Demeter Pays Off For LA; Soft Stuff Stops Cubs Cold

Dodger Patience Worth It

The Los Angeles Dodgers have been a long time waiting on Don Demeter, a scrawny kid they didn't really want in the first place. Now it looks as if their patience had paid off.

Still a rather frail-looking guy, although the Dodgers have fattened him up with liver oil and vitamins, Demeter, 23, has been a robust fill-in for the ailing Duke Snider in center field. With Duke nursing a knee, Demeter has figured in all three Los Angeles victories.

He did it again Thursday night, socking a two-run homer, a single and a fifth-inning double that brought home the winning run in a 7-5 decision over the St. Louis Cardinals at Los Angeles.

"We signed him," Dodger veep Fredo Thompson admits, "because we wanted two other kids. They were all buddies at an Oklahoma City high school back in 1952 and when we signed the two we wanted (I don't know exactly where they are now), they said 'couldn't we sign their buddy too?'"

"So the scout gave him \$600 or something like that and that's how we got Demeter."

The Dodgers also have a share of fourth place at the moment in the National League, 1½ games behind Milwaukee's still undefeated first-place Braves, who beat Philadelphia 7-3. The Chicago Cubs, who share fourth, whipped San Francisco 11-3. Cincinnati and Pittsburgh were idle.

Bums 7, Cardinals 6

The Dodgers counted six runs on three homers in another game of screen-o at the Coliseum. Rookie Ron Fairley sliced a leadoff shot over the left-field "barrier" off loser Ernie Broglio (0-2), who also gave up Demeter's homer for a three-run first inning. Rookie Jim Baxes hit a three-run homer off Howie Nunn, second of six Card pitchers. St. Louis used 25 players, a NL record and matching the major league mark for a nine-inning game. The Cards also used eight pinch hitters, with George Crowe the only one to get a hit, and tied a NL record.

Johnny Klippstein, third Dodger pitcher, was the winner with Clem Labine's help in a two-run ninth. St. Louis 610 030 002—6 10 0. Los Angeles 300 310 00X—7 7 0.

Noticeable lacking power at the plate, the Owls have collected only five extra base hits to date, including four doubles and a single three-bagger.

Downie at second, Brooks at short stop and Cox at third. The outfield will be made up of Henry Richardson, Wayne Morrow, and Virg Winters with Stan Glass and Earl Kessler rated as possibilities for starting berths.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore may fight Sugar Ray Robinson in September.

Last winter Archie stopped Durelle. But not until he climbed off the canvas three times in the first round, and got up again in the fifth frame.

Meanwhile, back on Modoc Field, coach Jim Inglesby and the Pelican squad will play host to the Henley Hornets and the Bend Lava Bears in a triangular meet scheduled to begin at 1:00 p.m.

At the same time, Knudsen and his JV baseball team, who will leave KU early Saturday morning, shall be tangling with the Cavemen in a twinbill starting at 1 p.m. at Grants Pass.
