First Landing.

The veteran jockey made that plain today after the 2-year old champ of 1958 had jumped back into the Derby picture with a sizzling six-furlong performance at Jamaica Monday.

"I'll ride First Landing in the Wood Memorial Saturday and that means I'll also be up on him in the Derby," said the 43-year-old jockey who has won more Kentucky Derbies than any other rider.

Arcaro could have selected the Elkcam Stable's Atoll, with whom he won the Swift Stakes and last Saturday's Gotham with a three-quarter length decision over highly regarded Intentionally.
