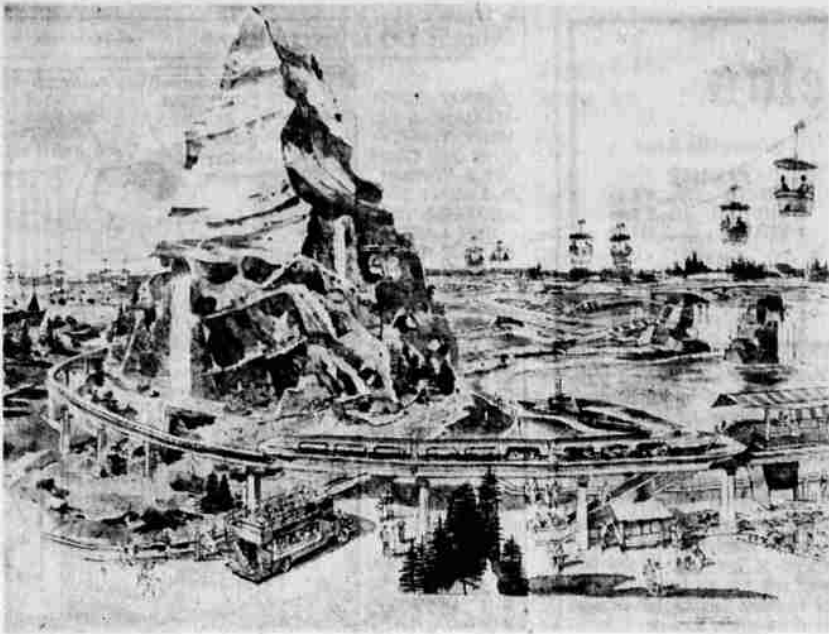

NEW DEVELOPMENTS at Disneyland are scheduled for completion by June 1 in this largely unused portion of the park's Tomorrowland-Fantasyland area. New developments include this 1-100 scale replica of a Swiss mountain, complete with two bobled runs, a submarine voyage, sailing beneath the Polar Ice Cap and past the Lost Continent of Atlantis, and the Disneyland-Alweg Monorail system. The new expansion program will cost about five million dollars.

Six Attractions Added To Disneyland

There's always something new at Disneyland, and 1959 will be no exception. In early June of this year, Walt Disney will unveil practically a "brand new" Disneyland for summertime guests at his Anaheim, California, wonderland. Six spectacular new attractions, built at a cost of \$5.5 million, are nearing completion in Disneyland's ambitious 1959 expansion, the greatest enlargement of the park since its opening in 1955. Beginning in June, Disneyland visitors from all over the world will race in speedy bobsleds from the top of snow-capped Matterhorn Mountain; dive in submarines to the mysterious depths of the Seven Seas; cruise aboard stream-lined, futuristic Monorail trains never before seen in America; and travel through glacier caverns and Alpine grottos in the Skyway ride. These new adventures, plus the aerial "Fantasy in the Sky" fireworks each night, will highlight Disneyland's summer season. The Magic Kingdom will be open every day from Memorial Day to Labor Day. The major 1959 expansion at Disneyland will bring the total investment in the park to \$29.1 million, and will increase the number of rides and attractions to 48, compared to 22 on opening day in 1955.

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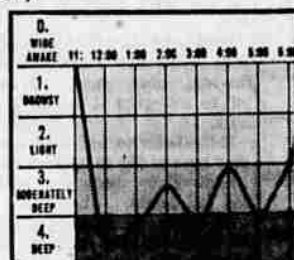
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KUHS Senior Will Attend Conference In Washington
