LAKEVIEW—More than 400 persons gathered at the "Friendship of Nations" dinner at the A. D. Hay School auditorium Monday evening to provide funds for the local participation in the American Field Service program and to hear the name of Michael Tooke announced as the student who was selected to spend the summer abroad under the program.

Lakeview's foreign student in attendance here this year is Felix Ortega of Spain and he spoke as "A Spaniard to His American Friends." Felix told of the many wrong impressions of America prevailing in foreign countries and the change in these views effected by the students who actually come here and make their home with American families.

"One can read a lot," Felix said, "but one cannot know people without living with and among them. Instead of money rolling in the streets and everybody a 'big shot,' Americans are hard working people maintaining high standards of living. It is a pleasure to really know a family and gives

me a strong feeling for America. I can now go back and establish understanding with my own people and cherish a friendship built from understanding among the students."
