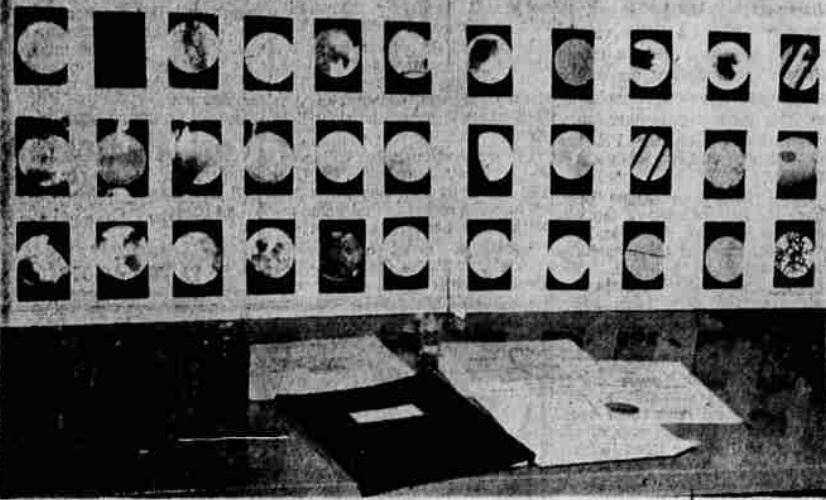

## Threat Faced By Plywood

WASHINGTON (AP) — Low price Japanese imports are threatening the existence of the U. S. plywood industry, three congressmen said Tuesday.

Rep. Russell V. Mack (R-Wash.), Prince H. Preston (D-Ga.) and Sen. Strom Thurmond (D-SC) made the charge at a U. S. Tariff Commission hearing on whether the domestic industry is being hurt by imports.

Mack said a survey of 40 U. S. plywood mills in 17 states shows a 35 per cent drop in net sales, a sharp decrease in gross profit and a loss in net income compared with 1955.

The Gray's Harbor congressman said jobs of thousands of workers are jeopardized by unfair competition from countries whose wages

are "ridiculously low when compared to the U. S. minimum wage."

Preston said Georgia workers are being hurt and mills are caught between rising costs and lower production.

Thurmond proposed relief for U. S. plywood producers and said, "there is no question that the competitive American industry is in distress."

James R. Sharp, representing the Imported Hardwood Plywood Assn. of San Francisco and the National Council of American Importers, New York, attempted to prevent the congressmen from testifying, but was overruled.

## Hypocrisy Hit By Jazz Pianist

LOGAN, Utah (AP)—Jazz Pianist Dave Brubeck says "race prejudice is going to make this country lose the world if it is not changed in a hurry."

"It's losing us Europe, the Middle East, Asia, South Africa — what else is there?" Brubeck said in an interview before a concert at Utah State University.

"When I write a Broadway show or play, it'll be on the racial problem. Blatant hypocrisy is what is holding our country back from where it should be," he added.

## Senator To Begin Test Run To Determine Candidacy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.) is about to set out on a test run aimed at finding how he might fare in a race for the 1960 Democratic presidential nomination.

Humphrey, who will climax a six-state tour by speaking to the California Legislature, said he wants to tell the people what he thinks on current issues.

"I also want to get on more intimate and friendly terms with the Democratic leaders of these states," he said.

Humphrey will cover territory already criss-crossed by Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.).

One of Humphrey's major objectives is to have a long talk with Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown of California. Brown has indicated he wants to be a favorite son. This would have the effect of ruling the California primary out of bounds for both Humphrey and Kennedy.

Humphrey realizes that, to get anywhere in the nomination contest, he must have some strong Western support. He probably will have to battle Kennedy in the Wisconsin primary as a prelude for what looks like a free-for-all in Oregon.

On his Western swing, which begins Saturday with a speech in Minneapolis, the Minnesota senator will campaign also in Washington, Oregon, California, Utah and Wyoming. If he can stir up interest in this area, the result would tend to offset Kennedy's acknowledged hold on New England. Kennedy has support also in the South.

Others frequently mentioned as potential Democratic candidates are Senators Stuart Symington of

Missouri and Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas and Adlai E. Stevenson. Kennedy and Humphrey submitted themselves to a personal inspection Wednesday by 51 Methodist bishops who came to call and inquire about their views. The

bishops planned to see Vice President Nixon today.

Kennedy, a Roman Catholic, reported that he had a very pleasant discussion of public affairs with the Methodists. Humphrey, a Congregationalist, called the meet-

ing "very cordial and informative."

The bishops said nothing for public attribution but one of them remarked privately that Kennedy "had a good personality and he appealed very much to the group."

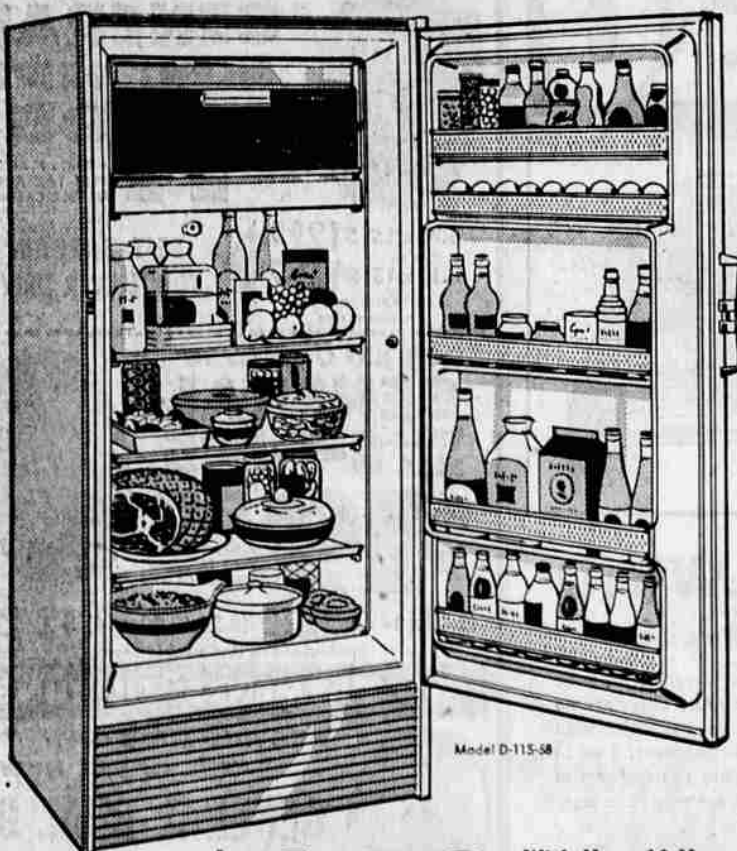
