

Editors, Fidel Castro To Hold Q And A Session

WASHINGTON (AP)—A young man never lacking a quick answer meets today with a group never short on questions. The twin bill: Fidel Castro and the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

The society finally settled most of its disputes with radio and television broadcasters who complained ASNE was trying to restrict coverage of the Castro appearance. Officers of ASNE yielded to protests that the society—long an ardent champion of press freedom—was in this case "denying freedom of access to the news."

Tribe Buries Aged Chief

Veep To Visit Red Capital; Talks With Nikita Likely

WASHINGTON (AP)—Vice President Nixon will visit Moscow in late July. His expected talks with high Soviet officials may help to set the stage for a summit conference.

It will focus attention on him in the months leading up to selection of the Republican nominee.

Internationally, the trip means a new round of high-level contacts, following up the January visit here of Soviet Deputy Premier Anastas I. Mikoyan.

Presumably one of Nixon's purposes will be to demonstrate to the Soviet peoples a friendly American interest in them. He is expected to emphasize a United States desire for better relations.

Nixon now plans to remain in Moscow three or four days. He seems assured of red carpet treatment. His time in the country might be extended.

Presumably also he may visit other capitals.

His trip is timed to fall between the scheduled Big Four foreign ministers meeting at Geneva and a probable summit conference in late summer, perhaps in August. He will have an opportunity to discuss pending questions in advance of the summit gathering.

Nixon will be the first high-ranking U.S. official to visit the Soviet Union in many years.

Secretary of State George C. Marshall was there for a foreign ministers meeting on German and Austrian problems in 1947.

Tests Indicate Cucumber Really Anything But Cool

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Is a cucumber really cool? Does anyone actually get warm as toast? Are a redhead's lips as hot as song and fable tell us?

PORTLAND (AP)—Northwest Natural Gas Co. Thursday declared quarterly dividends of 18 cents a share on common stock and \$1.43 per share on preferred stock.

Evidence From Experiment Shows Gout-Genius Link

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—Take heart, all you sufferers from gout: there's new scientific evidence that your affliction may be a hallmark of intellectual greatness.

Two government researchers came up today with a report of laboratory evidence—culled from tests of American soldiers—suggesting that gout might be associated with higher-than-normal intelligence.

Dr. Dewitt Stetten Jr. and Dr. John Hearson, of the National Institute of Arthritis and Metabolic Diseases, told a scientific meeting here that their research was an attempt to confirm this impression, long held by various scientists.

Scientifically, gout is associated with increased amounts of uric acid in the blood and with periodic aching in one of the joints of the body, often in the feet.

The researchers said there were two alternative conclusions that could be drawn:

1. That increased amounts of uric acid in the blood tend to promote intelligence; or

2. That successful people are prone to eat a diet richer than usual in certain chemicals that are uric acid producers.

The latter alternative, of course, would rule out intellectual functioning as regards gout.

But the scientists appeared to be placing their bets on the first alternative.

1. That increased amounts of uric acid in the blood tend to promote intelligence; or

PORTLAND (AP)—A comprehensive plan was compiled Thursday to provide accommodations in private homes for summer Centennial visitors here.

The Multnomah County Centennial Assn., Inc., drew up the plan jointly with city, county and state health and legal authorities.

In the near future the association hopes to make public standards home owners must meet to qualify.

After a survey the commission said Portland could accommodate 15,000 guests a day in hotels, motels and other commercial housing, but estimated the number of visitors could reach 20,000 a day at the height of the Centennial year season.
