

Actress Says Romance Over

LONDON (AP) — Eva Bartok says her romance with Indian Prince Shiv is over and she wants him to go home to his dad, the Maharaja of Palitana.

The four-times-married movie actress announced the end of their affair in two brisk telegrams.

One went to the 27-year-old playboy Hindu prince telling him "Marriage impossible . . . Must concentrate on work . . . God bless you."

The other went to the maharaja, who opposed his son's romance. She told him she had "begged Shiv return India not wishing come between you. Also other reasons. Please try to keep him there."

A month ago the prince told newsmen he intended to marry the Hungarian-born actress "and I don't care what my father thinks of it."

Eva said she last saw the prince in Rome three weeks ago.

"The reasons for our breakup only concern him really," she said. "I don't want to talk about them."

She took up with the handsome young prince last year after the breakup of her longtime romance with Marquess of Milford Haven, who was best man at the wedding of his cousin, Prince Philip, to Queen Elizabeth II.

Local Stamp, Coin Club To Hold Annual Display

The second annual display of the Klamath Stamp and Coin Club will be held Saturday, April 18, starting at 10 a.m., at 413 Main, in the building formerly occupied by the Health Center, near Copco. The public is invited to attend. Wood-en nickels, featuring a buffalo and Crater Lake, will be distributed to persons attending.

The display is in connection with National Coin Week, and is sponsored by the American Numismatic Association. Many rare coins and stamps will be on display. Among the coins will be a series of Egyptian dollars, displayed by Robert Nelson, of Alturas; a set of the rare Matanuska Valley tokens of Alaska, the 49th state; a complete set of the coins of Hawaii, the 50th state; a set of the Philippine coins which were changed in 1958 to conform with the coins of the U.S.; sets of Canadian coins dating from 1858; sets of U.S. coins, including specimens from 1795; coins of the French Revolution dated between 1789 and 1804; a complete set of Indian head cents, bearing the head of Sally Longacre, the 12 year old daughter of James Longacre, chief designer at the Philadelphia mint in 1859 when the coinage of Indian cents was started.

Maurice Miller, past president of the Klamath Stamp and Coin Club will exhibit the nucleus of a new collection started since he lost an extensive and valuable coin collection to burglars earlier this year.

Among the items on display will be a U.S. dime of 1942, valued at \$75. The coin, known as an "overdate," was struck from a die originally used in 1941. In 1942, shortly after the start of World War II, the Philadelphia mint, because of a steel shortage, utilized one or more of the 1941 dies which would normally have been discarded, by engraving a 2 over the second 1 of the date. The 1 is clearly visible under the 2. These overdated coins are now very rare.

New officers of the club, which was organized during National Coin Week of 1957, are Kenneth Lowe, president; Wally Scheck, vice president; Melvin Carmichael, secretary; Norma Oliver, treasurer and Cecil Redford and Don Wells, directors. The club now has 87 members, with the induction of Mildred Cook, Gene Groseclose and LeRoy Rowe at recent meetings. The club has members in each of the Pacific Coast states and from six communities in Oregon, including Portland, Bend, Medford, Grants Pass, Springfield, Chiloquin.

Many of the coins displayed, will be in custom made plastic coin holders, products of one of Klamath Falls' lesser known industries, Richardson's Plastic Supplies, operated by T. E. Richardson, who operates the plastics shop on Can-

non Street, in the Altamont district. Richardson's holders go to for the exhibit by the local club, coin dealers and collectors in all parts of the United States. Use of the building at 413 Main for the exhibit by the local club, is by courtesy of Paul Landry, local real estate dealer.
