

# Sen. Morse Lauds Adlai

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) believes that Adlai Stevenson would be one of the greatest presidents in the history of the United States.

Morse, who said he has not made any commitments for the 1960 Democratic presidential nomination, told reporters Monday night, "I have no hesitation in saying that if Adlai Stevenson should win the nomination, he would be one of the greatest presidents in our history. . . . He is a perfect example of a teaching of mine: There is no substitute in government for brains."

Morse spoke here Monday on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal.

Earlier in the day in Washington, D.C., Morse urged addition of \$125,000 to the appropriation for the Agricultural Marketing Service for berry producers' marketing data. He said there is a growing need for such information.

# Real Thief Surrenders

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Young Daniel W. Dough Jr., no longer faced the prospect of a jail term for attempted bank robbery today because the real would-be robber turned out to have a heart.

James Edward Anderson, 20, an ex-Navy man who is almost a double for Dough, came to the FBI Monday and admitted it was he—not Dough—who tried to rob the Bank of Virginia here last Friday.

Anderson said his conscience had pestered him ever since Dough, 33, a newspaper copy boy, was arrested and charged with attempted robbery.

Police promptly exonerated Dough and held Anderson in jail in default of \$2,000 bond.

"I'm glad the guy had a conscience," said Dough.

Dist. Atty. John M. Hollis said Dough and Anderson "looked amazingly similar" — almost like twins.

By rare coincidence, both had been to the Bank of Virginia the morning of the robbery attempt.

The would-be robber had handed Mrs. Eileen Thomas, a teller, a note demanding money, Mrs. Thomas, thinking it was a joke, laughed and the would-be robber fled.

Dough was picked up shortly afterward and identified by Mrs. Thomas.

Monday the teller said she was mistaken. She and two other bank employees identified Anderson.

Dough had been to Mrs. Thomas' window at the bank to cash his paycheck only 20 minutes before the attempted robbery.

The FBI said Anderson was discharged from the Navy six weeks ago. His home is in Niagara Falls, N.Y.

# Tribute Awarded Old Soldier, 99

WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP) — West Point's corps of cadets Monday saluted an old soldier on his 99th birthday.

He is Maj. Gen. Henry Clay Hodges, Stamford, Conn., retired since 1921. He is the academy's oldest graduate, class of 1881.

The 2,400 cadets sang "Happy Birthday" and presented him with a cake with 99 candles. They also gave him a cadet officer's sash.
