Book Review Heard By Club

FORT JONES — Mrs. MacLeod Maurice of Gold Hill, Oregon, was guest speaker at the April 14 meeting of the Fort Jones Women's Club. Mrs. Maurice reviewed "The Wheel and the Hearth," a historical novel of the crossing of the Oregon Trail. The topic was considered particularly appropriate in view of the Oregon Centennial celebration.

The author, who had planned to address the meeting herself, was unable to attend, so Mrs. Maurice, a close friend of Mrs. Moore, spoke in her place. Mrs. Moore sent her scrapbook for use during the meeting.

Mrs. Joseph Vardanega, chairman of the book review committee, introduced both the speaker and the book. Mrs. Lewis Lukes, president of the Women's Club, read "Sunset Trail," a poem by Mrs. Moore, prior to Mrs. Maurice's address.

"The Wheel and the Hearth" is based on material from the diary of Mrs. Moore's grandmother, who made the trek from St. Joseph to Oregon in 1853. The novel won first prize for historical novel awarded by the National League of American Penwomen a few years ago. Since its publication, well over 250,000 copies have been sold.

Mrs. Maurice, the speaker, is a graduate of the University of Oregon, where she and Mrs. Moore were sorority sisters. She is a member of the Medford Contemporary Book Club, serves on the board of the Red Cross in Medford, and is a member of the Women's Auxiliary of the Rogue Memorial Hospital.
