Hand Puppets Are Ideal Toys

Simple homemade toys often are more fun for children than the expensive gadgets bought in a toy store. A toy should be able to be used for a number of purposes and in different kinds of play. It should stimulate active interest and originality as the need to be creative rises very early and stays with most people all their lives. Hand puppets are ideal toys, as they allow the child to use his own imagination and are easy to make. Popular right now is a beguiling little bunny inspired by a TV character. However, almost any animal can be the model for a hand puppet. Here are tips on how to make them, from local sewing center experts.

First trace the child's hand on a piece of paper. If you are making a bunny, leave out the middle finger on the pattern, and you have formed the ears. Hold pattern in place on the felt with cellophane tape and cut out two shapes with pinking shears. Stitch together on your sewing machine. Be sure to leave a fairly wide space on the bottom. Features are made from colored plastic tape.

For the bunny, make eyes from circles of white tape with a spot of blue tape on each. Whiskers are made from narrow strips of black tape, and a green tape bow tie adds dash.

You can make all kinds of characters by using different features. You can even make leopards or zebras by using colored plastic tape for the spots or stripes.

Let the children go through their story books and decide what animals they want to make. Then they can act out their favorite nursery rhymes. Mother also can use the puppets when reading bedtime stories.

Encourage the children to put on their own puppet shows. It will be fun for all the family.

Sport Car Rallies A Growing Hobby In Motoring Set

NEW YORK (UPI) — A growing hobby among the U. S. motoring set puts the lady back-seat driver upfront.

The result will be a sharp increase in the divorce rate, humorously predicted one male hobbyist, who currently is happily wed.

Sports car rallies, long a pastime in Europe, have spread to America.

For the information of those who have not participated in this sport, a rally is a contest in which the driver and navigator of a sports car pit their skills against a driving course outlined to the second by one of the numerous sports car clubs. The aim of the rallyists: To travel a given distance in prescribed time and at prescribed speed. The reward, in addition to the fun, usually is a cup or other trophy.

A rally may be as short as four hours on a Sunday afternoon or for as long as 3,000 miles over a four-week period.

But to stay within the prescribed limits on time and distance requires detailed mathematical calculation and this is where the little woman usually comes in, as "navigator."

"Keeping the family budget is much easier," signed Mrs. John C. Conover, a young New York matron. Her husband, executive director of a trade group, the Corset and Brassiere Association, recently acquired a British-made sports car. He promptly joined a sports car club, started on their rallies, and recruited her as assistant.

"I'll admit the driver has much the easier job," said Conover. "I know. As an old Navy man, I have been oth pilot and navigator."

"I can see it now," he added good-naturedly. "As the rallies get more popular, there will be more lost tempers... separations... divorces."

Although husband and wife, or boy friend and girl friend, may squabble over the way they finished in a rally (the mistakes are always hers of course), they go right on with their pastime.

Alan F. Bethell, former racing car driver and now president of Britain's Standard-Triumph Motor Co., estimated that between 80,000 and 90,000 sports cars now are imported yearly.

The British Auto Manufacturers Association of New York said last year's imports of sports cars from the five leading British makers totaled 49,000. The 1957 total was 28,000; for 1956, it was 15,000. The association said British makers account for more than half of all sports cars sold in the United States.

"Rallies are for more than just fun," said Bethell. "They call for precision driving. They're safety contests too. The rallyist who violates any traffic law is disqualified immediately by his club. There are hidden observers all along the route."

"Rallyists come in all ages. We have heard of some in their 70's. But the average couple seems to be in the mid-thirties."
