

Northwestern Votes To Drop Rose Bowl

CHICAGO (AP) — Northwestern's decision to vote against continuance in the Rose Bowl could mean an end to Big Ten participation in the post-season football classic.

Northwestern announced Tuesday night it will vote against the Rose Bowl at the Big Ten meeting next month. This apparently would create a 5-5 stalemate. At least a 6-4 majority is needed for Western Conference participation.

Northwestern's decision brought a new twist to the Rose Bowl story. Last week it was speculated

Northwestern would vote for the game.

This immediately brought an unsigned editorial by the student newspaper—the Daily Northwestern—urging the university's senate to vote "no" at the conference meetings May 23-24 at Ann Arbor.

The paper called the decision to vote "yes" hypocritical.

T. Leroy Martin, chairman of the faculty committee, said: "Northwestern's faculty athletic committee voted tonight to reaffirm the university's long standing position of opposition to all post-season games including the Rose Bowl."

The decision will guide Northwestern's vote at the conference meeting, said Martin. Northwestern never before announced its vote before the meeting but other universities have and because of speculation on changing its vote, Martin decided on the release.

Last month at a meeting in Madison, Wis., the conference took a straw vote and received a 5-4 decision in favor of continuance, with Northwestern abstaining.

Illinois, Ohio State and Minnesota have announced they are against continuance. Wisconsin is known to be against although it has not announced its decision.

Michigan is in favor of continuance. Indiana, Iowa, Purdue and Michigan State are believed to be for although they also have not made any announcements.

The present contract ends with the 1960 game.

Techmen Prepare For SOC

With the statement, "I'm proud of the boys, they are improving all the time," Oregon Tech track coach George Miller began prepping his Owl cinder squad for their only home track meet of the 1959 season which will be held on Modoc Field Saturday afternoon beginning at 10 o'clock. At that time, Miller's crew takes on the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders in their third showing of the season.

The Ore Tech squad grabbed second place in a three-way meet with Portland State and Oregon College of Education at Monmouth last Saturday afternoon. Paced by the fine work of Dick Hoevar in both hurdles events plus the 100-yard dash, the Owls picked up a total of 32½ points while the powerful PSC squad racked up 93 tallies for top honors.

In the 205 lb hurdles, Hoevar set a new stadium record with a time of 22.6 while also setting a new standard in the lows with a time of 15 seconds flat. Another Ore Tech record was broken in the same meet, that one going to Freshman Howard Jackson who hurled the javelin 176 feet, ½ inch to push past the old mark of 173 feet.

Other Owl track men entered in the Soc meet are little Leo Wilson in both the 100 and 220, Phil Ryckard and Bill Barrington in the 440, Charles Huckins and Ardell Hamilton in both the high and low hurdles, Norm Sawyer in the 800, Roger Moreland in both the mile and two mile, Hamilton in the broad jump, Hamilton and William Hanson in the high jump, Hanson in the pole vault, Paul Layher and Frank Wilson in the shot put and Al Everson, Layher and Paul Martin in the discus.

The Ore Tech relay crew will be made up of Barrington, Ryckard, Brendon Herber and Sawyer.

The Klamath Union Pelicans return to Southern Oregon Conference baseball action this weekend as they make two trips across the Green Springs; the first, Friday for a doubleheader with the third place Crater Comets and the second, Saturday, for a repeat performance with the cellar-dwelling Ashland Grizzlies.				
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In both instances, the first games, seven inning tests, will count in league play while the following five inning games do not.				
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The Pelicans, physically sound, with the exception of regular first baseman Dean Dunson who has been sidelined for more than a week as a victim of the flu, are fresh from a split series with the Yreka Miners last weekend.				
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The Pels won the first game in nine innings 1-0 then dropped a five inning 3-4.				
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In their win against the Miners, the Pels' number one hurler, Blake Griggs, poured a three-hit shutout. In the second game the heavy bats of the Yreka club made life miserable for two KU twirlers before John Webb entered the scene to get things under control.				
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In recent games the Comets were topped by the powerful Grants Pass Cavemen 12-0 and 7-3 while Ashland succumbed to the Black Tornado 6-4 and 12-10. Both Grants Pass and Medford are undefeated.				
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Seeing a chance to improve their SOC win-loss marks in the two-day stand, the Pels are undergoing an extensive practice schedule in preparation.				
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Coach Dean White declined to name his probable starting pitchers for the series at this time, stating, "Things change—we probably won't know until Friday morning." His choice could be made from Griggs, Bill Wilkinson, John Webb, Keith Farrell, Pat Carney, Wally Palmberg and Paul Bishop among others.

Haughton is a farm boy who was born with a love for trotting horses. He never anticipated the day would come when he would have 103 horses in his charge and his stable would win a record \$1,047,610 in a season.				
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That's because 18 years ago when Billy was 17 and took a job as a groom, harness racing was a sport associated with cider and chicken with dumplings while today it is an industry of cocktails and caviar.				
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Even a decade ago it was rough going for the "trotts." The city				
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slickers still were in the process of learning to appreciate the country folks' sport and it was tough and go whether they would catch on.				
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BOOMING BUSINESS				
But the dusty by-product of the county fair today is big business, compounded of many factors. It received its major break with invention of the Phillips starting gate. This contraption, a folding barrier mounted on the back of an automobile, eliminated the tedious system of innumerable false starts. Construction of modern raceways which are glittering pari-mutuel palaces and the unquenchable urge to gamble pushed the sport across.				

Figures usually are boring, unless they happen to deal with your own finances or the odds on the longshot totting your wager home in front, but the betting records currently being piled up at Yonkers Raceway, as example, are staggering.				
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In early April, when the weather was poor and crowds were not at their best, Yonkers had five nights in a row on which the fans bet better than two million dollars per night. The average nightly wagering is more than \$1,800,000 and on one recent night Yonkers created a record handle of \$2,536,000.				
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RAGS TO RICHES				
Consider that a mere six years ago, Haughton was the leading money winner among the nation's sulky sitters with \$374,527. Last year he personally piloted home horses which won \$816,659.				

"I'm continually surprised at what has happened," he says. "Why, when I first came into trotting it was rough going to make ends meet. After all, we had only the county fairs and the purses weren't much."				
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But as harness racing began to make strides, Billy opened a public stable in 1947 and today he is the top man in the driver-trainer league. He has been the nation's leading driver six years in a row and has led in earnings seven years in a row.
