Ex-KF Cleric Death Told

Word has been received of the death of the Rev. Arthur L. Rice at Whittier, California, April 21. The Rev. Rice was pastor of the Klamath Falls Presbyterian Church from 1921 to 1926. He later returned to be pastor of the Mt. Laki Community Church from 1930 to 1933 during which time the membership trebled and the modern new church was built.

Aside from his church work he was interested in many community affairs. During the first pastorate he was particularly active in the Klamath Falls Rotary Club, and in the second pastorate, the grange.

The Rev. Rice was a native of Nebraska. He was graduated from the University of California at Berkeley, and McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago. He began his work as a minister in the home mission field in Utah, where he spent three years. Following this, he held pastorates at Klamath Falls, Salt Lake City, Utah; Tulare, California; and Reno, Nevada.

He loved nature, and spent one year as ranger in Crater Lake National Park. He was a kodachrome enthusiast and had an interesting collection of wild flowers and mountain scenery. He wrote for children's magazines, and in 1932 his book "Magic Glasses" (a fantasy for children) was published.

He is survived by the widow, Eva R. Rice; his son, Alan L. Rice of San Bernardino; four brothers, Claton S. Rice, D.D. and Fred D. Rice of Seattle; Dr. Raymond Rice, of Indianapolis; and Paul L. Rice, Ph.D., of Kingston, Jamaica; also two sisters, Mrs. Harriet R. Bean of Ames, Iowa and Mrs. Ruth Wharton of Los Angeles. Memorial services will be held at Plymouth Congregational Church Saturday, April 25, at 3 p.m. The family suggests that those who wish to send flowers send them instead to their own churches in his memory.

Reds Appear In Effort To Revitalize Movement

The Soviet Communists seem to be in the midst of a major effort to reactivate the World Peace Partisan movement which has been quiet since Stalin died in 1953.

This may have ominous significance to the West. Stalin put the World Peace Partisans in motion on a big scale 10 years ago when he was planning a most active

and aggressive drive against the West. The Peace Partisans acquired particular significance for the Kremlin during the Korean War with their warlike attacks on the United States and United Nations forces.

The Peace Partisans became a sounding board for Soviet and Chinese Communist accusations that the United States engaged in bacteriological warfare.

The World Peace Partisans have served as a direct arm of Soviet foreign policy. They aim to draw people into Communist causes by appealing to the universal desire for peace.

In Moscow major editorials have been published calling for greater peace partisan activity. A meeting of the World Council of Peace is scheduled in Stockholm in the near future.

The Soviets and all the other Communist countries gave big play to the recent meeting of Peace Partisans in Iraq which was addressed by Iraqi Premier Abdel Karim Kassem. He heard vitriolic attacks on the Western powers and "world imperialism."

This was followed up in a few days by editorials in Soviet papers, including a lead editorial in Pravda, praising the World Peace Partisan movement.

In words straight out of the Stalinist period the editorial proclaimed: "The peoples must manifest a high degree of vigilance toward the intrigues of the aggressive imperialist forces."

One of the May Day slogans for the Soviet Union is: "Peoples of all countries! Intensely the struggle for maintenance and strengthening of peace, for universal security! Decisively expose the imperialist warmongers! For a firm peace and cooperation between peoples."

This slogan is straight out of Stalin's time.

BOOTLEGGING TAX

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—The Texas House of Representatives, wrestling with the biggest tax problem in state history, talked Thursday about a tax on bootleggers.

The proposal by a south Texas legislator died when too many members protested it would hurt their constituents. Two-thirds of Texas' 254 counties are officially dry.

Guardsmen Report Find Of 2nd Cache

PANAMA (AP)—National Guardsmen today reported finding a second cache of arms on the beach where Roberto Arias and a rebel band landed six days ago.

Arias, fugitive husband of ballerina Dame Margot Fonteyn, was still eluding patrols searching the coast and hills around Santa Clara, 75 miles west of the capital.

The rebels were believed well armed. Several empty boxes which officials said presumably contained rifles were found.

The latest arms cache included 24 pistols, 3 revolvers, 5 loaded cartridge belts and 1,000 rounds of ammunition. A similar cache was found Wednesday.

A government prosecutor said new evidence showed that Dame Margot was aware of her 41-year-old husband's plot to overthrow President Ernesto de la Guardia.

The famed British dancer was expelled from Panama Wednesday after questioning. She professed ignorance of any revolutionary activities. She flew to New York and on to London Thursday, still refusing to talk about the revolt.

Dist. Atty. Francisco Alvarado told newsmen he would not have let the dancer go had he then had letters found in a beach cottage near Santa Clara Wednesday.

Alvarado said the letters—addressed to the dancer and her husband—were written by Judy Thasham, a British friend living in New York. The letter to Dame Margot said "the plot thickens very much" and referred to "strange calls from Alastair to me." Authorities identified Alastair as a friend of Arias who visited Panama recently.

Officials said a memo found in the cottage showed Arias had drawn more than a half million dollars in the last 18 months from American movie star John Wayne. Wayne told newsmen in California he was a long-time friend of Arias and that they were associated in a shrimp company along with other stockholders. He expressed surprise that Arias could be mixed up in any revolutionary activities.

Civic Leaders Given Jet Ride

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Trans World Airlines gave 102 Kansas City civic leaders a 460-mile demonstration ride to St. Louis and back in a new jet airliner Thursday.

The flying carpet treatment included a snack for the guests.

Four hostesses had to restrict the snack to coffee and tarts, and they had to work fast.

The ride lasted only 52 minutes—45 minutes to St. Louis and 7 minutes back.

FLU ABSENTEES

DORRIS — Butte Valley High School Principal Ken Cleland said that with an attendance of 121 students, the cases of flu had dropped to a low Wednesday of 15 from a high peak last Friday of 60.

Buel Fisher, principal of the Dorris Elementary School, said with an attendance of 250 the cases of flu had risen Wednesday to 71 as of a low last Friday of 62 cases.

STORM SINKS VESSELS

SEOUL, Korea (UPI)—Five persons were drowned and 38 were reported missing when a ferry and three fishing boats capsized during a storm Thursday off the Korean west coast.

Conservatives Win In Japan

TOKYO (AP)—Japan's ruling conservatives won an overwhelming victory today in state and local elections. Their prizes included the important governorships of Tokyo, Osaka and Hokkaido, all hotly contested races.

Of the 21 state (prefecture) governor's posts at stake Thursday, six went to members of Premier Nobusuke Kishi's conservative Liberal-Democrats and one to an opposition Socialist.

The remaining 14 went to independents—nine of them supported by both the Liberal-Democrats and the Socialists, four by the Liberal-Democrats only and one by the Socialists.

Kishi's party also pulled far ahead in balloting for the 2,657 seats in Japan's 46 state assemblies. Incomplete returns gave them 1,207 to the Socialists' 316.

The greatest interest was in the Tokyo governor race. Liberal-Democrat Ryutaro Azuma pulled away in the final stages of counting to win from Socialist Hachiro

Arita. The unofficial count was 1,114,903 for Azuma, 1,052,708 for Arita.
