KF Firemen Check Houses

Uniformed city firemen, working in pairs, are offering their services on a house-to-house basis to check the premises for possible fire hazards, according to Fire Chief Roy Rowe.

The service to householders is without charge and no citations are issued if hazardous conditions are found. A check sheet is left with each householder, giving suggestions on the elimination of potentially dangerous conditions.

"The chamber of commerce tells us there are 5,000 homes in Klamath Falls," the fire chief said. "Two men, working both sides of the street, can check about 40 houses a day."

The survey of the house and premises is made only upon the invitation of the householder, the fire chief emphasized, and is done in the interests of fire safety for the community.

"Our men are meeting with wonderful response," Rowe said, "and we expect to check the largest percentage of homes in the city of any of the three years we have made this service available."

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
