

Virgil, Tony Getting Return Crown Shots

This is comeback week for two former welterweight champions, Virgil Akins and Tony DeMarco. The 31-year-old Akins is getting a return title shot at the man who dethroned him—Don Jordan—and DeMarco is fighting to see if he still has anything left.

Although he absorbed a sound shellacking from Jordan at Los Angeles last Dec. 5, Akins has been made the 6-5 favorite to regain the crown at the Kiel Auditorium in St. Louis Friday night. The 15-rounder will be telecast nationally (NBC 10 p.m., EST) with St. Louis blacked out.

Akins may have been made the betting choice because he is fighting in his home town. Then, many experts don't believe the hard-hitting veteran could again look as bad as he did in losing the title in Jordan's home city.

Jordan, 24, has made tremendous strides in the last year. He won nine straight, including the title victory over Akins and a Jan. 22 tuncup over Alvaro Gutierrez in three rounds. His record is 44-11, including 15 knockouts. Akins, 49-19-1 record, including 29 kayos. After being knocked out twice by Akins, Oct. 29, 1957 and Jan. 21, 1958, DeMarco quit the ring. Fourteen months later, the 27-year-old Bostonian started a comeback. He stopped Curley Monroe in the eighth round, March 11.

Now hard-hitting Tony goes after No. 2 against Eddie Connors, a confident youngster from Boston, in a ten-rounder at the Boston Garden tonight.

Middleweights Benny (Kid) Parot of Cuba and Eddie (Machine Gun) Thompson of New York are featured in tonight's ten-rounder at New York's St. Nicholas Arena.

Middleweights also are featured in the Wednesday night television (ABC 10 p.m., EST) ten-rounder at Chicago Stadium. Spider Webb, third-ranking 160-pound contender from Chicago, takes on muscular Neal Rivers at Las Vegas in a return bout. Webb outpointed Rivers in New York two years ago. Winner of three straight by kayos, Webb's record is 22-4, including 18 kayos. Rivers, also winner of his last three scraps, has a 45-9-2 record, including 27 kayos.

Undefeated Jose Torres, an outstanding middleweight prospect, seeks his 12th straight victory Thursday night. He meets Joe Shaw of New York at Sunnyside

Arena. Torres, a Puerto Rican native now living in New York, is managed by Gus D'Amato, heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson's pilot.

Golden Boy Art Aragon of Los Angeles tries to avenge a defeat of our ears go on Saturday night. Aragon meets Joe McEl of New York, who whipped him in 1955, at the Hollywood Legion Stadium.

Caveman Eclipses Record

EUGENE (AP) — Jefferson of Portland and Cottage Grove reign today as the state's two top track teams—but Glenn Winghamam's javelin toss all but knocked them out of the limelight.

Winghamam, a Grants Pass senior, threw the spear 225 feet, 6 1/2 inches Saturday, eclipsing both the national and state prep records in the javelin event. The currently recognized national javelin record is 222 feet, 10 1/2 inches set in 1957 by Jan Sikorsky of Ramsay High School, Mt. Pleasant, Pa. The Hayward record was 197 feet, 11 inches, set by Winghamam last year.

Jefferson outdistanced all Metropolitan Division opposition with 48 1-3 points. Beaverton was second with 36, followed by Grants Pass with 32.

Cottage Grove scored an overpowering 82 for a fourth consecutive Class A Hayward Relays victory. Oswego with 68 and Central Point with 42 followed.

Mel Renfro of Jefferson and Beaverton's Steve Pauly came within 2 of a second of the national mark for the 120-yard high hurdles, which is 13.9. The judges ruled Renfro won by a hair as the two skinned the hurdles in 14.1.

The mark bettered the present Hayward Relays 120-yard high hurdles mark of 14.4 held by Pauly and Frank Morris of Medford.

Renfro added another first when he pole vaulted 12 feet, 4 inches and Pauly scored a first with a discus throw of 143 feet, 7 inches. Points scored by teams in each division were:

Canuk's Blake Big Success

MONTREAL (AP)—Toe Blake, the most successful National Hockey League coach of all time, refused today to be pushed into a corner.

Blake has been the pilot of the Montreal Canadiens four years. Four years he has won the Stanley Cup. "Is this the best of all his teams?" "It's a great team," the 46-year-old Blake said. "But I can't honestly say this is the greatest of my Montreal teams. But these fellows are not ordinary players, either."

He refused to say which of his four Stanley Cup winners he considered the greatest. The Canadiens won their fourth straight Stanley Cup—an unprecedented achievement—on Saturday night when they turned back the Toronto Maple Leafs 5-3 to make the final series count, 4-1.

Blake singled out Bernie (Boom) Geoffrion as the big difference. "Without him we might have been in trouble," said Blake, recalling that the Canadiens' two big guns, Maurice (Rocket) Richard and Jean Beliveau, both were sidelined with injuries.

Geoffrion scored two goals in the finale. As a result of winning both the NHL race and the Stanley Cup, each Canadian will be about \$4,000 richer. The Leafs will collect \$2,150 each.

A year ago Seals Stadium fans must have been wondering if it was true what they read about Johnny. He didn't win a game until April 26 and he didn't grab his third until May 18. He struggled around .500 until midseason and finally wound up at 16-13.

This is a new year and a new Antonelli. The 29-year-old left-hander from Rochester, N.Y., boasts a shiny 3-0 record. He scattered eight hits Sunday while pitching the Giants to a 3-1 victory over St. Louis.

Los Angeles stuck on the heels of the Giants by scoring five in the eighth inning to beat Chicago 8-3. The Dodgers are only a half game behind the Giants going into

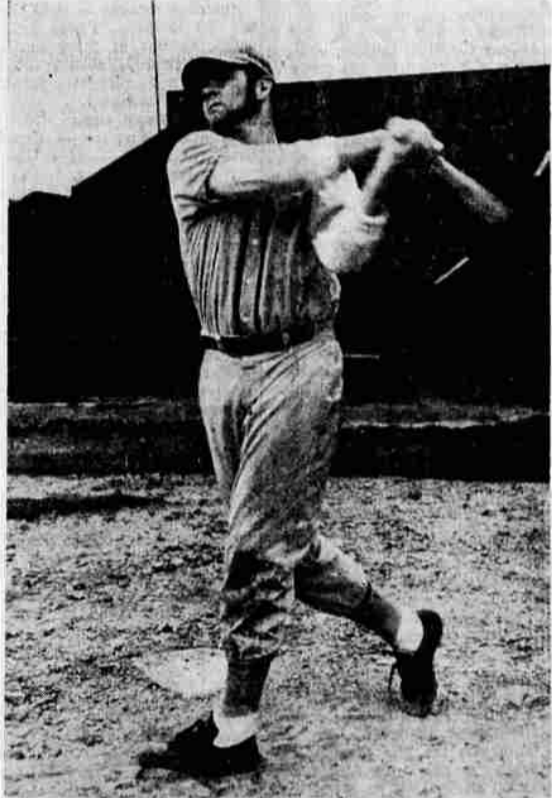

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI)—Tournament-wise Louise Suggs moved to the front as top money-winner as well as scoring leader today as the women pro golfers made the long jump from Texas to South Carolina for their next tour stop.

Miss Suggs capitalized on her 11 years of pro experience to sink a pressure-packed eight-foot birdie putt on the final green Sunday to win the \$10,000 Dallas Civitan Women's Open title by one stroke over Wilfrid Smith of St. Clair, Mich., with a three-over-par 287.

The victory, earned with a one-over-par 72 on the final round, won her \$1,662 and pushed her year's winnings to \$6,983. That was good enough to jump better than \$400 ahead of Betsy Rawls of Spartanburg, S.C., who had led the pro-ttes.

Miss Suggs already boasted the tour's best scoring average of 73.85 strokes per round and she bettered that here with a 71.75 average.

Miss Rawls, who will be the honoree in the Rawls Peach Blossom Open starting Thursday in her hometown of Spartanburg, S.C., faded to a 77 Sunday and finished fourth with a 295.

Joyce Ziske, of Waterford, Wis., closed with a par 71 for a 294 and third place. Marlene Hage of Pittsburgh, Pa., finished fifth at 296.

Whitman Victor In 4-Way Meet

LA GRANDE, Ore. (AP)—A fast dash by Bob Hough paced Whitman's victory in a four-way track meet here Saturday.

Whitman scored 65 1/2 points, Boise Junior College 56 1/2, Northwest Nazarene 26 1/2 and Eastern Oregon 20 1/2.

U Of Oregon Star Competing In Relays

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI)—There's a lumber-limbed lad attending the University of Oregon who would rather run than eat and his coach thinks he has a chance to crack the four-minute mile one of these days.

Dwyl Burleson, 18, is only a freshman at Oregon. But already he's attracted national attention. He will compete in the Drake Relays this weekend.

Coach Bill Bowerman of Oregon said he had hopes Burleson could better 4:05 in the Drake meet. Herb Elliott of Australia, a master of the sub-four-minute mile, reached 4:05 when he was 18 years old.

Although the four-minute mile has been surpassed many times, the only American to do so has been Don Bowden of California. Thus, Bowerman holds high hopes for his young frosh star. But he's grooming him carefully. If any attempts at a sub-four-minute mark are made by an Oregon trackman this year, Jim Grelle, a top varsity miler, will make them, Bowerman said.

Burleson is a lanky youth who spent his earlier days running around reservoirs near his home town of Cottage Grove, 20 miles south of here. He raced into the national picture last year when as a high school senior he broke the national prep mile mark with a time of 4:13.2.

Bowerman said Burleson is keeping a fine pace with the program he laid out this spring. He started the season with an easy 4:15 victory on a muddy track in the Willamette Relays in Salem, Ore. Then he came through with the 4:07.6 against the Oregon State freshman in his second try. Bowerman is happy with Burleson's sense of pace in his April 11 effort.

"We talked about running 62-second laps for this race and he came through with a 62-61-62-5-62.1, which is certainly close enough to suit me."

Burleson has a powerful finishing kick but he seldom has had to use it to win so far. In both of his races this year he has been all alone by the end of the second lap.

The only defeat Burleson suffered in the last two years came in the national AAU championships in Bakersfield, Calif., last June when he failed to qualify for the final. However, he was running against such stars as Elliott, Gail Hodgson of Oklahoma, Jim Moran of Penn State and others only two weeks after his graduation from high school. His time then was 4:10.7 but only the top four men qualified for the final and it took a 4:07 to make the grade.

The field at the Drake Relays will be the toughest he has faced since that AAU meet and Bowerman said he believed the experience would be good for him, win or lose.

In the opening Willamette-Whitman twin bill, Dave Brock of the Bearcats belted two doubles, a triple and two singles in six trips and knocked in six runs. Frank Caruso added three hits in four trips, including a double and a triple for three RBIs.

After Pacific won the first game, Lewis and Clark won the nightcap as Royce McDaniell and Al Cammeron had three hits each.
