Much dissatisfaction with the Welfare Commission has existed among legislators since the commission asked for \$1,900,000 in emergency funds for April, May and June. The Joint Ways and Means Committee, surprised by the request, wanted to know why the commission did not request this earlier.

The committee cut the request to \$1,200,000 and both houses approved it. But there is a move to restore at least part of the other \$700,000.

Mishap Victim Seems Better

Lynn Shaffer, 21, of Klamath Falls appeared to show some recovery in Medford's Sacred Heart Hospital this morning from critical head injuries he received in an automobile wreck south of Mt. Hebron on Highway 97 Saturday afternoon.

He is unconscious and is expected to remain in that condition for up to three weeks from a severe brain contusion. He remains on the critical list. But the Shaffer family learned that he is expected to recover in a telephone conversation with Sacred Heart personnel this morning.

Shaffer was a passenger in a car driven by Jay Ellis Montgomery, 20, of 2217 Biehn Street. The car left the highway, clipped a tree and overturned. California Highway Patrolmen said the wreck apparently occurred when Montgomery stooped to retrieve a cigarette he had dropped. Montgomery received minor injuries.

Shaffer is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George M. Shaffer of 3171 Bristol Street. The elder Shaffer operates an electric shop in Klamath Falls.

The injured youths were taken to Mount Shasta Community Hospital by Weed Ambulance. Shaffer subsequently was flown to Medford by Mercy Flight.

Mare Stumbles; Rider Uninjured

PORTLAND (AP) — A dapple gray mare named Gypsy shied, reared and fell Thursday night at a suburban Portland intersection.

The rider and owner—Kenneth Mitchell, 49—escaped injury when tossed from the animal. Gypsy suffered a laceration, concussion and shock, according to a veterinarian called to the scene.

The veterinarian ordered that the animal not be moved for four hours, so Mitchell held an ice bag on Gypsy's head during that time while deputy sheriffs rerouted traffic around the animal.
