

People From Deep South Termed Least Educated By NEA Annual Report

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Deep South is spending less for public education than any other area in the country—and its people are the least educated—the National Education Assn. reported today.

On the other hand, many of the Southern states are spending a greater percentage of their citizens' personal income to support their schools than are richer states elsewhere.

The NEA issued its annual report, "Rankings of the States," with 60 tables of figures to show how the various states stood in

different educational categories. It picked no over-all best or worst state, but the figures told quite a story.

For instance: Mississippi this year is paying its classroom teacher an annual salary of \$3,070, lowest in the nation. It is spending \$181 per year for each

student in average daily attendance, less than any state except Alabama, which spent \$164.

But Mississippi led the nation in one respect: in 1957 almost half its young men who registered for the draft failed to pass the pre-induction mental examination. Mississippi's rejection rate was 49.9 per cent, followed by South Carolina (49.8), Alabama (42.6), Louisiana (38.9) and Georgia (37).

At the other end of the table, Montana had the lowest rejection rate, 3.5 per cent. Next came Iowa (3.6), Minnesota (4.2), Kansas (4.5) and Oregon (4.6). The national average is 18.9 per cent.

The national average of "current expenditures per pupil in average daily attendance" for 1958-59 is \$340.

New York, with \$335, is spending more per pupil than any other state. Next comes Alaska (\$320), New Jersey (\$463), Wyoming (\$433) and the District of Columbia (\$434.43). The 10 lowest states on this list are all Southern or border states.

But Mississippi spent 3.8 per cent, and Alabama 3.3 per cent, of their total personal income payments for school support compared with New York's 3.2 per cent and New Jersey's 2.9 per cent, for instance.

The annual average salary of classroom teachers for this year ranges from Alaska's \$6,400 to Mississippi's \$3,070. The national average is \$4,775. New York is second with \$6,200. Eight of the 12 lowest-paying states are Southern or border states.

Earth Broken At Tule Fair

TULELAKE — The ground was broken this week in the construction of the new rodeo chutes at the Tulelake - Butte Valley Fairgrounds, according to Bill Whitaker, manager. The work is being done by local help.

The chutes, Whitaker said, will be the best in Northern California and were patterned after the ones at Quincy, California, after a committee of board members visited several arrangements before accepting these.

The total plan will include eight chutes, seven corrals, an unloading ramp, a calf chute and the complete facilities for conducting a full scale rodeo.

The actual construction will take place slightly to the left of the grandstand. This will allow room to set up the softball field directly in front of the grandstand.

Although it is not the intent of the fair board to hold a rodeo in connection with the fair, the board may consider leasing the grounds for a rodeo this summer.

Rangers Note Fire Danger

LAKEVIEW — District rangers have activated their fire weather stations at headquarters sites and are getting some high fire danger readings, according to fire staff officer V. E. Taylor of the supervisor's office of the Fremont National Forest.

The tri-district office just north of Lakeview has recorded fire days as high as Class 5, which means high fire danger. At 14 per cent humidity readings as low as 14 per cent have been registered and that is July or August weather.

Taylor has instructed rangers on the Fremont to man key lookouts on an emergency basis and to provide fire overhead on weekends when fire weather conditions warrant such action.

Taylor asks that opening day fishermen be aware that fire weather conditions are much more severe than is usual at this season of the year and care with campfires and smoking must be practiced if we are to avoid costly opening day fishermen fires in Lake County.

New Red Satellite State Feared By U.S. Officials

WASHINGTON (AP) — Many U.S. officials have about given up hope that the revolutionary government of Iraq can resist Soviet Communist domination.

There is growing fear here that Iraq will soon become a hidden

satellite of the Kremlin, if it has not done so already.

Since the Iraqi revolution last July 14, Premier Abdel Karim Kassam has become increasingly dependent on or allied with Communist support.

British and U.S. leaders are reported close to agreement that Kassam has probably gone beyond the point of no return.

The United States policy for dealing with this situation is one of waiting to see what happens. Officials interviewed privately say in effect, "What can any outsider do?"

Authorities are convinced that Egypt's President Nasser, whose goal is to become leader of the whole Arab world, has been behind a couple of attempts to stage some kind of anti-Communist bid for power in Iraq. But he has gotten nowhere.

As between Nasser and Kassam, the United States remains neutral, officials say. Nasser is still not regarded here as a dependable friend.

The concept of Iraq as a "hidden satellite" comes from government experts who believe that Moscow prefers to move into the strategic oil rich area in stages rather than in one great advance.

By this theory the first stage was to break the power of the Western nations in the Middle East. This stage reached a climax with the assassination of King Faisal and other pro-U.S. Iraqi leaders last July 14.

The second phase would be to gain indirect control of a Middle Eastern government as in Iraq.

The third phase would see the establishment of a land bridge. That could only mean trouble of the gravest kind involving the Soviet Union, Iran, Iraq and probably Turkey.

Since both Iran and Turkey are in the Middle East defense alliance, and Turkey is a member also of NATO, any such trouble probably would involve the great powers on both sides.

The Soviet Union stands to lose one point of possibly major importance. Having already alienated Nasser by backing Kassam against him, Premier Nikita Khrushchev may find himself unable to pursue a propaganda of Arab nationalism while promoting Iraqi communism.

5 Arraigned In Dorris

DORRIS — Five men were arraigned in the Dorris Judicial Court recently on citations served by the California Highway Patrol last weekend.

Loren Edward Chambers, Worden, was charged with driving under the influence of alcoholic beverages. Chambers pled not guilty and requested a court trial.

Judge Les Chase remanded Chambers to the custody of the sheriff under \$500 bond. The trial date has been set for May 7.

Harold Arthur Stock, Yakima, Washington, was charged with being under the influence of intoxicating liquor in and about a car. Stock pled guilty but when Judge Chase questioned him, he said he was sure the officer thought he was drunk, but he said he was asleep in the back of the car at the time of the arrest, and because of a service-connected disability he was very nervous and it gives him the appearance of being drunk.

Stock said he had hitched a ride north on Highway 97 with Chambers trying to get home to Yakima. Judge Chase dismissed the guilty plea and suspended a \$50 fine.
