 Research is a word implying, these days, work by white-smocked mental giants who use language like "metamorphosis" and "quantum equations."  
 But the reference department of the Klamath County Library carries a wide list of research reference books that anyone who can read might find of value in some respect.  
 Research, actually, is what anyone does who wants to find out something he doesn't know.  
 In this county library department a person can find out all about Oregon history or how to grow a potato.  
 There are banks of books on how to choose a career and directories to colleges and universities. There are encyclopedias of horticulture, agriculture, gardening, music and many others.  
 There are the Thomas Registers of American Manufacturers, listing names, addresses, special-

ties and all about the companies. The library owns a complete set of Bancroft's historical works, compiled by the Bancroft Library at the University of California. Dozens of other rare histories, including local histories, supplement the Bancroft series.  
 There are books of quotations, a rundown on the old Headle and Adams nickle and dime novel and songbook series, law books, how-to-do-it books for auto mechanics, radio hams, farmers.  
 Telephone directories for nearly every major city in the nation are on file. If the reference department does not contain a known fact, it will show where to find it. In addition to the books available to the public in the reference

department, the library owns several very rare histories that are currently on display in the reading room to commemorate National Library Week now in progress. Only highly qualified persons may use them.  
 The county library also has an outstanding collection of periodicals and newspapers. Copies of the Herald and News go clear back to 1896. Series of popular magazines—130 of them—contain all issues back as far as the early 1920's in some instances.  
 The library has, for instance, nearly every issue of Life magazine published. A few other collections are of Harper's, Atlantic Monthly, Popular Mechanics, and National Geographic.

### The Fate Of Mrs. Nicholas In Hands Of 12 Husbands

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—A jury of 12 husbands will begin deliberations today on the fate of divorcee Connie Nicholas, accused of murdering her wealthy married lover after he flitted her for a younger woman.  
 The three attorneys defending the 45-year-old, twice-divorced secretary have tried to convince the jury the killing of Forrest Teel, 54, could have occurred either accidentally or in self-defense.  
 Prosecutor Phillip L. Bayt and two trial deputies contend they have proved, through circumstantial evidence, that Mrs. Nicholas planned the shooting.  
 Neither side has questioned the main facts—that Teel, a high executive of a big drug firm, was shot to death in his car last July 31 after an evening in the apartment of Laura Mowrer, his new friend, and that Mrs. Nicholas held the gun.  
 But the defense contends, and Mrs. Nicholas testified, that her tiny .25-caliber French revolver fired when Teel seized and wrenched her arm after she threatened to shoot herself.  
 Three shots struck Teel's body and a fourth pierced the inside of the car. Mrs. Nicholas testified she knew of only one shot and didn't think Teel had been hit.  
 After the shooting she drove her own car to a secluded creek bank and swallowed 75 sleeping pills mixed in fruit juice. She was near death when found nearly 20 hours later.  
 By presenting the double possibility the shooting could have been either accidental or in self-defense, Mrs. Nicholas' attorneys hoped to create enough "reasonable doubt" in the jurors' minds to bring an acquittal.  
 Bayt and his staff contend the premeditation and intent necessary to warrant a first-degree murder conviction are demonstrated by her purchase of the gun, her carrying it loaded and with seven extra cartridges in her purse when she went to wait for Teel, and the firing of four shots.

The first-degree murder charge carries either death or life imprisonment, at the recommendation of the jury.  
 Judge Thomas J. Faulconer's jury instructions said the defendant could be convicted either of first-degree murder, second-degree murder or manslaughter.

### Actress Tells Home Expense

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Movie star Hedy Lamarr's bookkeeper listed the actress' monthly household expenses at \$5,527 Tuesday and told the court that sum represented a standard of living lower than that to which she was accustomed.  
 Medical expenses alone, accountant William Stein testified, currently average \$1,000. Her telephone bill takes out a \$500 hunk.  
 Miss Lamarr seeks \$7,500 monthly temporary alimony from Houstonian W. Howard Lee, who met her at a horse show here in 1951 and married her in New York in 1953.  
 The hearing topped off three months of suits and counteractions which stemmed from a separation agreement signed by Lee and Miss Lamarr in Los Angeles last August. It provided her with an income of \$3,000 a month or half of his income, whichever was larger.  
 Miss Lamarr filed suit Jan. 21, claiming he failed to live up to the agreement and asking \$51,000 damages. He filed for divorce a few weeks later, followed by the actress' counter-suit.

### Blonde Jailed For Murder

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (AP)—A beautiful blonde typist was jailed in a murder investigation today, accused of pumping 18 bullets into the body of a gardener to satisfy an urge for a human target.  
 Sheriff Earl B. Whitmore quoted Rosemarie Diane Bjorkland, 18, as saying:  
 "I had a terrible urge to kill someone ever since I started target shooting as a hobby. I wanted a human target."  
 August Norry, 28, a golf course gardener, was found dead in the hills south of San Francisco on Feb. 1.  
 It was his custom to go there to dump grass cuttings and garden debris.  
 His body had been riddled by 18 bullets.  
 Sheriff Whitmore said Miss Bjorkland related she had met Norry twice before, as she was shooting at targets, while he emptied his gardening bags.  
 Whitmore again quoted the girl:  
 "I used to go up there and point my pistol at a target pretending it was a human being. Mr. Norry on that day was my target."  
 "Suddenly I had the overpowering urge to shoot him. I kept shooting, emptying my gun and reloading. That was the only reason. There was no other."

### Dates For Exam To Be Announced

The U.S. Civil Service Commission plans soon to announce dates for teletypists' and business machine operators' examinations to fill positions in Washington, D.C., and in overseas areas.  
 The jobs pay \$3,495 and \$3,755 annually for teletypists, and from \$3,255 to \$3,755 for machine operators.  
 Applicants must pass a written test and they must have had some previous experience in the category for which they apply.  
 Applications may be sent to, and further information may be received from, the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, 25. Application forms are available at most post offices and from the Commission office.
