Suit Filed By Countess

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Juliette Mas de Ayala, a Uruguayan countess, has filed suit against an unwanted suitor.

She asked in Superior Court for \$250,000 in damages and an injunction to discourage the overtures of Fred David De Gorter, an actor's agent.

The countess, daughter of a Uruguayan general, said De Gorter broke into her home last August, forcing her to call police. She has since moved five times, she said, but he found her every time. She charged he has hit her, broken furniture and thrown flower pots and dishes at her.

Last month, she said, he and two other men broke into her home and compelled her to swallow two pills and drink whisky. This made her so sick, she said, she had to go to a hospital.

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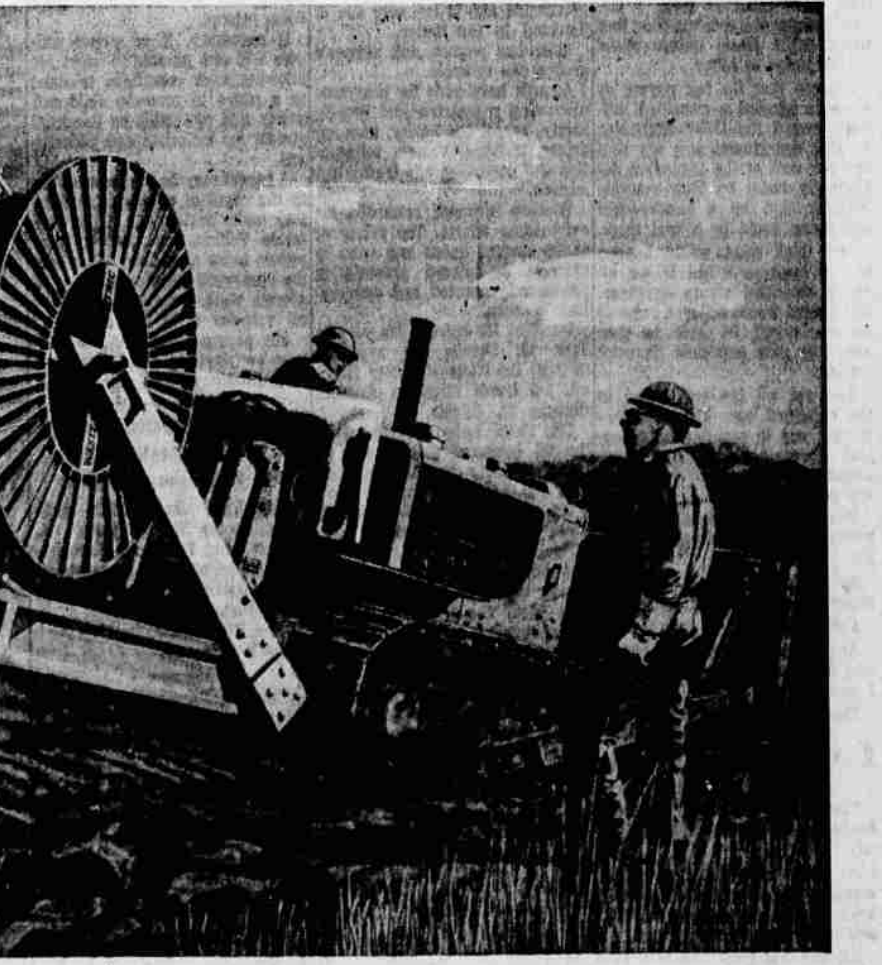
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
