

Tax Commission Aides To Discuss Reservation

Representatives of the State Tax Commission, including former County Judge Charlie Mack, are expected here Friday for a pow-wow about the Klamath Indian Reservation.

The purpose is to discuss appraisal of the vast reservation for county tax assessment purposes. The county court—where Judge Mack sat so long—invited the state commission, the county board of equalization and budget committee, and Assessor Hap Caldwell for a 2 p.m. meeting to discuss the big job.

On the reservation, said Ray Brackman, Caldwell's assistant, are 485,000 acres to appraise. Included is a vast amount of timberland, open grazing and farm land, and the city of Chiloquin.

"We'll have to do the whole reservation, from start to finish," Brackman said.

The court said the tax commission would be asked about helping do the job. One specific request being considered is that the state appraise timber and timberlands and leave the rest to the county. Just what is to be done is to be discussed, if not decided, at the Friday afternoon session.

Caldwell has asked the County Budget Board, now meeting to consider the county budget for next year, for an additional \$42,000—most of it to handle the reservation reappraisal job. He estimated a need of five additional appraisers and one additional office girl on a temporary basis until the job is done. If his request is accepted, Caldwell said he hoped to retain two appraisers and the office girl on a permanent basis.

The reservation was appraised as of February 28, 1957 by an Arcata, California, firm for the Bureau of Indian Affairs. At that time the full appraisal value was reached, said Earl Wilcox, manager of the Tribal Land Sales Office. The appraisal also determined the realization (market) value of reservation lands as of October, 1957, Wilcox said.

Subsequently, a congressional amendment to the termination bill required a complete review, a "redetermination" of realization values. Three separate firms made separate reviews and their results were averaged per unit to provide an accepted value as of last December 31, Wilcox said.

The county appraisal, however, would be made on a different basis (sections instead of units) and

for a different purpose (taxing instead of selling). So the meeting Friday is to determine the "most economical, most feasible way to do the job," Brackman said.

Timber Bid Meeting Set

An industry briefing meeting has been scheduled in Portland Friday, May 8, for persons interested in submitting bids on the large sustained yield units of the Klamath Reservation which are now up for sale.

The briefing, scheduled for the Interior Building at 1001 N. E. Lloyd Boulevard, is set for 2 p.m., and will be for the purpose of explaining the general background, intent and scope of the sales program of the sustained yield units, and will include information concerning the appraisal background and information on timber volumes and qualities.

It will also enable officials to outline bidding requirements and other items related specifically to the terms and conditions of the sales.

This portion of the program will be handled by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Following this, the regional forester of the U.S. Forest Service will give information relating to specifications and minimum requirements for sustained yield management.

Following these two discussion topics, the meeting will be opened to questions from those in attendance.

Four sustained yield units are now being offered for sale. The four are described as the Antelope Desert, the North Marsh, the Sycan, and the Modoc Point sustained yield units.

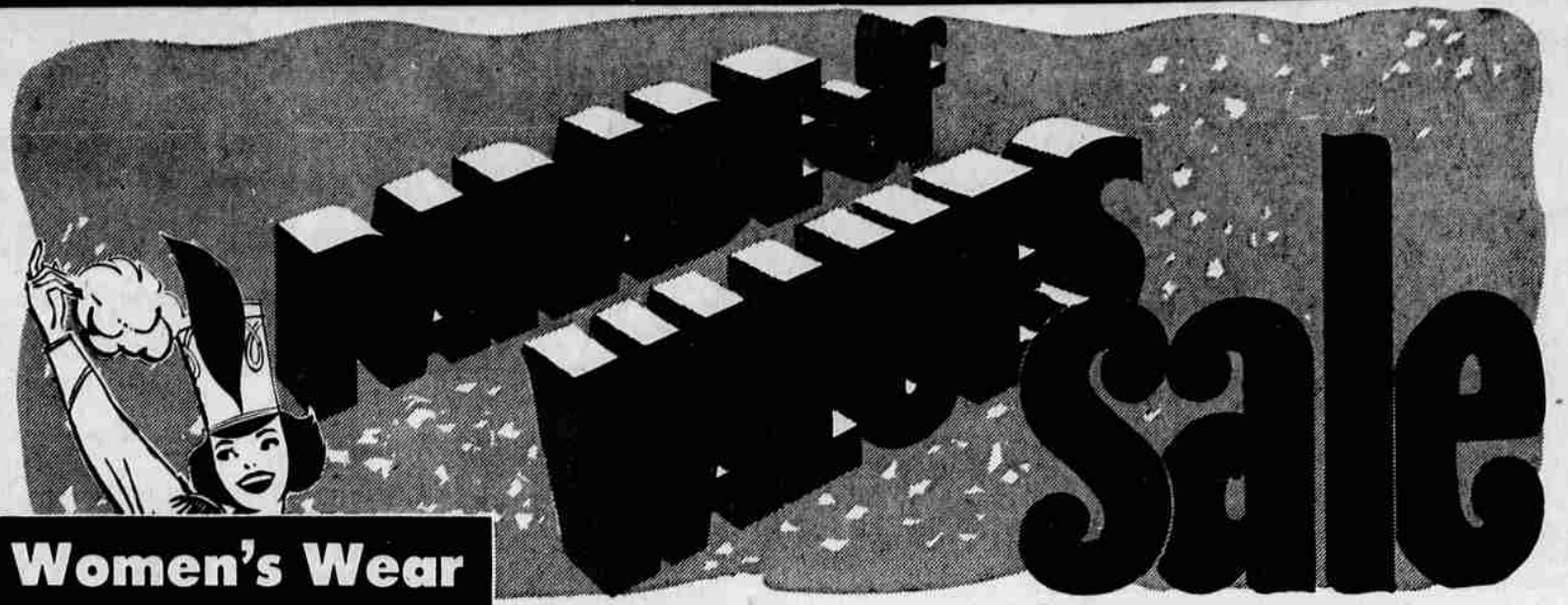

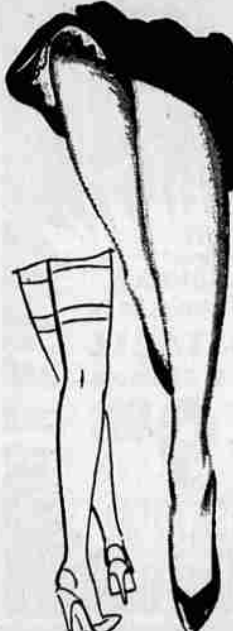

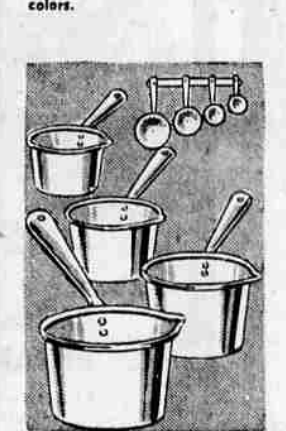
