'500' Ace Admits Automobile Fear

NEW YORK (UPI) — Clyde Beatty, who walked into a cage, full of lions and tigers with the aplomb of a man in the Easter parade, once was asked whether there was anything he feared.

"Yes," he replied, "lions and tigers."

And that's the way it is with pink-checked, blue-eyed Jim Rathmann, one of the world's top auto racing daredevils.

Mild-mannered Jim is the man who last June won the Miglia de Monza in Italy with a world record average of 166.788 miles per hour, which means speeds of 193 miles an hour on the straightaways, has driven 3,870 competitive miles at Indianapolis and currently is looking forward to his 10th ride in the famed 500 on Memorial Day.

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"I started when I was 17," says Jim, who is 30 now. "At first it was hot-rodding and then I just graduated into midgets and big cars. Dick started two years after I did."

His brother, you may recall, was involved in the first lap pile-up at Indianapolis last year which claimed the life of handsome Pat O'Connor. Jim was running 15th at the start and whizzed past his brother's battered car in fifth position after that spectacular crash.

Antlers Win Track Test

A complete sweep of first places in each of the field events gave the Bonanza Antlers a chilly victory in a triangular track meet held on Modoc Field Wednesday afternoon. Their opponents were the Chiloquin Panthers who finished second and a Klamath Union frosh and sophomore squad which ran third.

The Bonanza team notched 60 points as compared to Chiloquin's 49 while the baby Pelicans picked up 43.

Leading the Antler point collectors was Bill Brooks who tossed the javelin 160'3", pole vaulted an even 10 feet and hooked into a three-way tie in the high jump with a leap of 5'2". Chet Scholer grabbed off a pair of firsts with a mark of 41'8"4" in the shotput, 123'2" in the discus. Gary Dayley traveled 19'1" in the broad jump for the other Antler first.

Ron Hoggarth and Ken Say led the Chiloquin thinclads; Hoggarth collecting first in the 120 low hurdles and the 880 yard run while Say sped to wins in the 100 and the 220.

The KU speedsters were topped by Fred Stilwell who romped home in front in the 70 yard high hurdles and Paul Bellm who captured the 440. Bellm was the overall high KU storer.

KF Fans To See OTI In 3 Games At Gem

Oregon Tech's baseball squad is busy getting ready for its home opener this weekend with Eastern Oregon after dropping a 5-1 decision to last year's Oregon Collegiate Conference champion Southern Oregon Red Raiders at Ashland Tuesday afternoon.

The three-game series with EOC on Friday and Saturday will be the initial opportunity of the season for the local fans to get a chance to see the Owl diamondmen in action this year. With all three contests to be played at Gem Stadium, the Owls and Mounties pair off in a single contest Friday beginning at 3 p.m. while the two squads meet in a doubleheader on Saturday with the first game getting under way at 1 o'clock.

Coach Ralph Carr's squad has been working hard in preparation for this weekend as they took a long session of batting practice against Klamath Union's well known batting machine, better known as "Iron Mike," on Monday and held a scrimmage session with the Pelicans at Gem Wednesday afternoon.

The Ore Tech team sports a two won, four loss record for the season, the only pair of victories coming at the hands of Lassen Junior College last weekend while the losses were dealt by Shasta Junior College, University of Nevada, both once each and Humboldt Junior College, who tagged the Owls twice.

Either Gary Huener or southpaw Allan Leach, both of whom did the pitching chores against SOC and yielded only six hits between themselves, will get their chance against the Mountaineers this weekend while LeRoy Rausch or Gary Ehrmantrout will get the call for mound duty in the other tilt.

The remainder of Carr's crew for starting assignments for the EOC series is fairly well set with Charlie Wilson behind the plate, either Huener or Leach at first base, depending upon who is doing the tilt.

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KUMS Baseballers To Travel For Doubleheader At Yreka

Still smarting from a 2-1 reversal suffered at the hands of the Miners on their last junket to California the Klamath Union varsity baseball team will make a return trip to Yreka Friday for a two game session: one a seven-inning test and one a five. Neither game has a bearing on the Pelicans Southern Oregon Conference standing.

The Pels, 0-2 in league play, share the bottom rung of the ladder with Ashland Grizzlies. For overall season play the Whitebirds have established a 2-0 win, 2-1 record. Their victories include a pair over the Bend Lava Bears and one over the Prineville Grizzlies.

For coach Dean White's crew, who has suffered heavily during the current flu epidemic at KU, the Yreka clash finds them working short only the services of one regular, first sacker Dean Dunson.

"Dunson finally had to give in to the 'bug' Wednesday," commented White. "But there is still a possibility that he will make the lineup by Friday."
