

### Love Spurned; Stripper Tries Suicide

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A red-haired burlesque dancer billed as the "I Don't Care Girl" wrote a farewell note to the man she cares for—and then tried to kill herself aboard an airliner Monday.

The note indicated the man plans to marry somebody else. Mitzi Dore, 32, also known professionally as the "Happy Go Lucky Girl," was found unconscious from an overdose of tranquilizer pills in an American Airliner restroom. She was reported in critical condition today in a hospital.

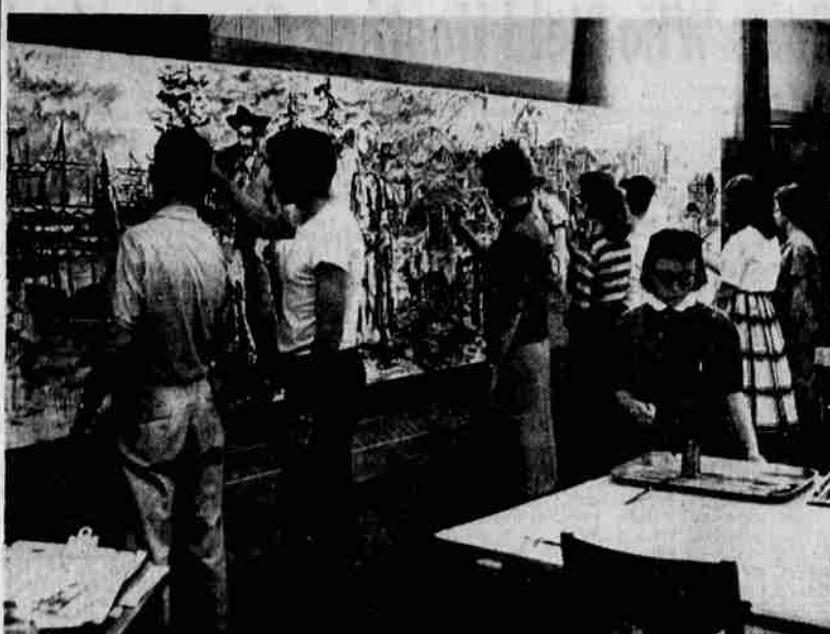
Foliceman L. W. Lane said the note, written on back of a flight ticket, was addressed to Fred Haulin, Washington, D.C., a real estate consultant.

Raulin could not be reached in Washington for comment but his father, Fred Sr., said "He doesn't want anything to do with her. The less I hear about that girl the better—I know she doesn't belong in this family."

The father confirmed that his son is engaged to another woman but declined to identify her.

Lane said Miss Dore boarded the airliner Sunday night in Washington.

Miss Dore has appeared professionally in New York and Los Angeles. Her real name is Beatrice Themis Doerr, of Alexandria, Va.

### MD Reports Heart Find

NEW YORK (AP)—A Columbia University doctor reports an antibiotic has lowered blood cholesterol in 22 patients.

Cholesterol is a substance in the blood which contributes to fatty deposits along the inner walls of blood vessels. It is considered to be a factor contributing to heart attacks and strokes.

Dr. Alfred Steiner said at a news conference Monday that the antibiotic neomycin lowered cholesterol levels an average of 21 per cent over a four-month period. There were no harmful side effects.

The patients treated varied in age from 21 to 72.

#### RATTLES FIXED

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Fireman John W. Makemason was listening for a rattle as he drove Monday. Now everything rattles in his pickup truck.

While Makemason had his ear cocked for the rattle, the truck jumped a curb, knocked down a sign and smashed into a tree. Makemason had to get 20 stitches in his forehead.

### \$200,000 Asked From Estate

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Actress Linda Christian seeks \$200,000 for her two children from the estate of her ex-husband, the late actor Tyrone Power.

In addition to provisions for the children in his will, Power promised to set up a fund to support them under terms of the couple's 1955 divorce, Miss Christian claimed.

Power died of a heart attack last November at the age of 45. His will also provided for a third child, Tyrone William, born to his third wife, Deborah Anne Power.

### Educator Tells Schools Influence

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — School has more influence on children than the home or church, in the opinion of Dr. Francis H. Horn, president of the University of Rhode Island.

"The influence of the family, beyond purely hereditary factors is decreasing and I see no prospect of reversing the trend," he told an educational group.

### Shots Echo In Background In Cotton Strike Violence

HENDERSON, N.C. (AP) — Rifle shots rang out again Tuesday night as police escorted nonunion workers from the Harriet-Henderson Cotton Mills.

Homemade gasoline bombs burst on the streets. Flames shot into the air as strikers howled threats.

No one was reported injured, although an official said it was a miracle no one was hurt.

"That's just a sample," a woman shouted. "There'll be more tomorrow night."

It was the worst outbreak of violence in 23 weeks of labor unrest in this industrial city of 16,000 near the Virginia line.

The city looked toward a meeting today in Raleigh for a strike solution from Gov. Luther H. Hodges and officials of the mills and the Textile Workers Union of America.

A strike settlement was reached last weekend. It came apart Monday when the union complained few of its members were getting their jobs back.

Boyd Payton, Carolina's director of the union, complained to the governor the mill management had hired new workers for the mills' second and third shifts.

Hodges asked company president John D. Cooper to bring all data on available jobs, along with

copies of the proposed contract. Tuesday night's violence erupted 20 minutes before the approximately 100 workers on the second shift were to leave the plants.

Bottles filled with gasoline were thrown into the streets around the mill gates. The gasoline was set afire.

State Highway patrolmen and local police were on hand to escort workers from the plants.

When the first auto appeared at a plant gate, shots rang out from some distance away. Reporters heard the bullets slam into the autos as the cars drove through the glass-littered streets.

Rocks banged against the speeding autos.

Police said at least 20 shots were fired at the South Henderson plant, 9 or 10 at the North Henderson mill.

Police Chief E. C. Harris said

the shots were fired from some distance away from the plants, outside the cordon of police.

Mayor Carroll Singleton said he had expected the situation to be much worse. Monday night workers in both mills bedded down inside the plants rather than run the risk of violence.

The plants were struck Nov. 17 after failure by negotiators to agree on an arbitration clause in a new contract. About 1,000 of the company's 1,200 workers walked out. Cooper reopened both mills Feb. 16 without a contract.

### RI Police Stage Liquor Raid

BARRINGTON, R.I. (AP)—Police staged Monday their first liquor raid since the town went dry 23 years ago.

They seized 410 gallons of wine and arrested Albert Piccerilli, 75, on a charge he was selling it at \$1.50 a gallon.

Police Chief George W. Robbins said several high school teenagers told him they gained admittance to Piccerilli's cellar by using the passwords: "Elsie sent me," or just "Booze."
