ROSEBURG (AP)—Oregon state officials and press, radio and television representatives will fly to Kansas City, Mo., this weekend to help send off a covered wagon train headed for Oregon.

The wagon caravan will leave Independence, Mo., Sunday for a 1,200-mile trek along the old Oregon Trail route to Independence, Ore., as a centennial celebration feature.

"On-to-Oregon Cavalcade" officials said the U.S. Air Force will provide two planes in addition to two already donated by Morrison-Knudsen Construction Co.

ED BILL KILLED

SALEM (AP)—The House Education Committee has killed a bill which would have required that one-fourth of the revenue counties receive from Oregon and California timber lands be used for education.

Sponsors of the measure said the revenue is the same as property taxes. It would have meant that the O&C counties would receive less state aid.

Art Group Given Grant

The Fine Arts Committee of the Oregon Centennial Commission has informed Ben Schwartz, local chairman, that the Klamath Art Association's application for a portion of the Fine Arts Assistance Fund has been approved, and an appropriation of \$3,750 has been made to this local group. The grant is intended for use in erecting a new art gallery in Klamath Falls, which must be built in time for the coming Centennial tourist season.

Since this amount is obviously not sufficient to fully pay for minimum exhibition space, members of the Klamath Art Association are asking friends of the group and all citizens of the county who are interested in this project to pledge whatever they can in materials, money, labor or equipment. An amount at least equal to the original appropriation must be raised locally if the gallery is built. If enough local subscriptions cannot be found, the original grant will be lost to this county, whose taxes helped supply the Centennial funds.

Art Association members are trying to personally contact those who may be able to help. Anyone not contacted may pledge by phoning TU 4-3547 or writing to Post Office Box 955. They point out that any amount will be gratefully received and acknowledged. Time is extremely vital in getting this project under way, and they emphasized it is very important that these pledges be found as quickly as possible.

A definite location for the gallery has not been determined, but the association hopes to have a decision on a site within a week. Nina Pence, president of the organization, will be architect for the gallery, and the use of local, native materials will be stressed. The 1959 structure will consist of a minimum exhibition space and lavatory facilities only.

Ultimate plans will provide for addition of studio and classroom areas, office, library, vault, kitchen and workshop space. It is the sincere hopes of the Art Association that all residents of the community will be able to find a personal use for such a building, and that it will become a place where people can go to experiment and create, to study and explore art together, and to find an outlet for showing and selling the work of local artists and craftsmen.

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Exhibition By Boy Scouts To Get Underway Saturday

Fifty one booths will be open for public inspection Saturday when the annual Boy Scout Exposition gets underway at Klamath County Fairgrounds.

The displays culminate months of work and planning by boys and scout officials in the Klamath Boy Scout District. They are designed to acquaint people with scouting activities, and they are sponsored by nearly all the cub, scout and Explorer units in the district covering Klamath County and the California portion of Klamath Basin.

Demonstrations of plaster casting, tin can and aluminum foil cookery, rope bridge building, nut-shell craft and boat upkeep will be only a few of the displays. Twenty one of the booths are reserved by Cub Scouts, 25 by Boy Scouts and six by Explorer units.

Proceeds both from ticket sales and from a hot dog-soft drink concession operated by the Klamath Falls Exchange Club, which is sponsoring the exposition, will help finance scout activities.

Tickets sell for 50 cents. One ticket will gain admission for one adult or two children. Scouts are selling the tickets door-to-door this week, and Exchange Club members will sell them at the fairgrounds box office Saturday.

Cub, scout and Explorer units will receive 80 per cent of the proceeds. The remainder will be used by the district administration to pay exposition costs.

Scouts will set up their displays Saturday morning. Doors will open from 2:30 until 4:30 p.m. and from 6:30 until 9 p.m.
