

Peterson Pitching Praised

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON Eugene (Special) — The pitchers had all the glory in the opening week of action in the Northern Division pennant race as only 10 players could muster a .300 batting average or better.

Elwood Han of WSC, Larry Burke of Washington, Gary Moore of OSC and Denny Peterson of Oregon all turned in good performances in winning their first games of the season. Han and Burke were not touched for a single earned run while Peterson heads the strikout list with nine.

Arlie Kangas, Washington State's catcher, is leading the league with a healthy .517 mark while Don Daniels of Washington and Kim Bradshaw of Oregon State have compiled a .500 average. Grimm Mason of OSC and Bob Wyman of Washington round out the top five with a pair of .400 performances.

Washington has taken an early lead in the team batting with a .263 with the other squads having to settle with below-par performances. Oregon State has a .229, Oregon .210 and Washington State .175 in games through April 18.

OSC's Mason leads the sluggers with a pair of home runs and five runs batted in while Oregon tops the team fielding by coming through without an error in six chances.

Following the derby, but not until the afternoon, the Amateur All Age stake will be run. The amateur is for any age dog handled by amateurs. The club defines any amateur as any person who has never received any compensation for training or handling a dog.

Saturday morning at 8 the Qualifying Stake begins followed by the Open All Age Stake. The Open All Age, the main-event of the trials, is scheduled to start around noon on Saturday and continue through Sunday afternoon.

Judges for the event are John Feeback of Klamath Falls; Ed Bailey, Redding; Ken Denman, Medford; and Guy Cherry Jr. of Altadena, California.

Vancouver, Sacramento Travel 13 Inning Marathon; Solons Win

The Sacramento Solons and the Vancouver Mounties gave the Pacific Coast League its first marathon game of the 1959 season Tuesday night, with the host Solons winning it 1-0 in 13 long innings.

The victory moved the Solons into first place past the Spokane Indians, who were tamed 2-1 by the San Diego Padres on Billy Hunter's ninth-inning, two-out single.

In other games, Sal Taormina's bases-loaded blast over the right-field barrier at Phoenix gave the Giants a 7-5 victory over the Port and Beavers and Seattle's Rainiers got three doubles and two runs in the ninth to shade the Salt Lake City Bees 6-3.

Vancouver's seventh team error of the game, a low throw by Marv Breeding in trying for a double play, let Mike Krsnich come home with the only run of the game.

Joe Stanka, who worked the full 13 innings for the Solons, won it with a seven-hitter. Fred Besana,

Dick Luebke and Charlie Beamon, the loser, limited Sacramento to five safeties.

Bob Giallombardo, a lefty who had a 13-10 record with Los Angeles and Montreal in 1958, was coasting along on a three-hitter when the roof fell in on him in the San Diego ninth.

Mitchell June started off the last of the ninth with a double. Giallombardo got the next two batters, then gave up a single to Al Jones which scored June. Jones rounded to third on a throwing error and Bobby Locke came in to run for Jones. Locke scored on Hunter's single.

Taormina, taking over in the Phoenix outfield for the injured Willie McCovey, smashed out his grand slammer in the fourth inning. The blast put Phoenix ahead to stay.

Jose Pagan got a solo homer for the Giants and Bob DiPietro got a solo homer and a two-run triple for the Beavers.

Claude Osteen, a southpaw who came up to the Rainiers last season from Wenatchee of the Northwest League, picked up his second victory of the season in setting the Bees down on six hits. He retired the last 11 Salt Lake City batters in order.



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
