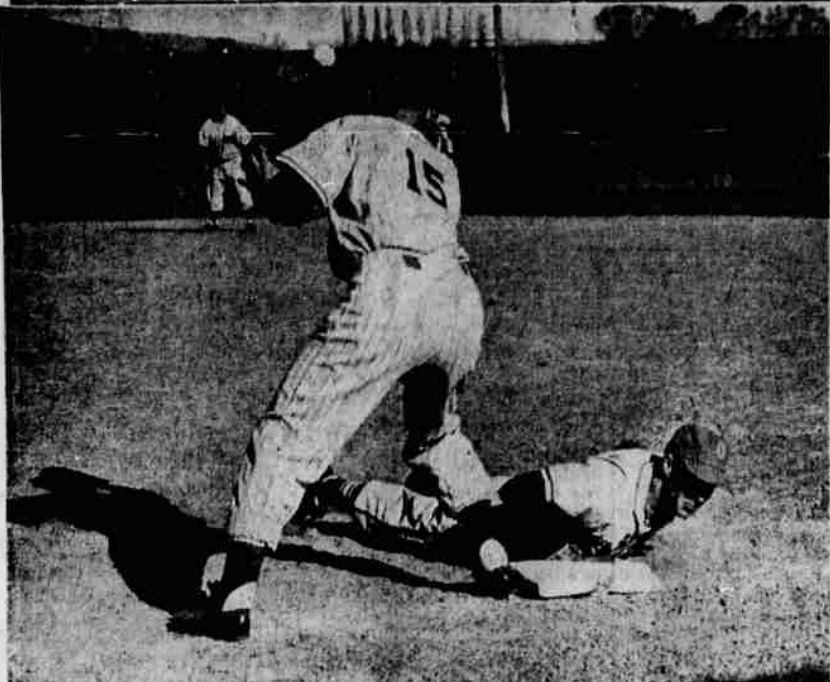

Indians' Purchase Pays Off

It begins to look as though the Boston Red Sox not only brought up Dick Brodowski too soon, but that they also gave up on him too soon.

At the moment, the big right-hander has saved two of Cleveland's five victories and has claimed one for himself. He's done it with three hitless relief jobs for the Indians, who remain unbeaten while everyone else in the American League has lost at least twice.

Now 26, Brodowski was hoisted from Class D by the Red Sox in 1953 and had a 5-5 record. Back from service in 1955, he was 1-0 and peddled to Washington. The Senators let him go after an 0-4 showing, but the Indians brought him back last season after a two-year, 26-16 record in the minors.

Combining his five appearances of last year with his 4-13 innings now has an improbable 0.00 earned run average for 14 1-3 consecutive innings of relief, in which he has given up just three hits.

Redskins 4, A's 3

He stretched that string with two innings of perfect relief, Friday night as the Indians beat Kansas City 4-3 for a one-game lead over Chicago. The White Sox twisted the Tigers' tail again with a 6-5 decision over winless Detroit. Boston blanked New York 4-0 on Tom Brewer's two-hit pitching, and Baltimore defeated Washington 4-3.

A double error by A's third baseman Hal Smith on Minnie Minoso's ground ball gave the Indians the tie-breaking run with two out in the ninth at Cleveland.

BoSox 4, Yanks 0

Brewer, who was beaten in Boston's opener by Bob Turley's two-hit, beat the Yankee ace in a return match for the Red Sox first shutout against New York since August 7, 1956, when Willard Nixon beat the champs 1-0 in 11 innings.

WhiSox 6, Tigers 5

Jim Rivera's pop, two-run double wiped it up for the White Sox in the eighth inning, breaking a 4-4 tie against reliever Ray Narleski, now 0-3.

Orioles 4, Solons 3

Three walks and a sacrifice fly from pinch-hitter Gene Woodling gave the Orioles their tie-breaking run in the eighth off Washington's relief ace, Dick Hyde (0-1).

BV Pitcher Spins First No-No Game

BUTTE VALLEY (Special)—The first no-hit, no-run ball game of the 1959 prep baseball season in the Southern Oregon-Northern California area became the possession of Butte Valley senior Mike Branham who accomplished the feat in a 6-0 victory over Fort Jones here Thursday afternoon.

Branham, who already has a 2-hit shutout to his credit this year, pitched his no-no in the face of four errors by his Bulldog teammates. In addition to his mound performance, the big (6-1, 270 pounds) right-hander collected two hits, one a double, in four trips to the plate.

Coch Vern Williams' Bulldog nine pounded out 12 hits off losing Fort Jones twirler, Jim Ruff. The Fort defenders committed six errors behind Ruff.

The big stick for the afternoon was BV centerfielder, Mickey Copeland, who slammed two triples and a single in four trips to the plate. Shortstop Teddy Crutchfield, a freshman, and third sacker Ray Goldbar each collected a pair of singles in four times at bat while catchers Gary Longmore poled a pair in three tries.

Longmore starred on the basepaths with two stolen bases while Crutchfield and Goldbar each swiped one off Fort Jones catcher Bob Burton.

Southpaw Discovers Limelight

The way he mowed down the San Francisco Giants on four hits Friday night, maybe Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell has seen the errors of his ways.

Big Wilmer, a 6-3 southpaw, has been a star character in the St. Louis Cardinals' "home movie" scheme, in which they film their pitchers and batters in action to discover flaws. The Cards have developed a lot of film, but Mizell never has developed into the pitcher he was expected to be when he won 23 games in his first two seasons with the Red Birds, back in 1952-53.

Now in two starts, he's put together two complete games. He finished what he started only eight times last season, when he was 10-14.

His first try this season brought a 6-3 defeat as the Giants swept a three-game set at St. Louis. But while giving up 13 hits, he gave up only four earned runs.

Friday night he didn't give up a run at all for 8 1-3 innings, finally coming off with a 4-1 victory at San Francisco. Orlando Cepeda, who had two of the Giants' hits, junked the shutout with his fourth home run of the season in the ninth.

In other National League games unbeaten Milwaukee and winless Pittsburgh played a 2-2 tie halted by rain after nine innings. The Chicago Cubs bombed Los Angeles 9-4 and took second place as Cincinnati slipped to third with a 5-1 defeat by Philadelphia.

The Cardinals chased young Mike McCormick (0-1) with a two-run first inning when the first four men hit safely.

Solo home runs by Lee Walls and Ernie Banks and a two-run shot by Walt Moryn powered the Cubs at Los Angeles. Walls' sacrifice fly capped a three-run seventh that gave the Cubs a 4-all tie. Three more runs in the eighth put it away.

Phils 5, Cincy 1

Ruben Gomez, who gave up one hit in a scoreless 2-2-3 innings before he wrenched a knee, and winning reliever Ray Semproch (1-0) set down the Reds on three hits. Harry Anderson and Willie Jones hit bases-empty homers for the Phils.

Klamath Union Splits Twin Bill With Yreka; Pelican Twirler Tosses Three Hit Shutout

YREKA (Special)—The Klamath Union Pelicans gained at least part of their vengeance for an earlier loss to the Yreka Miners as they won a tight, nine-inning pitching duel, 1-0, in the first game of a doubleheader, only to tumble 8-4 in a hectic five-inning second half of a double bill here Friday afternoon.

Pelican pitcher Blake Griggs gained star-billing in the first game as he scattered three Yreka singles, fanned six and walked only three Miners over the nine-inning route.

The game was originally scheduled for seven innings but was forced into the extra stanzas and ended in the ninth when third baseman Larry Bunyard, who had gotten aboard on a pass, scored on co-star Rich Depew's timely single and an error by the Yreka catcher. The only other KU hit of the game was Griggs' single

in the fifth frame. Griggs was forced at second.

Losing pitcher Jim Brooks dispensed with the Pels, three up and three down, except for a walk in the sixth (and Griggs' single), for the first seven innings. He fanned five Pels, walked four and gave up two hits.

Weakening in the eighth, he walked two men and saw one get on base via a second base error, but still managed to stop the uprising. His chances for a victory went out the window in the top of the ninth as leadoff man, KU shortstop Bob Yumck, grounded out to second base, only to have Bunyard's winning run set itself up off the fateful walk. Bunyard sped home when Depew came through in the clutch with a welcome base knock that allowed the score when the Yreka catcher, Jerry Dillon misused.

Moments later Depew was doubled off third by Ted Peters who tagged him after hauling in Bill Worlein's pop fly.

In the bottom of the inning Griggs gave the Pelicans an unnecessary thrill as he allowed Peters a single, but he proved to be the winner as he forced pinch-hitter Bob McCarthy to pop-up for the first out, then served pitches to Roger Conroy, left field, and Brooks, both of whom dusted out to third baseman Bunyard.

Of the thrilling win, coach Dean White said, "The boys really played good ball—it was their best game to date. Griggs threw real well and except for a couple of mistakes, the team was great in the field."

Some of the glitter of the victory was rubbed off in the second game when Pelican starter, freshman Bob Wilkinson, got stomped into the dirt by the Miners who scored five runs in the first inning off an error, three walks, a single by Dillon, who played left in the second game, and a disastrous triple by centerfielder Brian Taylor.

More was to come in the second stanza; reliever Keith Farrell allowed two hits, a double by lead-off man Daryl Severns and a single by Gary Gresham, before White removed him for John Webb. Webb gave up a single to the first man he faced, then settled down to take charge of the situation. With the score 8-0, Webb stopped the ram-paging Yrekans.

The Pels couldn't reach the offerings of Miner hurler Bill Root until the fourth when Rich Depew led off with a single. Griggs added another, then both scored when Don Gresdel was safe on an error. Gresdel and Dave Saks, catcher, who got a walk, both scored when Bob Yumck pounded out a single before being tagged for out number three.

Their brief hopes fizzled, however, in the fifth when Root fanned Griggs after Depew had walked. Depew was doubled off first base when Worlein popped up to first sacker Jim Bartlett, and the ball game was all over.

Root fanned four, walked two, and allowed the Pels four hits.

Second Game Defeat

Ore-Techmen Trim EOC Friday At Gem

Friday afternoon the Oregon Tech baseball team got the jump on the Eastern Oregon College Mountaineers with a surprise 7-6 victory behind the successful 10 hit pitching job of Leroy Rausch in exceedingly drafty and cold Gem Stadium.

Coach Ralph Carr's Owl squad broke into the win column, notching a 1-1 mark for Oregon Collegiate Conference play to date.

Rausch, in addition to his work on the mound, contributed to his win with a pair of singles in four trips to the plate. One, a screamer in the third inning, boosted across a pair of runs that helped the Techmen overcome a second inning 3-0 EOC lead. He struck out four of coach Bob Quinn's Wolves and issued three free-passes over the distance.

After the Owls quelled an Eastern Oregon attempt to catch up in the seventh canto with a pair of doubles, Rausch faced only seven men in the last two frames fanning two of the Wolves' lead-off hitters in the last inning.

Virg Winters, the big Owl right-fielder pounded out a double and a long sacrifice in three trips to account for two Tech runs. Third-sacker Jim Cox, like Rausch, banged out a pair of singles and collected a walk in five trips to the plate.

The longest Owl smash of the day was a triple by catcher Charlie Wilson in an otherwise uneventful OTI fifth. Other hits were garnered by leftfielder Stan Glass, second baseman Ron Downie, and centerfielder Everett Scott.

The most powerful bat of the afternoon belonged to OCE's John Willmarth. Willmarth, left field, collected two triples in five at-bats to drive in three Wolf runs, however EOC hurler Satch Miller stole some of his thunder with a second inning three-bagger that scored one of the visitor's runs.

Wolf second baseman, Mel Holmes, collected three hits, two doubles and a single, in five trips, while third baseman Bob Olinger added two more on base blows.

The Wolves looked like Owl-eaters early in the first inning as leadoff man, Holmes, blasted the second pitch for a towering double caught by a sudden gust win in left field. Moments later Holmes scored as number three man, Olinger, repeated the act to left-center. However the threat died as Rausch forced cleanup man Willmarth to ground out and then whiffed first baseman Bill McCadden.

Trouble started again in the second as Ted Lacok started off with a double and scampered home on Miller's triple. Miller scored on the next pitch on Holmes' single. But here they stopped.

New Figures In Argument

CINCINNATI (AP) — The 1959 major league baseball season is only a week old but already the spit ball controversy is back in the news, this time with new names—Don Newcombe of Cincinnati and Early Wynn of the Chicago White Sox.

Newcombe and Wynn were linked with using the illegal pitch by Dave Philley, the pinch hitter superb of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Furthermore, Philley said in an interview Friday, plenty of pitchers use the spit ball and the umpires take no action to stop it.

"Plenty of pitchers use it," said Philley. "Don Newcombe has one. Early Wynn has a beauty. Burdette (Lew Burdette of the Braves) throws it at least once every two pitches."

Philley, a 38-year-old outfielder, said he studies and memorizes pitchers' throwing habits.

"Rudy York taught me," he explained. "There are tipoffs you look for — how a pitcher holds the ball, the wrist motion he uses at the start of the windup, and how he swings his arms over his head."

The Owls got back in the game in the third as first baseman Allan Leach walked, Cox flied out to second. Glass walked and was moved along on Winters sacrifice.

Then Gary Ehrmantrout filled the sacks as he also received a free pass just prior to Rausch's first single. Ehrmantrout romped home as Ron Downie followed with a timely single and the ball game started over, 3-3.

The Owls moved ahead 5-3 in the fourth inning off Scott's single. Winters double and an error.

The Wolves tied it up in the fifth off a walk followed by successive safeties, one, the triple by Willmarth.

The roof caved in on EOC in the sixth when shortstop Doug McIntosh tossed an easy double play ball into right field allowing the Owls to push two more runs across. The margin was enough to withstand a one-run Wolf threat in the seventh.

Rook Hurler Comes Back As Shortstop

ALBANY, Ga. (AP) — Von McDaniel, rookie pitching whiz of the St. Louis Cardinals two years ago, is making a comeback — as a shortstop.

McDaniel, now 20, set the National League on its ear within a month after graduating from Hollis (Okla.) High School. As a bonus hurler, he won seven games in 1957 including a two-hit shutout of the Brooklyn Dodgers and a one-hit blanking of Pittsburgh.

Von slipped from the Cards, where his ERA in 1958 was 13.50, to Houston where it was 14.50, to Winston-Salem last season.

Just as the Cards were about ready to give up on Von, officials remembered scout Freddie Hahn's original evaluation of the youngsters.

"If he can't make the big club as a pitcher," Hahn had decided, "he's a good bet as an infielder. He's a natural."

Young McDaniel was given a chance at shortstop this spring. He'll be leaving Tuesday as regular shortstop of the Daytona Beach club of the Florida State League.

Cardinal coaches at the minor league training base here say McDaniel is a definite major league prospect at the new position.

It wouldn't be the first time a Cardinal rookie has failed as a pitcher, gone to Daytona Beach and wound up with a regular job on the parent club.

The other guy's name was Stan Musial.
