Pittsburgh Winner, 11-5; NY Yankees Blast BoSox

Pirates Topple Braves

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The Pittsburgh Pirates blasted Milwaukee Braves' pitching all over the premises Saturday to hand the defending National League champions their first defeat of the season 11-5. A crowd of 15,703 attended.

Right-hander Vern Law, who aided his own cause with a 2-run homer, hurled the Bucs to their first victory of the 1959 pennant race. He was given a handsome 7-run lead to work on in the first 3 innings and pitched easily the rest of the way, although surrendering a 3-run homer to Henry Aaron in the seventh. Law is 1-1 for the season.

The victory-hungry Pirates leveled a brutal 11-hit assault on a parade of 5 Milwaukee hurlers, starting with right-hander Bob Buhl, and were aided by 3 Tribe errors. In addition to Law's round-tripper, catcher Smoky Burgess blasted for the circuit in the third inning with 2 mates aboard.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—San Francisco right-hander Jack Sanford survived a siege of first-inning wildness Saturday and set the St. Louis Cardinals down 8-1 with a 1 1/2 hour pitching show.

Three walks, a hit batsman and a sacrifice fly in the opening inning provided the Cardinal run and Stan Musial's single in a seventh-inning pinch-hit role ruined a possible no-hitter. A double play erased Musial.

Sanford struck out four Cardinals and didn't issue a walk after his shaky first inning. He faced only 25 batters in the final eight innings. Except for shortstop Andre Rodgers' error and Musial's hit no Cardinal reached base after the first inning.

CINCINNATI (AP)—The Philadelphia Phils cut loose with a barrage of 15 hits Saturday that included a grand slam home run by Gene Freese for a free-hitting 14-9 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

Reliever Al Schroll was the winning pitcher and Don Newcombe the loser for the second time against Philadelphia.

Bob Mabe was the only one of six Cincinnati pitchers who didn't take a beating from the Phils hitters. The Philly pitchers didn't fare too well either but Seth Morehead and then Al Schroll had the advantage of always being in front after the second inning.

Trojans Victors In Test

STANFORD, Calif. (AP)—Southern California's little Bobby Staylor won two events and anchored the Trojans to victory in the crucial mile relay to lead his teammates to a triangular meet triumph Saturday over Oregon and Stanford.

Ten thousand persons saw the meet at Stanford stadium.

USC won the triangular affair with 62 points to Oregon's 55 1/2 and Stanford's 44 1/2.

They also swept the dual meet competition, defeating Oregon 70 and one-third to 60 and two-thirds, and Stanford 75-56.

The Ducks beat Stanford in the other dual meet 71-60.

Staylor made the difference for the Trojans. He won the 440 in 48 and the 220 in 21.1, and then anchored the relay.

Oregon led the Trojans in the triangular after 13 events, 55 1/2 to 54, but USC picked up 3 points in the discus and sprinted home in the relay on Staylor's final lap to take the meet.

Oregon's Jim Grelle ran the fastest collegiate mile of the year in the first event, winning the 4:07.2.

It was only another fastest college time of the year that kept Grelle from being a double winner as Stanford's Ernie Tuttle raced the half-mile in 1:49.9 with Grelle second in 1:51.7.

The meet, which brought together three of the best college teams of the country, produced yet two more best college marks of the year.

The Ducks' Dick Miller ran his lifetime best in winning the 2-mile in 9:07 and Olympic champion Charlie Dumas of Southern Cal won his specialty, the high jump at 6-9 1/2.

Steve Anderson and Dave Edstrom did some personal heroics event and placing in two others.

Edstrom took the high hurdles in 14.5 seconds, placed fourth in the low hurdles in 24.7 and tied for second in the high jump at 6-4. Anderson won the low hurdles in 23.8, placed second behind teammate Roscoe Cook in the 100, and finished second again in the broad jump.

Pacific, LC Split Twin Bill

FOREST GROVE, Ore. (AP)—Pacific University and Lewis and Clark College split a twin bill here Saturday as Pacific won the first 2-0 and Lewis and Clark the second 18-12.

The split left Lewis and Clark tied for the Northwest Conference leadership with Linfield. Boto teams have 3-1 records. Pacific is 1-3.

Pacific scored twice in the first frame of the opener on two walks, two sacrifices and a single by Gene Vanderzanden.

Yankees Collect 18 Hits

BOSTON (AP)—Big Moose Skowron and Andy Carey each hammered across four New York runs Saturday as the world champion Yankees overwhelmed the Boston Red Sox 16-7, touched off by a decisive second inning.

Southpaw Ted Bowsfield was the victim of all six New York tallies in the second as he was driven out.

Elston Howard, who drove in 3 runs as did Mickey Mantle, got 2 of the 4 Yank singles in the siege prolonged by 4 walks, an error and a passed ball.

Dave Sisler, who threw a strike past Skowron as the 11th New York batter to end the second frame, ran into his old nemesis—the home run ball. Hank Bauer, Skowron and Carey hit the drives before Sisler was replaced. Bauer's homer was the 150th of his major league career.

BALTIMORE (AP)—The Baltimore Orioles, taking advantage of 2 Washington errors, broke open a tight game with 4 runs in the seventh inning Saturday and ran off with a 6-1 victory.

Gus Triandos' 3-run homer highlighted the inning and helped 20-year-old Jerry Walker sail away his first 1959 victory.

Walker, whose only other American League triumph was a 1-0, 10-inning verdict over the Senators in September, 1957, gave up 8 hits while walking 1 and striking out 2.

Chuck Stobbs, the veteran Washington lefty, suffered the loss.

Triandos' homer was 1 of only 2 hits which produced the 4 Baltimore runs in the seventh. With 2 out, Bobby Boyd and Willie Tashy reached base on errors by second baseman Reno Bertoia and third baseman Harmon Killebrew.

Bob Nieman drove home Boyd with a single and Gus mopped up with his round-tripper.

EOC Mountaineers Collect Pair Of Saturday Wins From Owls

The Oregon Tech Owls high hopes of climbing another rung on the Oregon collegiate baseball conference ladder faded with the breeze as they dropped both ends of a twin bill with the Eastern Oregon College Mountaineers at Gem Stadium Saturday afternoon.

After sopping the Mounties 7-6 Friday (See page 4) the Techmen were topped 4-3 in the first game, a nine inning test. Saturday, then were slapped down again, 8-5, in the second, a quick-change-lead seven inning affair. All three games count in conference play.

Charged with the Owls' first loss Saturday was pitcher Allan Leach who worked under a three run custer for the first five innings before the Mounties caught up and passed him in the sixth and seventh frames. Leach gave up nine hits, walked four and fanned one over the distance.

The winner, John Willmarth, was tagged for seven hits while walking only three Owls and striking out eight.

The OTI club swallowed the loss despite the fact that they had accomplished three double plays in holding the Mounties in check most of the way.

The power hitter for the day was EOC's stubby right fielder, Ted Laocok who collected a triple, a single and a sacrifice in live trips to the plate. Laocok, however, was the goat in all three of the Owl double lays. None of his hits provided him with an RBI.

Leach did about all that could be asked of a pitcher in his turns at bat, collecting a double and two singles in four trips. In his first time up, however, Leach spiked an Owl rally by stepping on the plate and being called out.

The Owls got off to a one run lead in the second inning as Ron Downie, second base, got aboard on an error and advanced on a single by Stan Glass. Things quieted for a moment as Earl Kessler fanned but hope bloomed again as catcher Charlie Wilson walked. Seconds later, in a squeeze play, Downie scored but Leach stepped on the plate in the process. With one run in, leadoff man Jim Cox poled a long one that fell in the well in center field

and the side was retired. Again in the third things got moving as Gary Hueners, who blasted a single, and Gary Ehrmantrout, who also singled, took advantage of a pair of EOC errors to count two more Owl tallies.

OTI kept their three run bulge until a walk, two singles, a sacrifice and an error allowed the Mounties two runs in the sixth. In the seventh the Mountaineers picked up their last two scores off

on a single, a squeeze play and a triple by starting pitcher, Rudy Clements.

Their lead didn't last, however, as the Owls counted three more runs on three hits, singles by Cox and Leach and a triple by Glass, a squeeze play and three EOC miscues, two of which came on the same play.

Wayne Morrow scored in the fourth off an error followed by Leach's triple, the run marking the last for the Owls.

Three Owl errors and a Moutie hit accounted for three EOC scores in the fifth and they picked up one more in the seventh for good measure.

The winning pitcher was George Beeman who relieved Clements in the fourth while the loss was credited to Gary Hueners who went the distance for the Owls.

The Eastern Oregon pitchers allowed 10 hits, walked one and whiffed four. Hueners gave up nine hits and fanned one. The Owls committed seven errors to four for the Mountaineers.

The action filled second game the lead changed hands four times before coming to rest in the lap of the EOC nine.

The Owls got a one run lead in the second as agile Charlie Wilson got on with a single, promptly stole second, then third, and capped his performance by finally stealing home.

A pair of EOC tallies changed the complexion of things in the top of the third as they capitalized
