Tutor Writes Child's Tale

DUNSMUIR — An adaptation of "The Little Red Hen," authored by Nina Barr, Dunsmuir Elementary School teacher, and designed for beginning readers was published last month.

Mrs. Barr states she has long recognized the need of stimulating story material for young readers with a limited reading vocabulary. She had several such books authored by herself in her first grade room at the Dunsmuir school but "The Little Red Hen" is her first publishing venture.

Her books are either original stories or adaptations and they provide supplementary reading material for the children just beginning to explore the field of literature. She says too often in her teaching experience she has seen children become discouraged with story book texts with too difficult a vocabulary.

The success of "The Little Red Hen" will determine whether or not she will seek to get more of her work into print and distribution, Mrs. Barr says. The book is being published by Comet Press of New York City and will be available through book stores. It is cleverly illustrated and has a specially designed book cover.

Mrs. Barr has taught first grade in Dunsmuir since 1951. For several years she also taught choral classes and in the past few years has taken up drawing and painting. She received her degree from Fresno State College and has done graduate work at Chico State.

10 Feared Dead; Wreckage Found

TOKYO (AP) — A ground party today reached the wreckage of a U.S. Navy seaplane that disappeared April 9 and reported all 10 men aboard apparently were killed.

The wreckage was sighted Saturday on a mountain on Cheju Island, off the southern tip of South Korea. The plane had disappeared on a training flight from Japan to South Korea.

Ex-Judge's Death Told

ALTURAS — Reuel A. Laird, 76, a municipal judge and a United States commissioner in Alturas for years until his retirement about four years ago, died Saturday morning, April 11, in a convalescent hospital in Sacramento where he had been confined for three years. Funeral services were conducted in the East Lawn Cemetery Chapel under the auspices of the Masonic Fraternity. Entombment followed the rites.

He was for years active in Republican party affairs in Modoc County and a member of various lodges in Alturas and Sacramento. At one time he was chairman of the Republican Central Committee in Modoc County.

Laird served as municipal judge in Alturas from 1932 until his retirement. He was commissioned a United States commissioner in 1935. He was mayor of Alturas from 1918 until 1926 and was district attorney of Modoc County from 1919 until 1928.

He was born in Alturas to the late James T. and Sarah Lauer Laird, who were also natives of Alturas.

Upon graduation from the University of California in Berkeley and of Hastings School of Law in San Francisco, Laird returned to Alturas where he entered into the practice of law and active partnership with his brother in the Laird Pharmacy.

He was a past master and 50 year member of the Alturas Lodge No. 248 of Free and Accepted Masons in Alturas and a past patron of Chapter No. 51 of the Order of Eastern Star in the same city.

Laird was a knight commander of the Court of Honor of Sacramento Scottish Rite Bodies and a member of the Ben Ali Temple of the Shrine in Sacramento.

He was a past president of the Alturas Rotary Club, member of the Native Sons of the Golden West in Alturas and a past president of the Modoc County Bar Association.

He is survived by the widow, Della; two sisters, Mrs. Martin Kenfield and Fannie Laird, both of San Francisco; and a brother, James R. Laird of Alturas.
