A pink and white color theme was carried out by tall candelabra holding white tapers and baskets of white stock and pink carnations for the wedding which joined members of two well known Klamath Basin families.

The bride is the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Warren Hunt of the Spring Lake District. Mr. and Mrs. Patrick J. McAuliffe of Fort Klamath and Cottonwood, California, are parents of the bridegroom.

The bride was given in marriage by her father.

Her wedding gown of peau-de-soie was fashioned with a yoke of Alencon lace, fitted bodice and long sleeves pointed at the wrists. The full skirt fell gracefully into a chapel train. A seed pearl crown held her illusion veil. She carried a cascade bouquet of stephanotis and Phalaenopsis orchids. She wore a traditional blue garter and penny in her slipper and carried a lace handkerchief from Mallorca given to her by her grandmother, Mrs. Warren Hunt.

Virginia Hunt was maid of honor for her sister. Another sister, Nancy, was bridesmaid. They wore matching princess style frocks of pale pink organza with bows of dull satin accenting the Empire waistline. Short veils were held by headbands of pink leaves. Each carried a bouquet of feathered

Flower girl, Susan McAuliffe, sister of the bridegroom, wore a bouffant dress of white organza and lace with pink cummerbund ending in a flat bow at the waistline in back. The young couple received congratulations from the 300 guests in the parish hall at Sacred Heart immediately following the ceremony. Carnations and stock in shades of pink and white were used in profusion about the hall. A four tiered cake, decorated with pink roses and silver leaves and topped

with wedding bells, centered the brides table.

Assisting at the reception were Mrs. Lloyd Dod, Los Altos, California, and Mrs. Donald Hunt, aunts of the bride; Judy and Donna Jeane Hunt, cousins of the bride, Mrs. Basil Brown, Sandra Short and Wanda Mancuso.

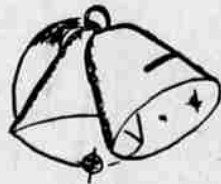
