



Measure Offered In Senate May Aid Satellite Nations

WASHINGTON (AP)—American economic aid could be used to help satellite nations loosen Moscow's control, under a bill offered in the Senate today.

Present law forbids aid to any nation controlled or dominated by Communists. Under the bill, such assistance would be barred only to the Soviet Union, Red China and Communist North Korea.

President Eisenhower would be given discretionary authority to provide aid to other Communist nations if he finds it would promote U.S. security. This could be done under any of several provisions which in general would mean less Soviet or Chinese control of satellites.

The measure, as an amendment

to the foreign aid bill, was defeated 43-42 in the Senate last year. It was offered as a separate bill today by Sens. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) and George D. Aiken (R-Vt.).

In a speech prepared for Senate delivery, Kennedy declared that "the administration is now prepared to give the present bill its full support."

If the bill is passed, Kennedy said, "there is a real opportunity for giving our foreign policy a flexibility which might exploit cracks in the Iron Curtain."

At present, Kennedy said, probably only Poland would benefit from the relaxation, "but who can predict, in view of the outbreaks of the past few years in East Germany, Hungary, Poland and Yugoslavia, what the next few years will bring?"

Sen. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire, chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, said he will oppose the bill this year as he did last year.

"I am against any aid to Communist government," Bridges told a reporter. "I don't believe we should provide aid to any government that the Soviet Union is in a position to drain off."

Aiken said if the President is able to hold out hope to subjugated people "it may encourage them to get out from under Communist control."

Sen. Allen J. Ellender (D-La.) called the bill "a move in the right direction."

Math Tutors Present Plan For Revamp

Members of the Klamath Union High School mathematics department presented to the boards of directors of the City High School District a plan to drastically reorganize the school's mathematics department at a meeting in the high school cafeteria Monday night.

Instructor Howard Bailey told the assembly the mathematics department is convinced many able math students are being diverted from math or science careers because of antiquated teaching methods.

Key link in the new chain of progressive courses would be general mathematics. The course would be revamped to include more than a mere rehash of arithmetic students have received through eight grades of elementary school. "We're losing students through boredom," Bailey said.

It would include a touch of algebra, slide rule operation, logarithms and statistics as a means of acquainting students with higher mathematics and to lure them upward.

Incoming freshmen would be channeled into one of three first-year math groupings. About 40 per cent, top math students, would be advised to take elementary algebra, another 40 per cent would take the newly outlined general math course. The estimated remaining 20 per cent would take a basic arithmetic either during the first or second year of high school.

The setup features versatility of choice. Students would be able to branch into just about any math course they or their advisers would choose. It would also offer higher and more varied courses.

Bailey said no additional teachers would be needed to handle the expanded program, probably, but teacher-load would increase.

First year math courses would be decided by results of entrance tests and by pupils' eighth grade math records.

Funders Find New Tools

Members of the Klamath County United Fund have found a couple of new tools to use in their forthcoming 1960 funds campaign.

Rex Dye, executive secretary who recently attended the Western Conference of Community Chests, United Funds and Councils, in Vancouver, B.C., told members positive thinking and modern sales techniques ought to be employed in the drive. He made the statement at a meeting of the UF board of directors Monday.

Positive thinking is needed to combat selling apathy generated in the UF organization by competition from other health agencies who subscribe funds independently, Dye suggested.

"We have the advantage of good planning that comes from federation," Dye announced. He added that the positive approach combined with thoughtful selling techniques should yield more funds than ever.

Campaign Chairman Paul Cruikshank and his associates, Thayne Cole and Jim Montelith, reported that the Campaign Committee has met with heads of local agencies who are UF recipients.

Frank Gapon, chairman of the budget committee, set budget conferences with agency personnel for the first week in June. The 1960 goal will be decided from these conferences.

Charles Bailey was elected to replace Deb Addison as chairman of the Nominating Committee. Addison declined the post.

Leo Molatore, treasurer, said \$99,506 of the \$125,499 pledged in Klamath County for 1959 has been collected.

The program, which costs \$1 a copy, is being sold by Girl Scouts in the Portland area and by newsstands elsewhere in the state. It was prepared by the Portland advertising firm, Clenaghan and Mount.

THEY FIND A WAY

Voted to offer foreign exhibitors up to \$1,000 if they would keep their International Trade Fair exhibits in place for the full 100 days of the Centennial Exposition.

Appropriated \$3,000 to the Ashland Public Library for its Shakespearean collection.
