

Dorris City Council Meets To Mull Water Users Rates

DORRIS—The Dorris City Council met in an adjourned regular meeting Monday night in the city hall to discuss proposed new city water users rates.

Taking into consideration the new addition and water lines, the council proposed a raise to the Butte Valley High School from \$20 to \$30; the Dorris Elementary School, from \$20 to \$35; the Mountain Valley Moulding Company, from \$5 to \$20; Dorris Lumber and Moulding, \$20 to \$40.

All householders rates will remain at \$3.50. Outside city limits water users will be raised 30 percent of the present \$1.05. These water users pay no city taxes and have the right to fire assistance.

Employee Benefit Figures Told By J-M Spokesman

Payrolls and employee benefits paid out by Johns-Manville during the first quarter of 1959 came to \$33,393,000 according to W. H. Graham, local Johns-Manville spokesman. He said this was an increase of \$2,145,000 over the same period last year.

Dividends paid to stockholders during the first quarter of 1959 came to \$4,146,000 compared with \$3,582,000 for the same period last year, he reported.

Cost of raw materials used at various plants for the fabrication of Johns-Manville products and other expenses of doing business rose from \$24,540,000 for the first quarter of 1958 to \$27,931,000 for the first three months of this year, an increase of \$3,391,000.

Taxes also jumped from \$2,870,000 for the first quarter of 1958 to \$4,611,000 for the same period this year.

The consolidated figures for Johns-Manville Corporation and subsidiary companies received here today also show first quarter sales at \$74,742,000, up from \$69,833,000 last year.
